If we keep up the supply with another S\$25,000, the new Church should be completed by June! Another equivalent sum, if sent to Pastor Menzano to complete his at Taytay, Manila, that will establish a second Church. Rev Dan Ebert III, will you tell us exactly how much each church needs? Using our strong dollar abroad to accomplish two to three times what it can locally is profitable trading for God.

So is our strong dollar a great boost to the Burmese Church and Bible College. And remember, your dollars are earning, above all, souls eternally for Christ. The Lord bless your house as you give to build His house.

God's Kingdom in West Kalimantan

The following paragraph comes with Rev Djunaidi's Greeting Card to Life Church: "Moreover, we in Pontianak, West Kalimantan (Borneo) have received your fullest support during the last 10 years. By God's grace and mercies, our work here is beginning to take shape. The day of learning self-support, self-government and self-propagation is dawning. We are deeply grateful to your Session and congregation for help and encouragement these many years. May the Lord richly reward your members many times over by His richest mercies, which is our epistolary good wishes."

Ed. Note: "Learning self-support, etc., by West Kalimantan" (the first of our ½ dozen fields in ASEAN) begins April 1988. This means release of funds for further extension of His Kingdom wherever God will lead us. "And this gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come" (Matt 24:14).

Learning to Pray More in 1988

Rev Tan Peng Koen, 78, Promoted Into Glory


A staunch follower of Dr John Sung and Evangelist Lim Puay Hian, Rev Tan Peng Koen has been mightily used of God to found three churches in Indonesia--Palembang, Pematang Siantar and Tanjung Pinang.

After he retired from Palembang (South Sumatra) at the age of 65, he made a trip to North Sumatra via Tanjung Pinang. Here he found a thriving sea-port dominated by Chinese traders, but no Chinese Church. So, he decided to spend his evening years in Tanjung Pinang. He bought a piece of land overlooking the sea for a song (for it was "haunted"), only 10 minutes' walk from the city. Here he established a primary school and a Chinese service in 1967.

Life Church became linked with Tanjung Pinang when Rev Tan visited Singapore in Aug. 1973 at a time when we had launched an Indonesian Outreach Month. We became friends "by predestination," as the Chinese saying goes. Since 1973, the Life Church pastor has regularly ministered in Tg. Pinang, having baptised over 150 to date. Our Church has also donated a sum to help Tg. Pinang found a second church at Kijang on the other side of the island of Bintan. As for the main congregation at Tanjung Pinang, it has become a full-fledged self-supporting, self-governing church. The Church school has 500 in its enrolment. The congregration has built a new three-storey complex, housing the sanctuary and a top floor for Youth meetings and a campsite. Here, several of our Singapore youth groups have stayed at great profit both to themselves and the local congregation.

A decade ago, Rev & Mrs Tan Peng Koen decided to return to China. Rev Tan preached in the outlying islands of Taiwan and on the main Island itself.' Later they shifted to Hong Kong to stay with their eldest son. The Lord first took Mrs Tan a couple of years ago. Now Rev Tan is also received into glory (funeral on Jan 2, 1988 in Hong Kong). He is survived by his two daughters who carry on his good work at Tg. Pinang. One is a preacher and the other a teacher. The sons-in-law are equally devoted in the work of the Lord. Presently, Joseph Liu, husband of Esther Tan, is studying at FEBC. - T.T.

WHAT ARE YOUR PLANS FOR 1988?

(Pastor's Message broadcast by SBC, Lord's Day, Jan 10,'88, 6.30 pm) Text: "Go to now, ye that say, To day or to morrow we will go into such a city, and continue there a year, and buy and sell, and get gain: Whereas ye know not what shall be on the morrow. For what is your life? It is even a vapour, that appeareth for a little time, and then vanisheth away." (James 4:13,14)

There is a Chinese couplet which reads:

"Make your plans for the day in the morning,

And make your plans for the year in the spring."

As we face 1988 this second Sunday of January, what plans have you made for the new year? What new year resolutions and what great achievements are in your new blue-print? Where are you going to extend your business or go for higher studies this 1988? Is your answer: "The sky's the limit"? Whether young or old, it seems to me, we forget we are little creatures encapsuled in the prison of space and time.

The Bible says, "Go to now, ye that say, To day or to morrow we will go into such a city, and continue there a year, and buy and sell, and get gain: Whereas ye know not what shall be on the morrow. For what is your life? It is even a vapour that appeareth for a little time, and then vanisheth away" (James 4:13,14). Echoing this Divine pronouncement, there comes to mind another Chinese saying, "Ren Sheng Jiao Lu," which means, "Man's life is dew." Yes, dew in the morning sun soon becomes vapour as the wet ground dries up in the morning sun.

Listen to the words of King Solomon, the wisest man that ever lived. He says, "Vanity of vanities, saith the Preacher, vanity of vanities; all is vanity. What profit hath a man of all his labour which he taketh under the sun? One generation passeth away, and another generation cometh: but the earth abideth for ever" (Eccles. 1:2-4). King David, the father of Solomon and the greatest of kings, sees life in truest perspective. In the light of eternity, he sighs, "As for man, his days are as grass: as a flower of the field, so he flourished. For the wind passeth over it, and it is gone; and the place thereof shall know it no more." How old are you in 1988? I am still young and strong despite my age, so you say. Before the eternal God Almighty, there is no difference, whether you are seventeen or seventy. For time is as relentless as the MRT trains. Whether we stand at the head of a queue or at the very end, train after train rolls on, and in a matter of minutes we are all whisked away. Soon, and sooner than you think, we must leave Earth's station!

Where will the train of time take you? King Solomon says, "There is a way which seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death" (Prov. 14:12). Some desperate people, like the drug traffickers, or the wild speculators, who only think of making a fast buck, who want money and not life, say to themselves, "If the worst comes to worst, we can escape by suicide." They think they can cheat even in death: like the woman suspect with a false Japanese passport who took cyanide, but is now extradited from Bahrain to Seoul for the probable bombing of the Korean airliner over Burma. Are you also scheming in this frame of mind? Morality today is like a door mat trampled under foot.

Listen! The Bible says, "It is appointed unto men once to die, and after this the judgment" (Heb. 9:27). Jesus says, "And if thy hand offend thee, cut if off: it is better for thee to enter into life maimed, than having two hands to go into hell, into the fire that never shall be quenched . . . And if thy foot offend thee, cut it off: it is better for thee to enter halt into life, than having two feet to be cast into hell, into the fire that never shall be quenched" (Mark 9:43,45). These are solemn words from the mouth of the Son of God.

To know, dear listener, whether you will enter heaven or hell in the next life, is the supreme decision on the long term you must make at the threshold of the new year. Don't procrastinate! Don't say, when I'm about to die, then I'll call on Jesus. It will be too late then! Jesus says, "I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life, no man cometh unto the Father, but by Me." If you come to Him right now, as you solemnly say yes to Him wherever you are, at home or in hospital, or whether you are listening to your car radio or from some hotel room, He will receive you and make you a new person in the flash of a split second. No matter how crimson your sin and miserable your conscience, He can save you now.

> Come, every soul by sin oppressed, There's mercy with the Lord, And He will surely give you rest By trusting in His Word. Only trust Him, only trust Him, only trust Him now; He will save you, He will save you, He will save you now.

For your short term plan, that is, for the short span of your working life, the Bible says again, "For that ye ought to say, If the Lord will, we shall live, and do this or that (James 4:15). Whatever plan you have made for 1988, now that you are a Christian you will not think you have the final say. Nor is consultation with your wife, or mother, or girlfriend, any added assurance. Your decision is in God! Do you pray to the Lord? Do you have a peaceful heart in the direction you are heading? Is what you are embarking on according to the Word of God?

Perhaps God is calling you into fulltime service. But you have been putting Him off, year after year. 1988 may be the crucial year when you must answer to the Son of God: "Follow Me, and I will make you fishers of men" (Matt. 4:19). And, if you are too affluent, then hear what He says to the rich young ruler: "If thou wilt be perfect, go and sell that thou hast, and give to the poor, and thou shalt have treasures in heaven: and come and follow Me" (Matt. 19:21). Here are the words of an Indian prince who responded to God's call in music:

Whatever plan, long term or short term, you are making for 1988, know that you are but a vapour, like dew in the morning sun. For what is your life? It appears but for a little time and then vanisheth away! Moreover, Jesus says, "For what shall it profit a man if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul?" (Mk. 8:36). Amen.

ANOTHER TAMIL SERVICE INAUGURATED

For the last 8 months Preacher Mani of New Life has been supported by our Church to run a Children's Meeting at the Oil Palm Estate at Layang², a railway town 50 miles north of Singapore. In the course of this outreach, Mani has discovered five Christian families, who rarely attend church. The devout among them manage to worship at Kluang, 25 miles north, once a month. Being burdened for these unchurched families, Mani made this New Year resolution--to start a Tamil service for Layang².

Now, it happens there is a handsome brick church, Anglican style with stained glass windows, built 30 years ago by the European planters, now repatriated. Mr Sekaran, and Estate officer and a convert of Rev Goh Seng Fong, holds the key to this brick church. What better place to start the Tamil service?

Friday Jan 8, two carloads of FEBC students headed by the principal arrived promptly at 5 pm for the Inauguration. With Tamil Christians coming in from Ulu Tiram in a minibus, we had about 45 seated in the deep European pews. The principal preached from Luke 4:25,26, pointing out the analogy between Layang² and Elijah's Zarepheth. Another Tamil Service in our extension of God's Kingdom in Malaysia!

An Eye-witness Report on the North American Congress on the Holy Spirit and World Evangelisation July 22-26, 1987, New Orleans, Louisiana, USA By David W. Cloud in "O Timothy!"

III

THE OPENING EVENING OF THE CONGRESS

The first night, Wed. July 22, Vinson Synan was introduced by Roman Catholic layman Kevin M. Ranaghan, chairman of the 1977 Kansas City Conference. They hugged, and Ranaghan said, "Isn't it a wonderful thing for a Catholic to introduce a pentecostal!" They then hugged again. Ranaghan said Synan has brought together 32-35 streams of Christianity. Synan said there "are 242 million Christians baptised in the Holy Ghost . . . There is a call to bring Jesus Christ to all nations of the world in our time . . . The vision God has given is to give Jesus a gift of the majority of the world as Christians . . we're praying this Superdome will be a new upper room so the day will come when the knowledge of the Lord will cover the earth as water covers the seas."

That night Billy Graham sent greetings and blessings to the Congress via a video clip which was introduced with much fanfare and shown on the two large screens in the Superdome. A press release gave the text of Graham's address:

"Greetings in the name of the Lord! I would love to be with you today in your great conference. But I am unable to do so because we are involved in a crusade here in Denver, Colorado, which involves really the whole state of Colorado. I rejoice with you at the goals of your North American Congress on the Holy Spirit and World Evangelisation. And I thank God for the vital role that your movement is having in bringing about a spiritual awakening in this country. Today it is encouraging to see the Holy Spirit moving in His church across North America and in other parts of the world toward the goal of bringing others to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ. My prayers are with you that your congress will be greatly blessed of God and used by the Holy Spirit to further the Good News of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. May God bless you all!!!!" (Press release)

Note that Billy Graham's blessing was upon this conference and all of the strange, unscriptural things that went on there.

After watching and hearing Graham's video clip, Catholic Ranaghan led the conference in a prayer for Graham's crusade going on in Colorado. Ranaghan spoke in "tongues" as he led the prayer for Graham's conference over the Superdome PA system, and the huge Superdome was filled with the strange sound of thousands praying in tongues, the first time that would happen during the conference, but certainly not the last!

Graham's open approval of the conference was very pleasing to the conference leaders. Synan referred to Graham's message during the Sat. afternoon press conference, saying, "Billy Graham's office said he wanted to come just to be refreshed. We feel that is a breakthrough."

By the way, we learned that the Pope was behind the meeting as well. Tom Forrest, the speaker for the closing General Session, said that John Paul II was behind the conference wholeheartedly. Forrest should know since his offices are in Rome across from the Vatican and he is the head of Evangelisation 2000 and works directly under the Pope's supervision. Holy Shouting

Bob Weiner, who also led the Youth Explosion '87, said that a prophecy in 1979 indicated that "more people are going to be saved in the 1980s than all the people saved in the history of the world." This was one of the many indications of the confidence charismatics are placing in prophecies and continuing revelations. He led the crowd in an amazingly confusing time of "holy shouting" which he said would "bring holiness, healing, forgiveness." Thus the auditorium of the immense Superdome was filled for a few moments with 35,000 voices lifted in "holy shouting." It could only be described as mass confusion, yet the Bible says God is not the author of confusion, but of peace (1 Cor. 14:33).

Weiner also said, "We are going to be changed and be a part of the body of Christ without spot or wrinkle. . . The Holy Ghost is coming upon us tonight that through that holiness, that power of the Spirit. we WILL evangelise the world."

holiness, that power of the Spirit, we WILL evangelise the world." This statement by Weiner about those at this conference being the body of Christ, the people of God, Christian saints, etc., set the stage for the attitude which would be taken by all the speakers. It was taken for granted that the Congress registrants were the people of God, in spite of the fact that at least 50% were Roman Catholic and a large percentage of the others were from a sacramental-type background whereby salvation is supposedly achieved through a PROCESS, beginning at baptism and being maintained or nurtured through the sacraments of the church.

Statements were made such as "You" are sons of God, daughters of God, children of the King" (Carl Richardson). "Let's exercise our authority as a priesthood of believers to pray for these leaders" (Richardson). The prophecies also were spoken as if those present were saved. One illustrates the tone of all of them: "My children, ten years ago I brought you together . . . above all I brought you together to be one." You can see that all were

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treated as born again people, as children of God. This assumption on the part of the speakers and Congress leaders that those present were saved people became confusing, to say the least, when on Friday night at least half of the people stood, indicating they wanted to be saved! We will say more about this.

One of the singers for the first evening, a fourth generation pentecostal, said, "Thank you for opening your spirits up to us." This is one of the serious errors of the charismatic movement. God warns against spiritual deception and therefore commands, "be sober," "be soberminded." This command which is repeated often in the N. Testament is a command to be in full control of one's mind, to be on guard at all times. Those who release control of their minds and facilities are opening themselves to spiritual delusions and are disobeying God. One of the key teachings of the charismatic movement is that in order to receive the baptism of the Holy Spirit and the experience of tongues, the individual must release control of his mind and tongue, to "let go and let God." This is clearly contrary to the warning and command of God.

Dorothy Ranaghan

Dorothy Ranaghan, a Roman Catholic, also spoke Wed. evening. She said that she hopes to lead her children "to the fullness of salvation." Note the Catholic idea of growing into salvation, of salvation as a process. This was taught and implied often during the Congress and openly promoted in many of the books which were for sale. In those books salvation was called a "process," "a continual redemption," "an adherence to a program of life." Let me quote from a booklet that I purchased at the official conference sales area:

"This kingdom and this salvation . . . are available to every human being as grace and mercy, and yet at the same time each individual must gain them . . . through toil and suffering, through a life lived according to the Gospel, through abnegation and the cross, through the spirit of the beautitudes" (Pope John Paul VI, ON EVANGELISATION IN THE MODERN WORLD, a message given in Rome, Dec. 8, 1975, pg. 6-7)

This is blasphemously wrong. The Christian does not grow into salvation or earn salvation through faithfully holding out in the sacraments and good service, as the Roman Catholic Church teaches. We have full, eternal, secure salvation the very moment we place our faith upon the Lord Jesus Christ and His Atonement on the Cross of Calvary. More is said about this in the article, "Cursed Additions."

Mrs Ranaghan referred to Francis Xavier as a great example of evangelistic zeal and selfsacrifice, and told how that he knew the Japanese would require that he live a holy life. She said, "He agonised because of the lack of holiness in the lives of Christians of the l6th century." Those who know the real history of Xavier know that he was a traditional Catholic missionary who preached the cursed false sacramental gospel of Rome and who crossed the seas to make converts who would become two-fold the children of hell than he, as Jesus said to the Pharisees of His day (Matt. 6). Ranaghan also challenged the 35,000 charismatics that "we need to touch up our halos," then explained about halos in Roman Catholic iconology (idolatry) and spoke reverently of Catholic "saints." This is the first in what would become a steady stream of traditional Catholic error which was promoted at the conference. Apostate Catholic teaching was everywhere. It was in the bookstores, in the workshops such as the one on "Mary and Pentecost," it was in the Catholic masses which were held in the main floor of the Superdome each morning, it was in the General Sessions in the evening, concluding with the final message being delivered by a Roman Catholic leader, Tom Forrest, whose offices are in Rome across from the Vatican.

MORNING MASS IN THE SUPERDOME

More than half of the conference attendees were present for the RC mass which was held each morning of the congress from Thursday until Sunday in the Superdome. It began with charismatic renewal music--contemporary folk and rock, then three priests walked in, one holding a Bible over his head and another with his hands held high in the air. The session leader of one mass we observed was Hal Cohen and the officiating priest, Dennis Phaneuf. Cohen began by lifting his hands, then spoke of the saving waters and renewing of baptism. He said, "Let us praise God through the eucharist," then babbled in "tongues" and sang "glory to Jesus." The crowd then sang "Lord, pour on us the Spirit of the Lord."

The homily was delivered in a fairly dynamic way. Phaneuf said, "We would be amazed to see how much we agree on our faith and on our reality." He cleverly and deceptively referred to E. V. Hill's statement the night before on position vs. condition, and said, "We are called to holiness, not to gain God's love, but because he has covered us by his That sounded good and true, but the sad fact is that he was saying this right blood." before the abominable mass in which he would claim to consecrate the bread and wine so that it would actually become Jesus Christ, and he, the Catholic priest, would then resacrifice Christ upon the Roman altar and the people would then receive Jesus afresh. Thus the Roman Catholics believe they receive Him when they are baptised, then again when they are confirmed, then daily as they receive the mass and other Catholic sacraments. Thus when Phaneuf said that Catholics are covered by Christ's blood, he did not mean that the Catholic can know and rejoice in the fact that he has eternal salvation and security in Christ, but that the Catholic is covered by Christ's blood as long as he continues faithful in the sacrament's of his church. There was a great deal of open deception at this conference, especially on the part of the Catholic leaders. They would use Bible terminology and leave their listeners with the idea that they believed sound Bible truth, whereas they were merely taking terms familiar with Pentecostals and evangelicals and inserting into those terms their own heretical beliefs.

If you don't believe this, please write to us for the study, "Has the Catholic Church Changed," a study of the Vatican II documents--documents which were on sale at the congress in New Orleans, by the way. We also refer you to the quotes from the book that we purchased at the conference, which was edited by Tom Forrest, the head of the Catholic Evangelisation 2000 and the keynote speaker the last night of the conference. These quotes are printed in this issue of <u>O Timothy</u> in the article, "Quotes From a Book Edited by the Head of Evangelisation 2000 and a Main Speaker at New Orleans '87." The Roman Catholic church has not turned from its error, and the charismatic Catholics continue to believe those errors.

The priest giving the homily prior to the mass then preached on four areas of holiness: 1) Honesty, 2) Chastity, 3) Love, and 4) Whole value in the religion of our Lord. In this last point he was speaking of having a balance, of courage and meekness, etc. He said we should look to the saints such as Bernadette, St. Theresa. Then, setting the tone for the overwhelming Mariolatry which was promoted at New Orleans '87, the priest said, "The greatest model is Mary." He concluded by saying, "As we seek to evangelise the world as one Christian body, we must remember God has called us to holiness."

The reference to "one Christian body" is highly significant. The Bible never speaks of one Christian body composed of true Christians and false Christians, of false churches and true, of apostate denominations. Of course, the "one body" this priest was speaking of is none other than the Roman Catholic church itself. It still claims to be the fullness of the body of Christ, and even though non-Catholics are now accepted as separated brethren, note that they are indeed "separated" brethren. Separated from what? Separated from the one true Christian body, the Roman Catholic Church, to which they must be rejoined if they are to experience the fullness of life with Christ. The call still goes out for non-Catholics to be joined to the "head of the church." Christ? No, the pope of Rome, the Vicar of Christ!

The mass was traditional except for the contemporary musical interludes, the tongues and the prophecies. The priest held up a large host and proclaimed, "This is the body of the Lord," then a cup of red wine, saying, "the blood of our Lord." Priests then marched to positions around the Superdome and stationed themselves with the consecrated hosts and distributed them to the people as they were guided from the chairs row by row by the ushers. The priest near us was saying as he handed the host to the people, "The body of Christ; the body of Christ; the body of Christ." During a lull in the line, I asked him if that wafer is the body of Christ. He answered, "Yes, this is the body and blood of cur Lord." Meanwhile, the other priests were drinking of a yellow, strongly alcoholic wine from cups which had been filled from a pitcher. After and during the mass, prophecies were given. The first was by a woman; the second by a man. The man said,

"You have my real body; you have my real blood Come out of your castles . . . My people, will you open up to me so . . I can place within you a steadfast spirit, spiritual life, love, holiness? My beloved, will you answer my call? . . . for I am here and I am waiting."

Was Jesus Christ really prophesied through this Roman Catholic? Through that prophecy, was Jesus actually confirming that the wafers and wine which were being consecrated by the Roman priest were truly His real body and real blood? No, it was false blasphemy: in fact, I experienced "chillbumps." It was frightening to listen to something so obviously of the devil. Much of the charismatic experience is merely a working of the flesh, but something so blasphemous as this was nothing less than demonic.

As the priests were gathering the unused hosts, I asked one what they would do with them. He said they would put them "locked and sealed" in a "tabernacle" of a RC church in the city and later they will be distributed to hospitals and to those who cannot get Of course, according to Catholic theology, each of those consecrated wafers was out. Jesus Christ himself, and Catholics kneel before the tabernacles in their buildings which contain the wafers, and pray to them as if they are Jesus. They pray to the wafers, confess sins to the wafers, worship the wafers, and oftentimes carry the wafers in processions, just as the heathen carry around their idols in the little temples. This is gross and foolish idolatry. The mass was closed by having the people stand and sing "Crown Him with Many Crowns." How deceptive to close such a blasphemous and unscriptural event by such a blessed hymn. The entire experience left me emotionally saddened, physically sickened and spiritually drained.

I hope our readers see the significance of the Roman Catholic mass at the centre of a massive charismatic meeting. There is nothing in the world of Christendom more blasphemous and false than the Catholic mass. And for 150 of the most popular charismatic leaders and 35,000 charismatic Christians to accept the mass, allowing it to be performed in their midst, is incontrovertible evidence of the apostasy of the charismatic movement itself. As we will mention later in the report, Pentecostal Congress Chairman Vinson Synan invited the people to attend the Sunday morning mass and said it was a most beautiful experience. It is time for Christians to awake out of their sleep and see the charismatic movement for what it is -- a way of error which is leading deeper and deeper into (to be continued) apostasy and ever nearer to Rome, the very seat of apostasy.




By a providential timing of the Lord, pastoral duty called me south last week--to solemnise the marriage of the eldest son of a Deacon of Tanjung Pinang Presbyterian Church. This gave me the golden opportunity to prepare the groundwork for our coming Family Camp. In view of the fact that over 100 of us will be converging on this Islands Emporium, and on a Church we have ministered unto the last 15 years, we have therefore chosen "Missions" to be the theme of our Camp.

Apart from three full days of theological instruction (the Five Points of Calvinism), we shall study missions history and hold three nights of Gospel meetings for the people of this Big Island. The first night will be at Kijang, 30 km east of Tg Pinang on the South China Sea. Here Hakka would be the medium of preaching. Two nights at Tg Pinang will be in English translated into Indonesian. Through these close contacts with the Teochew clans, we hope our members will henceforth be more committed to spreading the Gospel. "And this gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness

unto all nations; and then shall the end come" (Matt 24:14). For accommodations we have booked the best hotel in town, built only 3 years ago. Sampurna Jaya Hotel stands tall on a hill slope overlooking the palm-fringed seas. It has 77 rooms to take in all of us. It offers all the facilities that our S'pore hotels provide. It is 8 minutes by walking to our meeting place at the Church. As it is fully air-conditioned, there should not be any mosquitoes to bother you. For our transportation

between S'pore and Tg Pinang, the same Deacon who got me to marry his eldest son will ferry us to and fro by charter (the sea is smooth in March). For four full days and three nights, inclusive of transport and all meals, the rates are \$225 for single occupancy, \$190 double, and \$165 triple. Children between 3 and 12, \$120. "Mura dan baik" ever is Life Church's motto. Book early with the Office to avoid disappointment! Passports must have 6 month validity. Closing date: Feb. 9.

As we waited on the Lord, we became persuaded that He would want us "to go south"--to Tanjung This new direction was confirmed by Pinang! the unanimous decision of Session to proceed

JOHN 3:16, Hyper-Calvinists and Calvin Pure and Simple

"For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life" (John 3:16).

This most famous verse in the Bible is now being taught by a group of Calvinists to offer salvation only to the elect, and not generally to all. The door to heaven is one leaf shut by man!

But does Calvin himself teach such a narrow view? In his commentary on John 3:16 where it touches "that whosoever believeth in him should not perish," Calvin says, "And He [Jesus] has used a general term, both to invite indiscriminately all to share in life and to cut off every excuse from unbelievers. Such is also the significance of the term 'world' which He used before. For although there is nothing in the world deserving of God's favour, He nevertheless shows He is favourable to the whole world when He calls all without exception to the faith of Christ, which is indeed an entry into life."

To put it in a nutshell, though the offer is accepted effectively by the elect, it is nevertheless sufficiently offered to all mankind. This is the Calvinist interpretation, and the true one at that.

In the light of the said misinterpretation of Jn 3:16 by so-called Calvinists, here are the remarks by Dr J.C. Maris in his Foreword to my Abridgment of Calvin's Institutes of the Christian Religion: "Calvinism is often misrepresented, not only by its opponents but also by those who are accounted its adherents. While the latter draw conclusions that are alien to the Reformers' teaching, the former tend to make a carricature of his thoughts. Consequently the rank and file of Protestant Christians are lacking a clear insight of what the system represents . . . "

One reason why sons of the Presbyterian Faith, which stems from Calvin's teaching, do not know their spiritual fathers' doctrine is they have not read his profuse writings. To make his teaching readily available to the layman, I have abridged thus far half of his massive Four Books. One hundred and twenty copies of this Abridgment are offered free to our worshippers today at the Church counters--first come, first served! - T.T.

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Testimony of Miss Casilda Britto of Medan, Indonesia

This is my testimony of how I came to Christ. My name is Casilda Britto. My parents gave me a perfect Catholic upbringing and education. Since childhood, my father saw to it the kind of career I should follow, especially in learning piano and playing the organ for the second Mass every Sunday morning. Later on he insisted that I also teach the Church Choir members choral music once or twice a week. He reminded me that duty to God is first in my life and all other assets can follow later. This I volunteered for over 35 years, but I never felt happiness as a Catholic. I never did understand anything regarding the Gospel. Everytime I asked my priest to explain a little of the Gospel to me, he would say, "Oh, I am very busy, and I have to attend to this or that." Since then I gave up asking and I went to church for the one-hour duty to please my father.

In 1952, I became seriously ill and I was sent to hospital, but the Dutch doctors said there was no cure and sent me back home. This made my parents very upset and sad. I was locked up in a room as I was unable to see light, people, water, etc. In a minute I would cry, then suddenly laugh, and then scream until my parents' friends brought dukuns, one after another, to cure me. Year after year I continued to be ill. I was getting from bad to worse. People even took me to the Chinese Temples. They gave me strips of yellow and red paper which after burning I had to drink. Soon it became obvious to me that it was the work of the devil.

After 27 or 28 years of going through this kind of life, I got fed-up. I went then to the confessional at the Church and confessed all my sins to the priest. I promised to drop off all my sinful habits of going here and there to people for help. Since then, I started getting a lot of problems, one after another, never ending. In spite of that, I started fervently praying the Lord's prayer and all prayers written in the Catholic prayer books, and making novenas to Mary, to the saints, and reciting rosaries most of my precious time. I even spent all my money in order to have my house painted and cleaned in and out so that the disturbances would come to an end. Nevertheless, I never found any happiness in doing all that. I was more dead than alive. One thing that made me wonder was the fact that my father, before he passed away, said the Catholic religion was wrong, and admired Martin Luther for his protest against the pope and the great Catholic religion of that time. Maybe my father wanted me to see for myself the truth in this.

I carried on to be a Catholic though the message of the Bible was never revealed to me. I was really desperate. Everything I did went wrong. I knew in my heart that God must have been very angry with me for not obeying His commands. I bought many crosses and fixed them in front of every door and pictures of Mary on every window. I thought by doing so disturbances would not come, but on the contrary, snakes, scorpians, leeches, mice and insects started entering my sleeping room in the form of cigerette smoke.

I started calling people from the prayer group to pray in our house. At last God showed the way. Mr Dohar came and told me frankly to remove all the crosses, pictures, prayer books, etc. I did it, then he started reading passages of the Bible and also gave me testimony of how Christ saved his life. Then immediately, I asked him which church he belonged to, for I wanted to be of the same religion. Then through 9 Americans, all of different churches, who testified to me, I received Jesus Christ as my personal Lord and Saviour on July 29, 1987. Whilst reading the passages of the prayers, tears flowed and I felt really sorry for all the stupidity of my past. Slowly but surely I felt some inner changes taking place. I felt a new born person in me, so happy and impossible to describe. Nothing else mattered to me, for I had at last found what I had been searching for. Many blessings came flowing to me day after day in various ways.

On the 8th of August I had only 500 rupiahs with me and my sister asked me, "What shall we eat tomorrow?" I told her, "Don't worry, I am sure Jesus will see to it. We won't be stranded." Half an hour later, the Singapore Consul came and said that he could offer me forty thousand Rupiahs for a musical performance. The Malaysian Consul was presentand he too was pleased with the music, so he asked me to play for the Malaysian National Day and he would give me seventy-five thousand Rupiahs.

There are many more examples of how God helped me, as when I was going back to Medan and how much trouble I went through until the aeroplane that left turned back to fetch me. Here in Singapore this incident happened. My friend who was watching this incident then wrote to me asking, "How is it possible that a plane comes back to fetch you? You must be somebody great." I replied to him that it was God's will.

I am truly grateful to Mr Dohar Siregar for introducing to this new belief in the Bible-Presbyterian Church, and that I am now here to meet the ones of whom he had highly spoken, Rev Timothy Tow and all the others.

I trust that my humble testimony will encourage each and every reader to want eagerly to be saved in Jesus Christ. Amen. Dated 27th January 1988 (Miss Britto's address is 2-B Jalan Keladi Dalam, Medan-Baru, Sumatra, Indonesia.)

ON "LIMITED (PARTICULAR) ATONEMENT"

The doctrine of "Limited (Particular) Atonement" is based on Augustine's "Sufficient for All, Efficient for the Elect."

Buswell says, "There is no question among those who adhere to the Calvinistic system of doctrine as to the fact that the atonement of Christ is universal in three respects: (1) It is sufficient for all. It is absolutely infinite in its value and thus in its potentiality . . . (2) The atonement is applicable to all. (3) It is offered to all . . . On these three points of the universality of the atonement, there is no essential difference between the evangelical Arminian and the true Calvinist. (4) The atonement is particular in its ultimate results. (5) The atonement is particular in its design and intention.

"There is a special sense in which Christ is the Mediator for His elect, and not for all. He said, "I pray for them; I do not pray for the world, but for those whom thou hast given me, because they are Thine" (John 17:9). Within the decrees of God, the atonement was intended to accomplish precisely what it does accomplish. It accomplishes the salvation of the elect of God; it furnishes ethical and logical ground for common grace (Rom 3:25) and it renders the lost ethically and logically inexcusable (Rom 1:20)

Buswell concludes, "God has chosen a people in Christ, from before the foundation of the world. He has provided in Christ for the certainty of their salvation, and for their progress in grace. He has made to all men the universal offer of salvation by faith in Christ. If, therefore, you will put your faith and confidence in Christ as your personal Saviour, you can know with infallible assurance of the Word of God that you are one of the elect. 'Presume on the veracity of God'." (Buswell's position is the Editor's position who studied under him.) -- Summarised from Buswell's <u>Systematic Theology Vol. II</u>, p. 141-144).

II Peter 3:9, Hyper-Calvinists, Calvin Pure and Simple

The same brother who argued that John 3:16 offers salvation only to the elect also plugged into II Pet 3:9 to limit his God. But Calvin, Pure and Simple, comments on "not willing that any should perish" as follows:-

"This is His wondrous love towards the human race, that He desires all men to be saved, and is prepared to bring even the perishing to safety. We must notice the order, that God is prepared to receive all men into repentance, so that none may perish. These words indicate the means of obtaining salvation, and whoever of us seeks salvation must learn to follow His way.

"It could be asked here, if God does not want any to perish, why do so many in fact perish? My reply is that no mention is made here of the secret decree of God of which the wicked are doomed to their own ruin, but only His lovingkindness as it is made known to us in the Gospel. There God stretches out His Hand to all alike, but He only grasps those (in such a way as to lead to Himself) whom He has chosen before the foundation of the world." (p. 364, A New Translation by W.B. Johnston, etc., Eerdmans Publ. Co., Grand Rapids, Michigan).

Now, let us give a helping hand to those bogged down in Hyper-Calvinism. If they can differentiate between the <u>Desiderative Will</u> and the <u>Decretive Will</u> of God, they will be elect Calvinists, pure and simple. The offer of salvation is made to all by a God who "desires all men to be saved," though "no mention is made here of the secret decree of God by which the wicked are doomed to their own ruin" (Calvin). Perhaps, we'll offer another 40 copies of Calvin's Abridged, at the Counter. We hope everyone who takes a copy is also elect!

Hyper-Calvinism ends up Neither-in-Evangelism



So when William Carey, "Father of Modern Missions," presented his ideas to a group of ministers, one of them retorted: "Young man, sit down. When God pleases to convert the heathen, He will do it without your aid or mine." Hyper-Calvinists' way of evangelism, that sit-down type, may be likened to fishing by <u>kelong</u> (for our foreign readers, a <u>kelong</u> is a fish trap set in the sea with the fisherman's

quarters sitting on top of it). I presume only the elect fishes will enter the kelong. But I am persuaded there is fishing by ocean trawlers, and by many other ways of going out for the elect! "Hyper-Calvinism ends up Neither-in Evangelism."



THE STORY OF REV. TAN PENG KOEN, PASTOR AND PIONEER, INDONESIA Text: "Remember them which have the rule over you, who have spoken unto you the word of God; whose faith follow, considering the end of their conversation." (Hebrews 13:7)



Rev Tan Peng Koen was a young Presbyterian minister of the Amoy (Xiamen) District in South China when he came under the mighty influence of the John Sung and Lim Puay Hian Revival in the mid-thirties.

In 1940 he received a call from the Methodist Church to pioneer a mission to the many Chinese who had settled at Pematang Siantar, Medan, North Sumatra. He sailed southwards before the outbreak of the Pacific War, with a growing family, to his new post. He rented a house which became both his dwelling as well as a worship centre. He began with two adults joining him. After nine years he had built two churches and established a primary school.

From North Sumatra, he was called to Palembang in the South to minister to a group of Chinese Christians, but they had no Church building nor parsonage. So, he was obliged to lodge in a Christian's warehouse which was used as a storage for his father's coffin. Here he stayed with his family for two

to three years before they were enabled to buy a wooden house. This new property served as their quarters as well as premises for a kindergarten. After this a primary school was added. From there he acquired a piece of land situated opposite his kindergarten and primary school. Here he built a church which could seat a thousand. He invited Evangelist Lim Puay Hian to hold revival meetings in the new church on several occasions. He laboured in this Church and school complex until 1957 when he received a call to return to the work he had pioneered and to the first flock he had gathered at Pematang Siantar. Here he laboured on until he reached retirement age.

Though he was retired by the Methodist Church, he was still full of vigour to serve the Lord. He ventured out to explore a new field and came upon Tanjung Pinang in the Riau Islands. Here he found a large Chinese population without a Church, groping in darkness and superstition. Every home had enshrined an idol or idols. He discovered also several Christians scattered about, like sheep without a shepherd. This moved him to leave his Siantar base to start a Chinese Church at Tanjung Pinang on the third Lord's Day of August 1967. He held that first service on the borrowed premises of an old Dutch Church in town, now called G.P.I.B., the Protestant Church of Western Indonesia. This old Dutch Church was bequeathed to the Indonesians when the Dutch left. For three years he laboured at the old Dutch Church before he acquired the present site at Jalan Bakar Batu, an half-acre plot beautifully situated on a hillslope overlooking the sea. This new property had on it an old dilapidated brick house which he acquired for a song, because it was "haunted." He built on what was left of the half broken-down brick superstructure a wooden upper storey for his family, while services were held downstairs. Then he built a primary school with wooden planks and zinc roof. One of the classrooms became a more proper place for worship. Rev Tan had all along founded his church on the young souls he saved through Christian education. The Church at Tanjung Pinang he named the Zion Presbyterian Church in Indonesia, because he was a Presbyterian minister from the beginning.

In August 1973, he came to Singapore on a visit. At Chin Lien Bible School he met Pastor Timothy Tow for the first time like an old friend. As Life Bible-Presbyterian Church was then holding an Indonesian Missions Month, it was felt such a meeting between Singapore and Indonesia was no chance acquaintance, but was planned of the Lord. When Rev Tan Peng Koen returned to Tanjung Pinang after his short stay in Singapore, he was able to to persuade Rev Tow and Elder Joshua Lim, son of Evangelist Lim Puay Hian, to go with him. From that time onwards the Life Church pastor became moderating pastor to Tanjung Pinang, for Rev Tan, now ready to retire, had entrusted this work to his care. (Pastor Tow, being Teochew, speaks the language of the Tanjung Pinang Teochew community.)

Before Rev Tan retired, he invited Pastor Tow to view a piece of land, centrally located at Kijang, the Bauxite Town 30 km on the eastern coast of Tanjung Pinang. As a result, Life Church provided \$2,500 to acquire this property which is now under trust of the main Church. At Kijang is now also built a church seating 100 at a side street of the town proper. This Church, which is Indonesian and Hakka-speaking, also had its roots in Rev Tan the founding pastor.

Rev Tan retired in September 1974 to Taiwan, but being zealous for the Lord he continued to preach to the native people there who spoke the same Amoy dialect as he. He spent a good deal of time evangelisng the outlying islands, as a missionary in reverse! After some years, he finally moved to Hong Kong where he and his wife stayed with their eldest son until their homecall in 1986 and 1987, Mrs Tan leaving a year or so ahead of him.

During the decade after their retirement, the Church at Tanjung Pinang grew mightily. A two-storey brick school with eight classrooms rose over the old wooden structure and a three-storey sanctuary was added thereafter. The Church today runs a Christian Day School with an enrolment of 500. The Sunday School is about 300 strong. The Youth Fellowship numbers 100. Over 150 have been baptised into the Church.

The work has all along been carried on by Rev Tan's eldest daughter Esther, a graduate of Southeast Asia Bible College, Malang, Indonesia, assisted by her husband Mr Joseph Liu, now a student at Far Eastern Bible College. Another daughter Lydia is a teacher in the Christian Day School. An accomplished pianist, she ministers in music at all Church services. Her husband, Deacon Linus Lai, is a man of many talents and has contributed materially to the growth of the Church and School complex. Now Tanjung Pinang is setting her sights on Batam Island, in obedience to the Great Commission.

"The kingdom of heaven is like to a grain of mustard seed, which a man took, and sowed in his field: Which indeed is the least of all seeds: but when it is grown, it is the greatest among herbs, and becometh a tree, so that the birds of the air come and lodge in the branches thereof" (Matt 13:31,32). Today, as we tell this story to the memory of Rev & Mrs Tan Peng Koen, missionary pioneers from China to Indonesia in the days after John Sung, we are reminded that one generation of Chinese heroes of faith has passed on. "Remember them which have the rule over you, who have spoken unto you the word of God; whose faith follow, considering the end of their conversation" (Heb 13:7). Who will follow in their train? - T.T.



WEEK IN WESTERN AUSTRALIA

When we walked out of the Immigration and Customs in the wee hours of Tuesday morning (Feb 17), we were warmly welcomed by Robin Tan, Mark and Grace, Eng Lam and Shirleen. The party took us to the Hi Tor Apartments where we were comfortably settled. Now that we had set foot in Australia, we were able to speak to our various B-P "outposts" by phone. My brother sent greetings from Sydney; Bob his from Melbourne. Rev & Mrs Paauwe are re-



turned from their furlough and back at work in Adelaide. Peter Clements, apart from pastoral work, is teaching at a Bible School for Aboriginals. Anne his wife is due in April.

Locally, we were glad to renew fellowship with old-timers and establish links with a host of new ones. When we were here 14 months ago, Church attendance was 120. The week before our coming, it was 232. At the 2nd Anniversary Thanksgiving Service, Lord's Day Feb. 21, the count was 289. Prayer Meeting registered 30+, the Ladies Fellowship, 40, and the YF, 60. There was no S.S. except for

tiny tots, but the Open S.S. at which I spoke had well over 100 now!

We quote these statistics to reflect on a steady tide of immigrants flowing in from SE Asia. Several Filipino Chinese families and one from Indonesia have joined us, and about 10 white Australians have also "found the Church they had been looking for." Some of them are delivered from the tongues-speaking sects. The greater number of new-comers are students. In this respect, Ong Eng Lam has been instrumental in bringing them in. Also Say Kwee Neng of Nazareth BPC.

We thank God for Mark and Grace who are doing their best in the pastorate. Eng Lam and Shirleen play an important role in the S.S. and YF. Robin's wife heads the WF and Robin takes care of the running of the Church in every detail. Mrs Mary Low, an accountant, fits in perfectly as Treasurer. One person not to be forgotten is Mrs Sector, whose Macedonian call to Calvary sparked the birth of BPCWA.

Now, the BPCWA was born at Chinese New Year 1986. To commemorate this Anniversary, the Church has wisely organised a Chinese New Year dinner at a Chinese Restaurant at Onslow, a Perth suburb. One hundred and forty-five, big and small, with a good sprinkling of White Australians, ate the sumptous dinner. As a sizeable percentage were Chinese-speaking parents, the Message, based on the Hebrew Passover Feast (Exo 12:1-13), was interpreted by Mr Stephen Cheng into Cantonese. O how they need the Bread of Life, especially the Chinese-speaking!

The Church now has a bristling Library which is made up of the assistant pastor's own. Grace, who had taken up Library administration, fits in well as Librarian. Our books, such as "Gospel of Life," are on sale, or for giving away to new friends.

Rev Charlie Tan was here end of last year to speak at the Annual Church Camp. Praise the Lord, many souls were touched. Rev Bob Phee preached here also, en route to speak at Adelaide and to their assignment in Melbourne.

Our Church is situated at Mt. Pleasant on the strategic Canning Highway, 8 km from Perth. It is easily accessible also by bus. The bright signboard fronting the Highway has attracted a number of new worshippers, and more and more are coming in to fill up the 300 seats.

Seeing ahead the saturation point to be reached in a year's time, we made an extended survey of the northern suburbs of Perth, 20 km from Mt. Pleasant. This is with a view to starting a second Church to cater to several families presently settled in the north, as well as to an influx of immigrants, not a few of whom are Chinese. This will also help to relieve the mounting pressure at the main church.

From our calculations, there is no way out of this ever-pressing need to extend! We need to extend the sanctuary, the fellowship hall, and add a goodly number of rooms for the Sunday School. Believe me, the S.S. of this two year-old baby church is nearly a third the size of Life Church S.S.! So, we need not only rooms, but also teachers! Lifers and BPers, if you are migrating to Perth or going there for higher study, be sure to offer your services. As I reminded the Church, their settlement in Australia, in light of eternity, is a short-term policy if they want long-term prosperity in heaven.

Perth is one place Lifers have heavily invested in. Let us pray for BPCWA and let us give every support to their extension programme!





"ARISE, AND GO TOWARD THE SOUTH..." (Acts 8:26) (Reprinted from the "Far Eastern Beacon" Sep. '73 Issue)

Singaporeans, who live in a complacent world of their own, little realise that within rowing distance on their southern horizon there is spread a conglomeration of green islands known as the Riau Archipelago. Several of these islands are almost as large as Singapore while Pulau Bintan, the biggest of the group, is two-and-a-half times. Situated near the south-western end of this biggest island is Tanjung Pinang, the capital of Riau. Here is a thriving emporium and port of call for ships plying between North Sumatra and Djakarta. Four motor launches carrying 50 passengers each shuttle daily between Tanjung Pinang and Singapore.

Tanjung Pinang under Dutch rule did a brisk trade with Singapore, so much so that the currency

she used was the Singapore dollar. During the Japanese occupation, the Riau Archipelago was incorporated under Singapore's jurisdiction. Though Riau today is a part of independent Indonesia, the vestiges of Dutch rule and culture, including an old Dutch church in the centre of the capital, remain. Several tens of thousands of Chinese, mainly Teochews and Hokkiens, make up the backbone of Riau's economic life.

Although Christianity was brought here by the Dutch, Protestantism somehow did not reach down to the Chinese population. Indonesian churches there are quite a few, including those of Batak stock, but for the Chinese no permanent work here was established until five years ago! Rev Tan Peng Koen, a retired Methodist minister still in vigorous health, came to Tanjung Pinang from Sumatra on an exploratory visit. Finding no gospel witness and seeing the needs of the Chinese "in diaspora," he started a Sunday school. Since the lessons were taught in Chinese to the delight of the compatriots, the little beginning of three pupils grew to sixty in a matter of months. A Christian primary school grew out of the Sunday school which numbers over 300 today. And out of the Sunday school and Christian primary school has gathered a small congregation of 50. Sunday worship is held in one of the classrooms.

Tanjung Pinang has been visited recently by young people of the "Gospel Mission to Riau Islands." The gospel yacht "Ebenezer" has also called. The sailor-evangelist, a Finnish pentecostal pastor, has held gospel meetings in Rev Tan's school. Incidentally, Rev Tan, though a retired Methodist minister, has registered his church as the "Gereja Peresbeteryan di Indonesia" because of his Presbyterian stock and training:

Mid-August, Rev Tan visited Singapore with a view to linking the schools and churches he has founded in Sumatra with the Presbyterian Church in Singapore and Malaysia. The work he has begun in Riau, however, he now desires Bible-Presbyterian Missions to share a part. This call has come to us in the midst of our Missions Month at Life and Faith B-P Churches. We believe this to be a confirmation from the Lord of His approval.

Rev Tan has a plan to extend the Gospel to the eastern end of Pulau Bintan by building a second Christian school and church. The land has been acquired and the architect's plans drawn. What he needs now are men and materials. In order to assure us of his resoluteness in this new phase of the Lord's work, he invited the writer and Elder Joshua Lim, treasurer of B-P Missions, for a short visit. With this invitation we have complied, assuredly gathering that the Holy Spirit is opening a third Gospel door into Indonesia for us. This approbation from the Lord seemed further enhanced when the merchant through whom Rev Tan booked our tickets turned out to be a member of Life Church. Brother Yeo Boon Kwang, whom the writer baptised seven years ago, was so thrilled with this new outreach of our church that he offered to pay our passages and visa fees as his contribution to missions!

The trip by motor launch to Tanjung Pinang, 48 miles southeast of Singapore from Telok Ayer Basin, takes 4½ hours. Arriving there in the afternoon, we were given a cold bath first and then treated to a sumptuous meal of seafood, big prawns and crabs. Converts of the pioneer pastor, a Hokkien couple and a Teochew labourer, were invited to this fellowship, while Rev Tan's two daughters and a son-in-law, all in the Lord's work, served. The old Teochew man was recently converted with his family of ten (one other family who sends the children to Sunday school has 16 sons and daughters), and he himself had the household gods burnt. After dinner, we visited a Mr Chua, the leader of the Chinese community, to witness Christ to him, since we heard he was not far from the Kingdom of God.

The next day, early at seven, we took a chartered taxi to Kijang, a bauxite mining town on the east coast. Here is a purely Hakka settlement. We saw a fair-size piece of land beautifully and strategically situated, on which is designated the construction of the second Christian school and church. We returned from this new Gospel project far out on the South China Sea with a prayer for the conversion of "our kinsmen according to the flesh" (Rom 9:3). We thrilled at the thought that God had opened us a door that no man can shut into this neighbouring archipelago inhabited with countless Chinese villages, hitherto little touched by the light of the Gospel. We seemed to hear the same Spirit of Missions speaking to us in the words to Philip, "Arise, and go toward the south . . ." (Acts 9:26). - T.T.

PASTORAL CHAT

Tanjung Pinang Ahoy!

My heart is brimming with joy as over a hundred Lifers, old and young, English-speaking and Chinese-speaking, are bound for Tanjung Pinang! A year ago we had booked Port Dickson, but, as the Lord would have it, we are to "arise; and go to the south" 1.

This will be a delightful change to many. Instead of driving overland we shall experience riding the duck's back. You and your young ones, better still, aged parents, will have a taste of the briny sea. Oh, that refeshing spray onto your face as you brace against the deep! . . . I will not say more, but Dr John Davis, who visited Tanjung Pinang with me, and a sea-lover, would gladly come along this time if he were here.

All the comfort and recreation that we have planned is not only legitimate, but desirable in these days of rat-race. But what is more important as we head for Tanjung Pinang is the spiritual! Our utmost desire for this Family Bible Camp is that your hearts will be touched, you eyes opened, your zeal for the Gospel rekindled. If some are still unsaved, our prayer for you is: Do not defer receiving Christ into your heart any longer! "Behold, now is the accepted time" (II Cor 6:2). Let the whole Church pray for our Family Bible camp at Tanjung Pinang.

Giving for Eternity

Another blessing from the Lord that has warmed my heart is the sharp rise in designated offerings for the completion of the two half-finished Filipino Churches under Rev Dan Ebert. One of \$3,000 comes from a young man whose heart is daily attuned to the Return of our Saviour. He could have made more money, but his one desire now is to serve the Lord. This offering from so youthful a person is like Mary's "alabaster box of very precicus ointment" (Matt 26:7), for it is about all that he has. What a lesson to old-timers who hold down the sacred tenth to their loss, or if they give, it is not from the heart, but from the finger tips.

Yes, the Day of Judgment will soon be upon us. It can come any time! "For when they shall say, Peace and safety; then sudden destruction cometh upon them, as travail upon a woman with child; and they shall not escape" (I Thess 5:3). Reader, are you sure that when the Lord comes you'll be caught up to be with Him? Are you prepared to go any day? As I said at the BPCWA 2nd Anniversary in regard to their migration, "If you are here below on short-term policy, you will enjoy long-term prosperity up there. Vice-versa, if you are on a long-term policy below, you will be on short prosperity above. Let us trade with our talents wisely while on earth, making our transient wealth count for eternity.

The Missing Link in Missions - Singapore Style Keith Hinton wrote a book titled "Church Growth, Singapore Style." From him I derived a message titled as above for the inauguration of Grace (Gethsemane) BPC, Sat. March 5, 1988.

Grace Church, now under Rev Tan Eng Boo, was founded 1976 (Rev Patrick Tan). Alongside the English congregation has grown up a sturdy Chinese service. In 1981, Grace branched out to Changi to establish Shalom under Rev Tan Choon Seng. Today we see another offshoot, Gethsemane, worshipping at Duke's Hotel, Meyer Road, Katong Park, 10.30 am. Low Cheng Chye, an FEBC graduate, is staffworker.

The missing link in Missions, Singapore style, is the lack of emphasis on what I would call our Judean ministy. Jesus says, ". . . ye shall be my witnesses both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth" (Acts 1:8). Keith Hinton observes that too much money has been poured into mission trips abroad, achieving little result. I agree with him, and I would add this--at the expense of a Judean ministry. That is, establishing branch churches in Singapore's many untouched housing estates, and across the Causeway into Malaysia. We thank God for Grace's branching out to Changi (1981) and now to Katong Park (1988). Grace has an effective Judean ministry.

Grace is one of Life's offshoots. The latest offshoot from Lifer, insofar as S'pore is concerned, is Tabernacle at Tampines New Town (1987). As for Johore, across the Causeway, the Lord in the same year had opened us a door to J.B. (Word of Life Book Centre), Layang Layang (Tamil), and Muar (Elder Koa).



As we go to Tanjung Pinang, our sights are set on Batam, inasmuch as this "Pearl of Indonesian Development" catches our eyes within minutes of our sailing south. Roska, our graduating Indonesian student next month, a devout young lady from Medan, is available to pioneer an Indonesian work there. Please pray for her and for the Tanjung Pinang Church that has a similar burden for Batam. "Occupy till I come" (Luke 19:13).

Downunder, I've told you how the Perth Church is bursting at the seams. To relieve this congestion, we made a survey of North Perth, some 15 km from the main church. Robin reports having found a school that has kindly opened its doors, so a branch will be established at Padbury this Easter, Dr Tow Siang Hwa officiating. There's no missing link in Missions downunder! (Incidently, who would contribute 40 chairs to encourage them in their advance for the Lord? At A\$20 per chair.)





My dear Readers,

Celebrate While We May!

One blessing the Lord has showered upon the B-P Church is the Special Celebration we hold for JESUS every year at Easter. Since 1950, we have kept this Holy Tradition of remembering our Saviour--His royal entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, His Death (either on Maundy Thursday or Good Friday), His Resurrection, with the Sunrise Service at MacRitchie Reservoir, Easter Breakfast in Church, Baptisms, special singing items. Have you come to Church "Draw nigh this morning because of our Letter-reminder? to God and God will draw nigh to you" (James 4:8).

Celebrate while we may! For perilous times, as predicted by St. Paul, will come, and did they not come upon the Chinese Church under Mao's Cultural Revolution? (Remember to pray for Joshua Jamaludin and Dr Poh Boon Sing!) In all my 38 years with you, there was one Sunday when our Church Service at Prinsep Street was suspended because of political upheaval and rioting. Then did Lifers realise the goodness of public worship in Church. The next Sunday almost all came to Church!

Hear what the Psalmist says in Ps. 42. He is one of those most probably taken prisoner by the Assyrians. As he with countless others was forced out of his homeland and led away past the Hermon mountain (Ps. 42:6) northwards to the enemy country, he pined for the previous freedom of worship now snatched away from them. So he mused, "When I remember these things, I pour out my soul in me: for I had gone with the multitudes, I went with them to the house of God, with the voice of joy and praise, with a multitude that kept holyday" (Ps. 42:4). Will we not appre-

ciate the goodness of celebrating Easter until we become driven away from our country, like the Vietnamese and Kampucheans? How glad the Boat People were to come to our Church at Gilstead Road for special Gospel Meetings under our Refugee ministry some years back (with Rev Goh Seng Fong)! So let us not neglect to come Good Friday and Easter Lord's Day! Let us make it a point to meet Christ early at the Sunrise Service, 6.30 am!

Building a Church on Shepherd's Field,

Where the Angel appeared to announce our Saviour's Birth It is customary for us to channel our Easter offerings to some new Gospel outreach. This year, Session has decided for Bethlehem! To the Arab Congregation of Baraka Bible-Presbyterian Church, Bethlehem, to branch out to Beit Sahur, to the Shepherd's Field. Let us republish their appeal letter which came to hand early this year as follows:.

"Each year we conduct a special Christmas Eve Service in Shepherd's Field. We gather around a fire and sing hymns, share the Christmas story from the Scriptures, and have special messages and prayers. Usually more than 200 local people and tourists attend this special event. Our members, friends, neighbours, and people from all over the world come to celebrate Christ's birth together.

"It is with special joy that we inform you that we have taken a step of faith to purchase a parcel of land in the Shepherd's Field where we hope to build a church in the future.

"For many years we have held our --meetings--Sunday School, Sunday Morning Service, Wednesday Evening Bible Study, and Youth Groups on Saturday--in the church rooms which are part of the Holy Land Mission property in Bethlehem. We thank the Lord for this facility. We sincerely believe, however, that we should have our own property and a new church building in Beit Sahur where 75% of our members live. We presently worship there in a rented room on Sunday evening and have a Bible Club there on Friday afternoons. At present, we transport most of our people to Bethlehem for all the other services. The need for transporting limits our growth potential because

of our limited number of vehicles. It is a difficult, expensive and time-consuming process to bring everyone to Bethlehem.

"Recently we found a parcel of land in Shepherd's Field near where we hold our annual Christmas Eve Service. It is ideally situated for our church members and adequate to build a church to meet our needs. The church after much prayer and seeking of the Lord's will voted to purchase this land as a step of faith. It is expensive but far more reasonable than other land in the area. The cost of the land is 11,000 Jordanian Denar, or \$33,000. We have used all of our savings to make a downpayment and still we must raise 9,000 JD, or about \$27,000, to complete the purchase. We truly believe that God wants Baraka Church to have this land. We hope that you will desire to be a part of helping to make it possible. Many of you have helped in the past by your prayers and your gifts. Will you pray with us and also share this letter with others so they may also be aware of our need. We are sure that God will bless and provide the way for us to complete the purchase of the land."

Inasmuch as God has given us a good connection with the Arab Christians of Bethlehem through several Holy Land Tours conducted by me, Dr S.H. Tow and Elder Chia Kim Chwee, and Rev K.C. Quek, we believe we have a holy obligation to their appeal. Rev George Awad, a male nurse by profession and their honorary pastor, was ordained by Revs. Drs. S. H. Tow and Patrick Tan. Elder Issa was a student at FEBC for a good part of a year. This is a worthy cause and our blessing too to have a stake in the Shepherd's Field, a Holy Place in the Holy Land!

Incidentally, Dr S.H. Tow and Elder Chia are leading another Holy Land Tour, May 31 - June 12 this year. They will visit Bethlehem and Baraka B-P Church with the Arab brethren to renew old ties. This will be a great boost to their morale in the Lord Jesus Christ. Pray for the Pilgrims and for us as we intend to precede them by a month. Since last year we had planned to spend this time to meditate and write. A chief reason why we've chosen to spend the sabbatical month in Israel is we're en route to USA for the ICCC 40th Anniversary Congress. Alighting en route and climbing on again would not cost us any more on our airticket. May our visit to Israel at this time also be of benefit to the extension of God's Kingdom. - T.T.

I grew up in an Anglican church. I was baptised as a baby and attended Sunday school regularly until I was confirmed at the age of 12. I was a regular church-goer during those years and thereafter. However, since my university days, which I spent in London, I became an occasional visitor to the Church, attending service only at times such as Christmas, Good Friday and Easter. It was only during the last year or two that I slowly began to return to God, very erratically at first, and then only since last December I began to attend the Life B-P Church every week.

My initial return found me visiting Catholic churches for a while and a few times I went back to the Anglican church. I felt uncomfortable in the Catholic churches, as expected, although certain parts of the mass were quite similar to the Anglican services. not these developing factors beckon us to Batam for the Gospel's sake? We are to go where the people are. And we have Sister Roska!

Two Uttermost Parts--Perth and Bethlehem!

When we have done our part in Judea and Samaria, then the Lord will send us to the uttermost part of the earth. Robin Tan phoned last Sunday night to report on Padbury church in North Perth. One gift of A\$1,000 is much appreciated.

Twice the distance to Perth is Israel where we have a part in purchasing land at the Shepherd's Field, outside Bethlehem, for our Arab Christian brethren. Though they go to Baraka B-P Church on the Hebron Highway skirting Bethlehem, they are convinced God has a second church for Beit Sahur, Shepherd's Field, where most of the congregation live. They have made a downpayment of US\$6,000 for the site, but lack US\$27,000.

Praise the Lord, our Holy Week offerings, including individual gifts, total \$28,000 or US\$14,000. So everyone of our Readers who have given to our Arab brethren has a stake in that holy ground where the angel announced our Saviour's birth. If any Reader feels moved to close the gap, let him or her see the Treasurer before 2nd May! At this point of writing a lady member who visited the Holy Land last year brings to the Lord \$1,000! "God loveth a cheerful giver. And God is able to make all grace abound toward you, that ye, always having all sufficiency in all things, may abound to every good work" (II Cor 9:7,8).

Indeed, the Lord's blessings have abounded in the two trips we've made, 1983 and 1987, through association with Baraka, and surely He has more in store for you who are joining the Holy Land Tour, May 31-June 12, under Dr Tow and Elder Chia.

What is the Genius of B-Pism?

It is that every congregation should own its own property! So, we have given to our grown-up daughters, such as Grace and New Life, their portions, and we have given, through a Sister, a Church in Perth and another in J.B., and loaned substantial sums to Melbourne and Shalom to help them build.

One young Church that has a close link with us is Nazareth, a daughter of Galilee. We have ministered to Nazareth at every Gospel Service in Cantonese and Hokkien beamed on their parents and grandparents. Over 15 have been won to the Lord during the years.

Nazareth has during the last few years been worshipping at Galilee, but they have felt the need to strike out on their own. "Decentralisation" is another B-P genius in the matter of Church growth. Lately, they have discovered a piece of land 21,167 sq. ft. situated on the Pasir Panjang Highway near P.P. Park, at \$50 per sq. ft. As the owner has no other buyer except Nazareth, it seems this deal will come through.

The pastor of Life Church has been consulted and he has personally inspected the proposed Church site. He concurs this is good land for value. Moreover, we have no B-P Church in the Pasir Panjang district, so this is a good opening to an uncultivated field.

Though Nazareth is a small church with 70-80 communicant members, she is a forward giving Church. She budgeted \$10,000 for FEBC last year and has delivered the goods. Her own Building Fund stands above \$100,000 and is steadily growing. Jesus says, "For unto every one that hath shall be given, and he shall have abundance . . . " (Matt 25:29). Nazareth is a Church worthy of our help, not that we have any of our own, but as stewards entrusted with the Lord's money. As servants given certain talents to trade for the Master, we are required to bring in the highest profits. This has to do not only in the spiritual realm but also in the physical, yea, even in the financial. Jesus requires every Church to run like a trading company or banking corporation!

When Nazareth gets established on the Pasir Panjang Highway with Lifers' contributions, it is like coming round full circle. In 1960 Life launched out to Pasir Panjang to start Galilee Church. As the land Galilee stood upon was requisitioned to develop Singapore Port, she had to shift to Pandan Gardens. Now, Nazareth, Galilee's daughter which has been under the Mother's roof the last several years will shift back to where Galilee was in 1960. Why? To fill the gap left behind by the Mother Church. Perhaps the Lord's encouragement to Paul is relevant to Nazareth going back to Pasir Panjang: "For I am with

Since I'm considered "orang tua" (over 65), I was privileged with a ½ price ticket. My clean and cosy lower cabin berth, airconditioned, cost \$48 and some cents.

> My room-mate was a young Teochew merchant of K.L. with business headquarters in S'pore. A Taiwan University graduate, he carries on his father's business in the import and export of dried sea-food. He goes as far as the Maldive Islands to import sharks fins, and send his goods as far as Australia and Japan. What an opportunity to talk business, which ended up with "For what is a man profited if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul?" (Mk 8:36). My young friend knows all about the Gospel, including Christ's virgin birth and resurrection. We had further companionship at the Buffet Car where we ate

each a \$2 plate of fried noodles, washed down with Kopi-O - for the night was cold. While my friend snored away, I sneaked out of the cabin at Gemas, hoping to buy a hot night cap to soothe my sleeping nerves. To my disappointment, the Buffet Car was closed and the cooks were buried in slumberland. Just then I heard a lone Malay woman's voice calling, "Nasi Lemak, Kopi-O panas." That's just the stuff, I purred, and in the murky shadows some distance off the train, I struck a deal, nasi and Kopi all for M\$1/-. When I opened the rice packet I suddenly realised it was meant to be eaten with finger logistics, Malay style, which I was not accustomed to. Just as I hesitated, I discovered two straws for the drink, which became my improvised chop-sticks! How God provides to the last fibre of our needs! Thus satisfied, I betook to my cabin, but the next thing I became conscious of was the train's slowing down sweetly to its final destination - the Grand

Central Station which was K.L. Sure enough, Liew and Stephen Han were on hand to receive me. They whisked me offimmediately to Selayang Segar where we consulted our empty bellies with fresh pork broth at my request, the sweetness of my last meal here a year ago still in my palate!

Selayang Segar is a pleasant new town on your right as you drive on the completed superhighway to Ipoh north. What makes it even more important is its becoming a junction for a new highway to Klang, so that southbound traffic to Port Klang can bypass K.L., to reduce congestion. In other words, Selayang Segar has a short cut to the West Coast, so those going north from the West Coast can come here easily.

What disappointed me was that our new corner flat which we intend for a Christian Kindergarten is all finished, all ready, except for water and light. As the estate, along with scores of others I've seen in Malaysia, is "frozen" by the Depression, we must yield to the philosophy of "go slow." This means we have no definite date of opening the new Gospel station.

Business done, I asked to be rushed back to K.L., hoping to catch a S'pore-bound coach at the bus station. Sure enough a last seat at the front door was available. Thanking the Lord for the timely provision, I hopped on and said good-bye to our friends. I dozed on and off between meditations on the coming Sunday's messages. Another pleasant ride (the coach was airconditioned) and I arrived back Gilstead Road to join in the FEBC at the evening meal, fresh as a daisy. Praise the Lord for all the journeying mercies. (One further transaction at Selayang Segar was to alert Liew of Colin's visit with him, Junge 8-13, for some Gospel outreach in this new town.)

Pray for Selayang Segar, our northernmost outpost.

Batam Island

From the far north, let us look across S'pore straits to Batam Island on the southern horizon. With Roska's appointment as of May 1, 1988, we are claiming this "Pearl of Indonesian Development" for Christ while we pray and plan for its "commencement." Meanwhile, Roska will assist in the Indonesian Service at Life Church, and visit Kelapa Sawit and the several satellite towns of Air Bemban and Bukit Batu, Layang Layang, etc.

What shall we do on Batam Island? In conjunction with Deacon Linus (Teck Hock) of Tanjung Pinang, we will most probably rent a house to start a children's and youth work. This station can also provide hospitality to Christians travelling to other parts of Indonesia from Batam. For example, Kimiko, when flying out to

Tow and Dr Patrick Tan, to ordain their pastor Rev George Awad and elder Issah (who studied at FEBC for a season).

Your total giving to Shepherd's Field touches US\$20,000. There's still a gap of US\$5,000 roughly. If there is any last offer to the Lord, it should come before May 2!

"A father is starved by many sons." In reference to the ICCC 40th Anniversary Congress to be held at Cape Canaveral, Florida, June 6-16, we commented on a genuine need of this 20th Century Reformation Movement that is often neglected by her members. This remark prompted the WF to earmark \$300 for ICCC and Session to decide on US\$5,000 as our portion unto the Lord.

When we think of how the Separatist Movement has blessed the B-P Church all these years, beginning from Life Church, we gave hilariously, as a filial son to a loving father. "God loveth a cheerful giver. And God is able to make all grace abound toward you; that ye, always having all sufficiency in all things, may abound to every good work (II Cor 9:7.8). God increases a Christian's wealth in order that he might do good works, works of relief and mercy, and not works of self-enrichment and selfish hoarding!



So instead of breaking journey at Amman to transfer to Israel, we are now flying straight to New York, arriving May 3, RJ263, 1920 hours. My son John should be on hand to receive us and take us to his home at Roslyn (N. Philadelphia).

This is partly my annual leave at the end of FEBC's academic year. But it will be a working holiday as I intend to catch up on my writings. I had written 85% of my life story in Perth and I intend to finish it this time. I hope also to resume writings on the Psalms for RPG.

I am looking forward to seeing my daughter Lily and her family in Akron, Ohio, some 400 miles east of Philadelphia. And Rev C.T. Hsu my comrade for the last four decades, who resides in New York. While in Philadelphia I must visit with Dr & Mrs Jack Murray.

We should be in Cape Canaveral a day or two before June 6. I have to deliver an evening message June 9, while editing the Reformation Reporter, a daily news-sheet. Pray for us! May we offer our best to the Lord Jesus Christ.

That we are prevented from stopping over Israel is a rude reminder that the world is at war! Since the end of WWII, 17 million peple have been killed and wounded as a result of civil and regional wars, many with no end in sight. There are 40 wars still going on. We thought things had subsided in Lebanon when another bomb went off at a marketplace in Tripoli. Scores were killed and hundreds wounded! Meantime the numbers of Arabs shot dead in the present uprising in Israel is around 150. Tune to BBC and you'll be drowned by the crackle of machine gun fire, now east, now west, and everywhere.

Several years ago, Deng Xiao Ping warned that 1988 would be a very dangerous year. Like 1997 for Hong Kong, 1988 which is the 40th Anniversary of the founding of Israel has turned out to be so. Whereas Israel had won brilliantly against her Arab neighbours in 1967, and did win again in 1973 in the Yom Kippur War, she got stuck in Lebanon 1982-85. Now, it is the beginning of 1988 that she is fighting a war from within, with ominous reverberations. Jesus says, "Every kingdom divided against itself is brought to desolation, and a house divided against a house falleth" (Lk 11:17).



Do you know that according to the Doomsday Clock in Chicago, it is now 6 minutes to midnight, zero hour for this dark world. This is corroborated by the sad events of 1988 insofar as Israel's future is concerned. Jeremiah sees how the times like these, from Israel's Independence 1948 to this day, will climax with "Jacob's trouble." "Alas! for that day is great, so that none is like it: it is even the time of Jacob's trouble; but he shall be saved

out of it (Jer 30:7). There is a silver lining to the dark cloud over Israel and that is the cataclysmic Return of her Messiah, even our Lord Jesus Christ! Christians, sympathising with both Jews and Arabs, and concerned most about the salvation of their own, need to hear this message

on 1988! Some Lifers have asked me to lead another Pilgrimage to the Holy Land next year. Frankly speaking, I have no confidence the peaceful times we enjoyed there 1983 and 1987 will return. Maranatha!

What will you do with Jesus, young man, young woman? In a world that will be crashing one nation upon another, more and more with the passing of days, whether old or young, we are in the same boat. "Only one life, 'twill soon be past; Only what's done for Jesus will last." Why don't you give your life to serve the King of kings? When He is coming even at the door?

And so I take leave of you in the service of our Lord. We are scheduled to return, D.V., June 20. God be with you till we meet again. Your affectionate pastor, T.T.

God in His merciful plan had allowed us to enjoy our dearest son, Darren, for exactly another four years, so that both Ngiap and I could be drawn closer to Him. We blossomed into a

family that prayed together. Above all, we love to come to the Lord's House to seek His face every Lord's Day. We have also found much blessings in attending Prayer Meetings and studying the Bible in depth through attending Basic Theology Lectures. God has infused in us the love to read and study His Word. God indeed had a marvellous purpose when He restored our son to let us have four more years of togetherness as a happy Christian family. Unfortunately on 26th April as I drove to the hospital, the Lord did not answer my anguished cry: "Don't let him be badly injured, Lord." This time God had revealed that He could not spare our son to us anymore, for it was time for Him to take away our son to be with Him in glory. I thank God that I've kept our promise to the Lord--which is to bring him up and nurture him in the Word of the Lord, when Rev Tow baptised Darren when he was barely four months old. To accept the fact that our son is now absent in the body but present with the Lord is indeed difficult by our own weak physical strength. Only Jesus knows our great grief and He has made the suffering more bearable by moving all of you to be our earthly comforters. Just as no words can describe our grief, likewise no words can describe our sincere thanks to all of you, especially to Rev Timothy Tow, Mrs Tow, Rev Patrick Tan, Mrs Anne Tan and all the FEBC students who, inspite of their exams, came forward to help in one way or another. May God bless all His faithful full-time servants mightily!

One word of advice to all Christian mothers with young children. Remember your baptismal vows to the Lord and do not deprive your children of a Christian education due to the stress of work, education and the humdrums of daily life. May you all take the trouble to bring your children to be nurtured in the Word of the Lord and may you pray constantly for their souls to be saved. May all of you, dear brothers and sisters in Christ, continue to pray for us as we need comfort, courage and strength to regain our normal life. I believe God will in His good time bring us out of our grief and reveal His purpose to us. Thank you.

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CONTINUE STEDFASTLY

The outpouring of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost was a fulfilment of the prophecy from Joel 2:28. The Holy Spirit did a powerful work of reproving the hearers "of sin, and righteousness, and of judgment." This was spoken of by our Lord Jesus in John 16:8. Three thousand souls were saved and added to the Church. They were then baptised. What followed conversion was important. "They continued stedfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, and in breaking of bread, and in prayers" (Acts 2:42). It is the responsibility of the Church to do the work of evangelism. It is equally the Church's duty to nurture and to build up the converts in the most precious faith.

We see then in the apostolic church the twin pillars for the local church ministry, namely, evangelism and discipleship. The good news of salvation through Jesus Christ was communicated by word of mouth. Personal evangelism was probably the most effective. This was clearly shown by the dispersion of the Christians as the result of persecution: "They that were scattered abroad went everywhere preaching the word" (Acts 8:4). This method is to make evangelism a part of daily living--in our vocation, in recreation and in family life. It is a thrill to hear our young people requesting prayers for their unsaved parents and relatives. There is also the outreach of the evangelistic band. This was the method used by Dr John Sung, and Rev Ting Li Mei before John. It was the Lord's method to send His disciples out two by two (Luke 10:1). A backslider was brought back to the Lord by the witness of the LBC at the Tampines area. He and his family are now actively serving the Lord.

Discipling the converts has often been neglected by the local church. The new Christians need to grow and mature spiritually. Someone said that by attending the worship service faithfully one would receive all the teaching necessary for spiritual growth. There is always the element of evangelism and teaching in all pulpit messages. A worship service is most often inspirational. Therefore Sunday services should be supplemented by systematic teaching of God's Word, as in the Sunday School. I urge Church members not just to send your children to Sunday School, but to attend it yourselves. We provoke one another to love and good works (Heb. 10:24). Discipling must surely mean discipline. We need discipline to grow spiritually. We need a plan for spiritual growth, beginning with worshipful and meaningful quiet time with the Lord daily, to systematic study of God's Word through the Sunday School, and fellowship with Christian brothers and sisters. Strong disciples make a strong church. A spiritually strong Church will be a giving Church, in the giving of our tithes, our talents, and our time.

The apostle Paul has a deep concern for the ministry of teaching in the Church. God gives the Church men of ability such as prophets, evangelists, pastors and teachers. The goal is that the Christians may "come in the unity of faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ" (Eph 4:13). "I have planted, Apollos watered; but God gave the increase" (I Cor 3:6).

"Looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith" (Heb 12:2) Since July 1986, I have been assigned to assist Pastor Tow as a full-time church worker. My work involves taking care of the visitors and prayer requests and other duties that may arise.

On visitation, I normally collect all the visitor's cards after each Sunday morning service. The following day I send out letters to them from our pastor, "A Letter of Welcome" and any other information they may need. Some of the overseas visitors have written in for Prayer Requests and some have attended the Tuesday Prayer Meeting.

For the local visitors, I ring them up to make appointments to visit them. I meet some of the visitors after the church services and then get the leaders of the various fellowship groups to contact them. Sometimes, I visit their homes and get to know their families as well. We have a time of sharing on God's Word followed by a prayer for various needs. Where there are parental objections, I meet the visitors either in the void deck or in coffee shops, getting to know them and their problems, sharing God's Word and praying for them.

As for the prayer request cards, there has been a great response and many have attended the Tuesday Prayer Meetings.

The Elders will be given specific prayer items to be prayed for continually, as the need arises. Our pastor, associate pastor Rev (Dr) Patrick Tan, Preacher Colin Wong and myself will be praying for all the prayer items during the week. Those who give their telephone numbers will be contacted for encouragement to trust in the Lord for their prayer requests. Some have given testimonies in the Tuesday Prayer Meeting of answered prayers, to God's glory.

Apart from the visitation and prayer request cards, I am also involved in counselling sessions. They vary from personal problems, family affairs and doctrinal issues. Those which are of serious nature I refer to our pastors. These counselling sessions are held at any time convenient. To God's glory many have been blessed and are back with the Lord. Please keep me in your prayers as I continue to serve the Lord faithfully.

MR COLIN WONG REPORTS

The Life B-P Church Evangelistic Band was inaugurated on 13th Sep. 1987. The present outreach of the Band is to evangelise the people in Toa Payoh Estate. Since its inception, God has been challenging many young people to respond to the call of the Great Commission of our Lord Jesus Christ. To date, by God's grace, the Band has brought five persons to Christ. God has also given us many contacts, and many of them have enrolled with the Bible Correspondence Course. The apostle Peter calls the devil our adversary. The devil is compared with a lion which hunts first by stealth and then by brute might. Animals that are not vigilant fall prey. Like the proverbial lion, there are three main ways in which the devil deceives the church as a whole and the Christian in particular. Firstly, he lies to us that there is no such person as a devil. He does not exist. He cannot be scientifically proven. In this day of rationalism and the age of science, the enlightened man cannot

subscribe to a personal devil. If we are tempted and commit sin, it is due to our environment. People steal because of poverty; they murder when provoked and they rise in rebellion because of unequal distribution of wealth. When we can solve the problems of poverty, inequality and oppression, then we reach a state of utopia. Rational man also cannot believe in revelation and miracles. The so-called supernatural can be explained scientifically. God can use the natural means to effect Hisppurposes. All these The second se are the devil's deceptions.

In the second place, the devil draws undue attention to himself ... of the devil is responsible for our bodily illnesses. The demented are possessed by devils, and need to be exorcised. The devil is attributed more power than he possesses; He is the prince of this world. This has resulted in pastors being led into a spiritual ministry of casting out demons. The devil may give some pastors some successes; only to divert them from evangelism and feeding the flock. These pastors become very popular but their congregations are spiritually starved for lack of an ministry of the Word. Of Exorcism and afaith healing are: twin pillars of the Charismatic Movement. They claim the Holy Spirit's power when in fact they are skilfully manipulated by the Spirit of Error p Abuses abound in the Charismatic churches. 1. Jan 14.2

There is a third group of Christians who believe that the devil is a personal being. They accept that trials and temptations originate from the evil one. But they make the mistake that they can handle the devil by themselves. They underestimate their own spiritual capabilities and surely underestimate the powers of the devile (I:Cor 10:12). The devil is a roaring lion and does not discriminate between the different types of Christians. Naturally, the stronger Christians will survive the devil southack. Spiritual self-conceit will cause the Christian to fall from the faith.

The Spirit-filled Christian is not immune to temptation. But we have God on our side. Our spiritual battles are also His battles. The Holy Spirit protects us. 

As he is a student on Revivalism, he was thrilled to read the 10 Testimonies on the S'pore Pentecost and, even more, the Boxer Rebellion of 1900 and the ministry of Rev Ting Li Mei, "China's Moody."

The Qualifying Experience of Staying in a Senior Citizen's Home

It is the B-P Home at Delanco, overlooking the Delaware River. At the Wednesday Night Prayer Meeting where I was asked to give a testimony, I said, "Forty years ago when I came to USA, I qualified to enter Faith Seminary. Forty years after I have qualified to join Delanco." This provoked laughter. The Lord has put us here, as I can see, for several reasons. Delanco is only 15 miles from Collingswood, so that whenever Dr McIntire needs me, I'm easily available. To stay with 15 senior citizens, mostly octogenarians and nonagenarians, is a new experience. As they are in the winter of life we try our best to radiate the warmth of summer by our speech and and singing (in worship) and visit with the sick. The best thing to do visiting the sick is to read God's Word, and the best part of God's Word in this instance is the "Royal Balm" of the Psalms. In all our travels we have adopted St. Paul's policy, "For I have learned in whatever state I am, therewith to be content" (Phil. 4:11). "For godliness with contentment is great gain" (I Tim 6:6). We have learned for a third reason the importance of waiting on the Lord. "For your heavenly Father knoweth that ye have need of all these things" (Matt 6:32).

Shepherd's Field on the Screen by Miss Davenport,

Returned Missionary from the Holy Land



Hitherto you who have travelled with me to the Holy Land have been introduced to the Herdles and Creamers. Miss Davenport is another missionary to the Arabs at Baraka. At the Ladies Missionary Society of the Collingswood BPC Miss Davenport was the speaker. She showed a good representation of scenes of the Holy Land, but best of all, the Shepherd's Field site for a new Arab B-P Church at Beit Sahour, 3 miles from Baraka BPC on the Beth-Miss Davenport, in lehem highway. answer to questions, stressed the importance of building this new Arab Church at Shepherd's Field because there is a growing Christian community at Beit Sahour, a village of the Shepherd's Field. The Arab Christians

themselves have rented a house for YF meetings, prayer meetings, etc., apart from holding Sunday Evening Worship. To go all the way to the Church on the Bethlehem Highway is not feasible except on Sunday mornings.

I was glad to hear a firsthand Appeal by an American missionary for the Arab Church she is serving. So I asked Miss Davenport how big the Church site at Shepherd's Field is. She says, "1,100 sq. metres." How does this compare with our Woodlands site whose area is 3,940 sq. metres? How does this compare with 500 m² we bought for the Kapitbahayan Church in Manila (Rev Dan Ebert)? At 1,100 m² we have therefore about 12,000 sq. ft. This works out at less than S\$6 per sq.ft.! No wonder Singapore is able to pay for the whole piece of land, practically. Praise the Lord for everyone who has put in your share for the Shepherd's Field Land.

What is Revival?

From Wesley comes the formula: 1. Do all the good you can. 2. By all the means you can. 3. In all the ways you can. 4. In all the places you can. 5. At all the times you can. 6. To all the people you can. 7. As long as ever you can.

Alas! The Church in America, which was once first, is becoming last. The Church is big, but the congregation is small. Few young people are to be seen.

We thank God for sending His Spirit upon our Church so that young people who love the Lord have stepped forward to bear the burden, eg. the Sunday Afternoon Evangelistic Band, the YAF monthly Gospel Film Night. The WF is taking on Batam, etc., etc. Many of you who have the means have supported the Lord's Work with your gifts, provoking other BPCs also to give.

In this respect, may I urge you to bring in the tithes into the storehouse (God will pour you out a blessing . . . and rebuke the devourers for your sakes. Malachi 3:10). It will be wonderful if you will help the Arab Christians build their Church, too. Miss Davenport says there's not a Protestant Church at Shepherd's Field though there's a Lutheran, but in name. They also have candles and all that savour of Romanism. Sad to say, Protestants have returned to Rome. How good if Life Church can build a Church at Shepherd's Field, and make a special trip to join them at the Christmas Service! God bless.

When a Christian is Not Prepared to Die!

There is a nonagenarian lady who knows more Bible than a seminarian. Whatever Bible portion I read she could tell me the reference. When I said God will bury your sins in the deepest sea (from a chorus) she said it's in Micah. Which chapter? She knows her Bible so well because she was brought up to read the Bible every morning and night. But Satan won't let her go. She has been full of doubts of her salvation. For one week we visited her every night after supper. Every time she raises more questions. We have no way out but to keep reading God's Word that counters her doubts. Praise the Lord, her doubts were all dispersed by the light of the Word. So we could heartily sing: "In the Cross, in the Cross, Be my vision glorious. All my sins are washed away in the Blood of Jesus." How wonderful to see such a broad smile on an angelic face while she utters this prayer, "Lord, take me home tonight, I'm ready to go." Old or young, can you say that? How can you be sure of your salvation? Of heaven and not hell? When by faith in the Lord Jesus your sins have been washed away by His Blood! So, despite the whole Church's mourning for young Darren Chan, 11, we could rejoice to tell his young classmates at the funeral service: "Today is Darren's Graduation Day--TO HEAVEN."

40 Dogwood Trees planted on Faith Seminary Grounds

The Women's Fellowship of Collingswood BPC came yesterday to hold Spring Tea for the Delanco Home. After tea Dr McIntire invited us to go with him and Mrs McIntire to Faith Seminary--to plant 40 dogwoods, 20 white and 20 pink. The pink dogwood, when it blooms in spring, gives us the American "version" of the Japanese sakura. The reason for planting is to commemorate the ICCC's 40 years as well as Israel's. It took us 2 hours with the holes all dug in advance.

After the tree planting we were invited to an Asian Get-together and Pakistani makan under the "Asian Ministries of the ICCC." The idea is to bring migrants to this country, some through the ICCC, to a closer fellowship with our stand. Otherwise they may be sucked into Ecumenical Churches which in USA are worse than pagan. Churches that blaspheme the Name of Christ, that have a female Christ hanging on the Cross, that say Jesus and John were homosexuals, in order to admit a gay clergy. Such blasphemous statements, if they do not make your blood boil . . . Who will stand up for our Lord today except the leadership of the ICCC?

TIMELY Confrontation

Then there is the Celebration of the 1000th Anniversary of the coming of Christianity to Russia under Communist Control and all the hypocritical felicitations that will be heaped upon Moscow by the Pope and WCC and New Evangelicals inside the WCC, Billy Graham being chief Protestant spokesman. Interestingly, the dates of the Ecumenicals and ours at Cape Canaveral coincide, theirs June 5-17 and ours June 6-16. This confrontation will give ICCC a golden opportunity to expose the greatest religious deception thus far of --the End-times. There was an Elijah on Mount Carmel versus the 450 Baal Prophets, and there'll always be an Elijah to withstand Baal in any age.


In "Asian Awakening," page 218, there is an Appeal after the Boxer Rebellion (1900) by the China Inland Mission which says, "There is today a tide in the affairs of China which, if taken at the lood, should lead on to everlasting blessing to that empire as well as to the world." May I apply this observation to our B-P Church today: "There is a tide in our B-P Churches which, if taken at the flood, should lead on to everlasting blessing to our Church Movement as well as to new horizons we had never dreamed of." For example: Our unplanned latest advance to the Holy Land in buying the Shepherd's Field site for an Arab Church. The strategy is our strong Singapore \$! Which has also helped the ½-Finished Filipino Churches. No doubt the greatest strategy is men and women surrendered to do His will. Hence the FEBC, to train warriors for the Faith and labourers for the Vineyard. (From a close contact with Rev Noah Quasa, author of "A Bird's Eye View of the Bible," two young Ghanians are coming to FEBC for training, so they might return to evangelise Ghana.) But you who are established, to whom God has given wealth and substance, can play your part for the extension of God's Kingdom before Jesus returns. And I thank God that you have responded heartily to all the openings that Christ has given to Life Church. Hence the building of FEBI in Pontianak (which has become self-supporting), the purchase of Air Bemban which Elder Sng, who visits there regularly, can testify is great gain to the Lord. And so on, as the list is a long one. E.g. The over \$25,000 we spent 4 years ago to build a big church at Nawngkhio, N. Thailand, that has blessed the Frontier Labourers for Christ. "And let us not be weary in well doing: for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not" (Gal 6:9). So, work for the night is coming and the Day of Deliverance is at hand. Remember Wesley's words to do the greatest and widest good at the time.

THE PARABLE OF THE ANT

10

What can we learn from an ant? If we are humble enough, we can learn at least three lessons of DILIGENCE, ORDERLINESS and COOPERATION. These are much desired and needed qualities for the individual Christian and for the Church. The ant is always busy. There is not a moment to waste. She seems to be tireless. Yet her activies are not purposeless. She is "providing her meat in the summer and gathering her food in the harvest." Where there is food in abundance it must be stored for the winter or for bad times. The call today to each one of us is to be diligent. There are so many Biblical injunctions on hard work. How about this advice, "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might" (Eccl 9:10)? Students have sometimes failed in exams because they did not study hard. Workers job-hop--one among several reasons is that the work is too hard or demanding. Shoddy workmanship is a constant grumble concerning inferior products. Diligence is the way. Diligence in study, in training, in working and in serving is the answer to success. The ant is programmed to be diligent, yet she knows instinctively that if she does not provide her meat she will perish. Christians all the more must realise this.

The second characteristic of the ant is the orderly way she goes about her business. There is an ant trail that she must follow. She knows her job well and nothing will distract her. I don't suppose we can find her arguing about her role and her task. Whether alone or in a group, the ant is orderly, so different from man. There is a poster which reads like this, "Geniuses are rarely tidy." I can therefore define a genius as one who, inspite of being untidy in his habits, knows where his things are kept. For ordinary people we must have tidy habits and an orderly mind to work and perform efficiently. We need efficiency in our secular work as well as in God's service. Besides skill which will contribute to efficiency, there is orderliness. There is a system of working. In an organisation where there are different people working at different roles but with one ultimate task, the need for an orderly system is altogether important. The organisation is as weak as its weakest link. So in the Church, God has given us men of talents. Individually and corporately we build up the Church of God (Eph 4:11-13).

As we see ants bringing food particles to their nest, they often work as a group. You watch their cooperation with amazement. When the burden gets too heavy, more ants will join in the work to bring the food home. The survival of the colony is dependent on the cooperation of the members. They have no guide, overseer or ruler, yet there is harmony. Work gets done; the ultimate task is accomplished. Because man is given the free will, we have a choice--to cooperate or not. Since we are sinful and selfish, cooperation is sometimes difficult to achieve. Yet by the grace of God and for the love of Jesus Christ, we can serve Him harmoniously, cooperating with one another, "For as we have many members in one body, and all members have not the same office: so we being many are one body in Christ, and every one members one of another" (Rom 12:4,5). - P. Tan

Like a Shut-in

Staying at the B-P Home at Delanco with 15 senior citizens, mostly in their 80s or 90s, sharing bathroom, can dampen one's spirits. But since we have learned in whatsoever state we are therewith to be content (Phil 4:11), we have profited not a little thereby. As a shut-in I have more time to meditate and write the Psalms. After 24 days' stay I've completed 31 Psalms. Your prayers, I'm sure, have borne me up. Can I attain 50 as I had hoped? When we took leave of the Delanco Home, some tears were shed.

Life in America can be very lonesome, for friends or relatives may live hundreds of miles apart. In view of the long distances separating us from daughter Lily and our leaving for Florida May 31, we will not go to Ohio. We could converse only long distance. "As cold waters to a thirsty soul, so is good news from a far country" (Prov 25:25). As son John transported us from Delanco to his house at Roslyn, we were glad to read Sis. Linda Chan's affectionate letter and her testimony in verse in the Weekly May 15. The Lord will give you the strength to carry on, but above all through your agonies to alleviate the sufferings of other mothers in a similar situation. Thanks to Colin for your letter too. We met Rev & Mrs Quek at Prayer Meeting of Dr McIntire's Church. They have left already for Florida, visiting niece en route.

Fort Washington BPC, Pennsylvania

In my last letter I said I was to preach at the above Church. The young pastor there is Dr Edward Gross, whose parents and brothers visited us some years ago. We had warm fellowship with 50 church members there (Rev Paauwe is speaking today). After service Dr Gross took us to his quarters at Faith Seminary for lunch. Dr Gross is Assistant Professor of Theology and Missions. He will receive his doctor's degree in Missiology June 10 from Trinity Divinity School. Dr Gross has published a second book, an Abridgment of Charles Hodge's Systematic Theology, through Baker Book House. He also preaches on 3 Radio Stations 5 days every week. This is a means of soul-saving, whereby several have joined his church.

Radio and TV a Must in America

America is like an ocean and Singapore like a pond. Because of the wide expanse of its country, the only way to communicate quickly is through the airwaves. Hence, pastors who have a big membership spreading over a large area would speak through the local broadcasting station. If he is not a good speaker, his broadcast will die a natural death. If he has a message, his one station will become two, three, and more. The Gospel is sounded through the Radio 24 hours a day!

The TV also is needed for quick communication. There are something like 80 to 90 channels. The Delanco inmates are given a view of the outside world by TV. Alas! The Televangelists have disappeared from the screen! But we read that Swaggart is trying to come back.

Faith Bible Fellowship Church, Spring City, Pennsylvania

The pastor of this Church is Rev Carl Martin whom we met at Rev Dan Ebert's in Manila. We have become good friends. When he heard that I was "in town," he fixed me up to preach at his Church today. An hour's drive from Roslyn, he came early at 8 am. There I had the opportunity to speak to the Adult S.S. and at the Service. There were about 150 people. After worship we were kindly entertained to lunch at the parsonage.

At Fort Washington BPC Again in the Evening

In USA, Fundamental Churches hold evening services. Rev Paauwe, former pastor of FWBPC, was speaker there tonight where he showed slides of the BPC outreach to Australia. Though most of the slides were on Adelaide, there included some on Perth and Melbourne. The Hope BPC services which were held at the Old Scout Hall are now moved to a school more centrally located and better equipped. Their attendance is around 30. Pray for Adelaide that the Church there will take root downward and bear fruit upward (Isa 37:31).

Visit with the Larry Leongs

Lawrence Leong, an old Lifer, came with John and Roy Lim 24 years ago to go to school at Shelton College. Roy became a banker, but because of hard times has had to transfer to the Philippines. Lawrence became a teacher, while Lee Lin his wife holds a good job. Their two sons are very successful at school. The big son has joined Princeton U . . . Steven Tan of Zion BPC is studying at Biblical Seminary. He now has two kids. He and his family are driving down to Florida for the ICCC Congress. Steven kindly phoned me up.

Memorial Day, May 30, in America

This Day is set aside to commemorate America's war dead. Instead it becomes a sort of grand holiday. This reminds us of the Jews who kept their memorial days during their exile to Babylon, not in mourning, but in having a good time. "And when ye did eat, and when ye did drink, did not ye eat for yourselves, and drink for yourselves?" (Zech 7:6). So here 'we find Memorial Day specials in sales and sports, etc., etc. I pray I might use this day wisely to continue with the Psalms.

Tuesday 7 am (May 31), a group of missionaries including ourselves will head south for Florida, driving time 24 hours. For economy we go by the Mission's mini-bus. Somewhere mid-way we must pass the night at a motel. Pray for our safety in this overland travel. Pray for the ICCC 12th Congress (40th Anniversary) that there will be a revival to the movement. That the Congress might bring glory to God and establish the Church. Pray that God will speak loudly and clearly that all might heed His Word. Pray that the Lord will give me His Word in the edition of the Daily Reporter. We're praying for the safe arrival of our Singapore contingent. May the Lord also direct the President of the ICCC that we might follow closely our Lord Jesus Christ in these crucial battles of the last days.

Gateway to the Stars Hotel Cape Canaveral, Fa., USA June 15, 1988

On the American Road

The ride in the Independent Board Missions mini-bus was both comfortable and pleasant. It is a new vehicle with plenty of power, an 11-seater. As there were 9 of us, the last row was occupied by our luggage. So there was comfortable space, but just enough, for the party. The journey of slightly over 1,000 miles was made in two days, and one night spent at a motel at Fayetteville, N. Carolina. It cost both of us US\$35 excluding food. This was a safe arrangement in my view, for it is reported quite a few others make the trip non-stop in 17 or 18 hours. That is the American way of life.

Our Congress Site

is the former Hilton of 200 rooms spaciously spread out over several acres. It was bought over by Dr McIntire in 1974. The Hotel did a booming business when the US Space Programme was at its highest. Here the astronauts stayed before their space shots, and Room 315 is where Neil A. Armstrong, "the first man to walk on the moon," slept. When the US Government slowed down its Space Programme, the Hilton lost out, and Dr McIntire took over. I'm not sure the former Hilton which he names "Gateway to the Stars" is doing as well as he thought, but this one thing I know: Every room is occupied by the 12th Congress of ICCC, so that a good number of delegates and visitors are obliged to overflow to nearby motels.

We have a big hall that accommodates the Congress, seating 1,000, and air-conditioned. A huge blue and white tent is pitched alongside to give shelter to overflow meetings, such as prayer groups according to language and space for displays. Some of the groups like the Filipinos and Haitians bring arts and crafts from their countries to sell in order to help pay for expenses. Others display literature, e.g. Rev Andrew Losier of Christian Literature and Bible Centre that have distributed one billion pieces in 50 languages. As for Singapore, we have effectively distributed hundreds of RPG and Banner and 400 copies of "John Sung My Teacher," and the 66 Prayer Booklets. These are disseminated especially to Third World countries in Asia and Africa. The ICCC is represented at this Congress by about 45 nations.

A Banner and a Beacon

The ICCC is a Banner that rallies those Churches that are of the same stand to witness for the Truth. It is a standard, a flag, hoisted high to give inspiration to lonely and beleaguered forces. It is a Beacon, a searchlight that casts its beams in a dark night to guide mariners on the right ship lanes, away from treacherous seas.

During this Congress, the media has given a fair coverage of the activities of the ICCC, both TV and newspapers, even the Voice of America broadcast. More important, I believe, are the Statements and issues of the day which will be published in Christian magazines and newspapers around the world.





PASTORAL CHAT

My dear Readers,

" . . . and weep with them that weep" (Rom. 12:15)

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Last Monday afternoon I received the shocking news from Bro. Hai Seng (FEBC graduate now serving with Bethel BPC, Melbourne) of the tragic homegoing of Mr Jeffrey Gan and Mrs Eric Choong in a motor accident, which also involved Mr Choong and Mrs Gan with serious injuries. Our prayers immediately went out to the bereaved. As for us, we could only repent in sorrow "and weep with them that weep," for we had personally met the Choongs when we ministered in Melbourne, 1986.

My brother Dr S.H. Tow and his wife called the same afternoon to give further information. As he had to speak at a Bible Camp and had other important appointments, we agreed Rev Bob Phee, who has just returned from Melbourne, should fly Tuesday night to comfort the loved ones and bury their dead. In fact, Bob offered to go before we asked. This is in accordance with the Apostles' teaching: "That members should have the same care of one another. And whether one member suffer, all the members suffer with it . . " (I Cor 12:25,26). Elder and Mrs Khoo Peng Kiat, newly arrived on the scene, are our representatives to serve. Truly the Church is one big family, and the cord that binds us is love.

This valley of tears reminds me of Easter Monday 1965 when the Lord took my wife Nancy and youngest daughter Le Anne and Aunt Mrs Tow Keng Chuan at the foot of Cameron Highlands. I could only submit with Job, "Naked came I out of my mother's womb, and naked shall I return thither: the Lord gave and the Lord hath taken away; blessed be the Name of the Lord" (Job 1:21). May those who go through the same valley be comforted, knowing that our lives are in God's hands. "But the very hairs of your head are numbered" (Matt 10:30). "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to His purpose . . . Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? . . . Nay, in all these things we are more than conquerers through Him that loved us. For I am persuaded, that neither death, nor life, . . . nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Rom 8:28-39).

The Depraved Tendency to Judge

It is our depraved tendency to judge those who suffer in a bad light. That was the attitude of some Jews who told Jesus of those Galileans "whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices" (Lk 13:1) and of "those eighteen upon whom the tower of Siloam fell and slew them" (Lk 13:4). Jesus retorted, "Think ye that they were sinners above all men that dwelt in Jerusalem? I tell you, Nay; but except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish." Let us get rid of that "holier than thou" spirit (Isa. 65:5), for we are all sinners saved by grace. Pastor or people, elder or younger, senior or junior, we are all in the same boat.

The tendency to judge is depraved, but doubly depraved is the tendency to say "serve him right," to gloat over someone trodden down who is our enemy. King Solomon warns, "Rejoice not when thine enemy falleth, and let not thine heart be glad when he stumbleth; Lest the Lord see it, and it displease Him, and He turn away His wrath from him" (Prov 24:17,18). "Whoso mocketh the poor reproacheth his Maker; and he that is glad at calamities shall not be unpunished" (Prov 17:5).

And further hear what the prophet Obadiah says, "But thou shouldest not have looked on the day of thy brother in the day that he became a stranger; neither shouldest thou have rejoiced over the children of Judah in the day of their destruction; neither shouldest thou have spoken proudly in the day of distress" (Obadiah 12).

"Ye have not because ye ask not" (James 4:2)

Why is the Prayer Meeting Night so sparse in attendance? There are many legitimate reasons to offer. The main reason is our prayerless spirit. As prayer is earnest asking (lst definition by Chambers) and we are "rich, increased in goods, and have need of nothing" (Rev 3:17), what is the necessity of attending Tuesday Night Prayer Meeting?

In God's eyes, however, we are "wretched, and miserable, and poor, and blind, and naked" (Rev 3:17). We are advised to buy of Him (without money - Isa 55:1) "gold tried in the fire." Matthew Henry says, "Come to Christ with a sense of your poverty and emptiness, part with sin and self-sufficiency, that you may be filled with His hidden treasure." And when Christ begins to fill our empty hearts, then will we by the anointing of His Spirit see things in the right perspective and be clothed with His righteousness, and not be exposed in our shame and guilt.

How many a heavy burden upon our hearts we carry, day in, day out. Come to Prayer Meeting and cast upon Him all our cares.

Come, ye disconsolate, where'er ye languish, Come to the mercy-seat, fervently kneel: Here bring your wounded hearts, here tell your anguish; Earth has no sorrows that heav'n cannot heal. Joy of the comfortless, light of the straying, Hope of the penitent, fadeless and pure! Here speaks the Comforter, in mercy saying, "Earth has no sorrows that heav'n cannot cure."

Here see the Bread of Life; see waters flowing Forth from the throne of God, pure from above: Come to the feast prepared; come, ever knowing Earth has no sorrows but heav'n can remove.

(Trinity Hymnal, # 518)

Prayer is a great lesson to be learnt, even for the Apostles. So Luke tells us of a disciple who asked our Lord, "Teach us to pray, as John also taught his disciples" (Lk 11:1). The 66 POCKET PRAYERS from the pen of S.H. Tow, compiled after years of meditation, have come to His Kingdom for such a time as this. It is fulfilling a vital need, the hungering and thirsting souls of God's children who know not how to pray. 

A Time to Study

Since the founding of FEBC in September 1962, we have without let-up been running a course of BASIC THEOLOGY FOR EVERYONE every Monday and Thursday evening when the school-term is on. This is to kill two birds with one stone. While it contributes to the College Curriculum, it affords members of the B-P Church and for that matter, any others who are interested in studying God's Word, an opportunity to upgrade themselves.

FEBC reopens July 18, but our first Monday evening class does not begin until July 25, 7.30 pm (when the public holiday is over by 6 pm; by Hebrew calculation!). Our first Thursday evening class, however, begins on July 21, 7.30 pm. Rev T. Tow teaches the Doctrine of Man according to Buswell's Systematic Theology Bk II on Monday evening, while Rev Charlie Tan, Deuteronomy, the Fifth Book of Moses, on Thursday evening. The course descriptions are widely advertised in a pink leaflet, which has been distributed and is being distributed. Pray for your lecturers that they may reverently impart God's Holy Word to a generation that needs to know the Bible as never before.

and Grace Lauw, Brutus Balan, Lim Hai Seng (Australia); etc., etc. In West Malaysia there are Ng Sang Chiew, Liew Hon Seng, Tiew Ah Tuan, David Wong, Elder Koa, (Elder John Ling), Esther Tsai, Stephen Khoo, Eric Kwan, Deacon Mani, Colin Wong, etc., etc., serving in what we call our Judean ministry. Though Thawm Luai of Burma was with us for only one semester, he is an outstanding one heading a whole denomination of over two thousand members. We mention these, "because that for His Name's sake they went forth, taking nothing of the Gentiles" (III John 7).

Over a Dozen New Students

This academic year sees the enrolment of over a dozen new students, of whom a third are from B-P Churches. Outstanding among them is a young man from Calvary BPC who has just graduated from NUS with an L1B(Hons.). We have some who, after finishing FEBC, go to study law and back to the secular world. Here is one who has given up a legal career to embrace the cross. Pray for this young man that he may not look back, "having put his hand to the plough" (Lk 9:62). His name is Chng Nai Yee.

Another worthy of mention is an Australian young man, having served eleven years in the Police. When he heard God's call, he sold his house and took off to USA with wife and three children. After a year in the States, he is transferring to FEBC to accelerate in theological training. From there he was called to found Clearwater Christian College at Clearwater, Florida, where he has served and taught until a year or so ago. Having laboured at Clearwater for well over two decades, the Lord is giving him a wider ministry to speak at Conferences. His coming out to the Far East is God's seal of approval upon his faithful service. His Chinese friends call him "Mr Stainless Steele."

Dr Steele is not new to Singapore. In fact, he visited us in 1961 in the days FEBC was struggling to be born. We look forward to a time of wonderfully serving the Lord together. Pray for Dr & Mrs Steele as they plan to work amongst us for His Name's sake.

Dr Steele will culminate his ministry with speaking at FEBC's Bible Conference (open to all) at Awana, Genting Highlands, September 5-9,'88. FEBCers, especially, take note!

Kebaktian Indonesia

The Indonesian Service that worships at the Jerusalem Court, which physically is more like a Tabernacle in the Wilderness, needs your prayers and support. Founded Feb. 7,'82, it has carried on without a break to this day. Deacon & Mrs Charlie Chia play uncle and aunt to the infant church. Rev Frank Low comes once a month to administer the Lord's Supper. Kiantoro, an Indonesian young man from Tanjung Pinang now entering fourth year FEBC, is chairman of the pulpit.

As the congregation is highly mobile, being composed of FEBC and some other students, and temporary residents in Singapore, it is always in flux. We thank God, however, for the souls saved through the Kebaktian. Happily, we have Sis. Roska returning soon from Medan to take a special course under Dr Steele, before going over to Batam. Since Batam is not ready, her stay here may be more than 2 months. A Lover of God



For he was my schoolmate in Faith Seminary 30 years ago, and he was one of the few I've come to love and respect. Dr Arthur Steele is a man of God, yea, a lover of God.



The Story of Bukit Gambier

<u>Gambier</u> is a familiar Malay word for some tropical plant, but few among us urban dwellers know how it looks and what it is for. Chambers says it is an astringent substance prepared from the leaves of a shrub of the East Indies, and largely used in tanning and dyeing. Gambier was grown in Singapore by the early settlers.




Eighteen miles northeast of Muar is situated the township of Bukit Gambier. At this hilly region (<u>Bukit</u> means hill) there were gambier plantations. During the Communist uprisings in the fifties, Bukit Gambier became the nucleus of a "new village" where all the rural dwellers were concentrated behind barbed wires and para-military protection. (There were 600 of these new villages set up to starve out the Communists.) Today, all the new villages have become new towns and Bukit Gambier

is a thriving one at that.

Bukit Gambier is 13 miles inland from Rawang. In 1972, we helped Rawang build a handsome brick building seating 200 on two acres of prime land. A spirit of revival came upon the younger generation.

In 1983, the youth fellowship of Rawang Church started a children's work and Sunday School in a member's home at Bukit Gambier. As the work grew they obtained permission from this Church member to build an outhouse for a worship place. This cost Rawang Church



M\$12,000. For the last 5 years the work at Bukit Gambier, sustained by Rawang, has grown steadily. Today Bukit Gambier has a good-sized kindergarten and a worship attendance of 30-40. The new congregation has branched out further, with Rawang's cooperation, to start a Sunday School at Kundang Ulu, another dozen miles inland at the headwaters of the Muar River.

Coming back to Bukit Gambier, we see a spirit of self-reliance reflected in the congregation's gathering of a Building Fund that touches M\$46,000. Their desire is to grow out of the cramped outhouse whose lease is running out in two years. They have found a new corner two-storey terrace house in a nearby housing estate. This corner terrace house which was priced at M\$99,000 is today reduced to \$80,500, as Malaysia is everywhere overbuilt. As Elder Koa of Muar was returning to Muar last Tuesday, we took a quick lift with them. We went right up to the aforesaid new housing estate to make an inspection. We are well satisfied this was a good deal. Alternatively, there is another corner terrace house with extended land on the side, but the deal depends on how much extra we have to pay for this. If the price is favourable, this would be the choice. The view from this second terrace house is simply exhilarating.

At Session Meeting, it was decided we should help Bukit Gambier with a grant of \$\$10,000, and loan the rest free of interest. With this little effort, there will arise yet another Church and kindergarten in our Judean ministry. Meanwhile, Calvary Pandan has sent one of her Chinese members, a graduate of Chin Lien, to station at Bukit Gambier. God's Kingdom marches on! - Yours faithfully, T.T.

Kneeling buffalo spared from slaughter in HK

HONGKONG — Workers at an abattoir here refused to slaughter a water buffalo, forcing its owner to sell the animal to a Buddhist monastery, newspaper reports said.

The buffalo, imported from China, apparently knelt down on its forelegs and shed tears, refusing to be dragged into the slaughterhouse.

The 540 kg animal stood up only after butchers indicated that it would not be killed, the reports added. — AFP.

Such a tearful animal story reminds of what I've heard of China from Grandpa's own lips. It brings to mind also this paragraph from the Works of Mencius:

There was a King Hsuan of the kingdom of Tse who, while sitting high in his palace, saw a man leading an ox past. The King asked the man, "Where is the ox going?" The man replied, "We are going to consecrate a bell by his blood." The king said, "Let it go. I cannot bear its frightened appearance, as if it were an innocent man going to the place of death. The man asnwered, "Shall we then omit the consecration of the bell?" The King said, "How can that be omitted? Change it for a sheep."

Now, this should remind us all of what the prophet writes of "the Lamb of God that taketh away the sin of the world" (Jn 1:27). Isaiah says, "He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet he opened not his mouth: he was brought as a lamb to the slaughter, and as a sheep before her shearers is dumb, so he openeth not his mouth" (Isa 53:7).

Reader, there is also a day of execution waiting for us, ". . . it is appointed unto men once to die, but after this the judgment" (Heb 9:27). Indeed, "the wages of sin is death . . . " (Rom 6:23). The only way of reprieve from execution is to repent of our sins and look to the Saviour, like the kneeling buffalo spared from slaughter in Hong Kong because it "knelt down on its forelegs and shed tears."

"If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (I Jn 1:9). Reader, have you ever knelt before the Lord and plead for mercy so that you might live?



PASTORAL CHAT

My dear Readers,

"Calling the troops again to drum and colours"

Everyone with whom I've talked concerning the better property across the street agrees it will best meet the growing needs of our Church and College. But faith without works is dead! Unless we revive our long dormant EBF we are going to be caught flat-footed. Remember how a year before we won the tender to Woodlands, we launched the New Life B.F. God honoured our faith. And in four years the Lord prospered us to give almost \$3 million. Today, we have \$1.2 million roughly after loaning \$475,000 to help build two BP Churches. We need another \$2 million if we are to make it.

Praise the Lord, since our "calling the troops again to drum and colours" last week, according to a Chinese saying, over \$7,000 has come into the Lord's Treasury. Once again we pray the Lord's richest blessings on those who have rallied. From our experience those who have given liberally to the Lord have not decreased but increased.

I have been your pastor for 38 years. If we should attain our objective across the Street in our 40th year, will it not be a wonderful climax?! Will it not be thrilling to enter our Second Promised Land? If we count New Life, it will be our third!

"Christian Sorcerers!"

When Paul and Barnabas came to Paphos in their first missionary journey, they were confronted by a sorcerer and false prophet called Bar-jesus (or Elymas). As he came upon the Apostles in a frontal attack, he was easily spotted and immediately exposed.

Today, Satan comes as an angel of light. He comes not opposing Christ, but in the Name of Christ. Hence we are warned by our Lord of false Christs. They quote the Bible profusely, but they misapply and twist the Word to fit their own philosophy. Claiming to believe in His death for our sins, they preach not Christ's way of salvation but their own. They use Christ to further their own interests. Of such are great names like Norman Vincent Peale and Robert Schuller. Dave Hunt in "The Seduction of Christianity" (available from CLBC) exposes Schuller to be a Christian sorcerer. He says on p.15, "What does Schuller find wrong with the old gospel? Although Paul wrote that Christ came into the world to save sinners" (I Tim. 1:15) and Christ Himself said that He came to call "sinners to repentance" (Lk 5:32), Robert Schuller writes:

"I don't think anything has been done in the name of Christ and under the banner of Christianity that has proven more destructive to human personality and, hence, counterproductive to the evangelism enterprise than the often crude, uncouth, and unchristian strategy of attempting to make people aware of their lost and sinful condition."

Read Schuller's brand of Christiantiy above again! He does not oppose Paul like Bar-jesus frontally. He stabs him in the back. He is rightly called by Dave Hunt a sorcerer.

Dr. Cho Yonggi

What we are more concerned about, however, is Dr. Cho Yonggi, Korean pastor of the biggest Church in the world, who has visited Singapore. He comes under Dave Hunt's searchlight, and he is exposed to be another Christian sorcerer alongside Schuller. Avoiding the Cross he is another of the "Think and Grow Rich" preachers. He is a so-called faith healer who uses the Name of Jesus to build up his ecclesiastical empire. He does not serve Jesus his Lord, but lords himself over Jesus. He rides Jesus like the donkey getting on top of the Saviour when it entered Jerusalem.

Dave Hunt observes, "Anyone who imagines that because he thinks certain thoughts or speaks certain words God must respond in a certain way, has slipped into sorcery, and if not playing God, is at the very least attempting to manipulate God... Yonggi Cho declares:

"By the spoken word we create our universe circumstances... You create the presence of Jesus with your mouth... He is bound by your

lips and by your words..."

Paul Yonggi Cho declares: "Through visualisation and dreaming you can incubate your future and hatch the results." Dave Hunt comments: "Such teaching has confused sincere Christians into imagining that "faith" is a force that makes things happen because they believe. Thus faith is not placed in God, but a power directed at God. (p.24).

Dave Hunt's "The Seduction of Christianity" is a must for every Christian who is involved with present day faith healers and tongues rattlers (Cho Yonggi is another forefront charismatic). It is sad to learn that because he has the biggest Church in the world, it has become a sort of Mecca for Christians. We have heard of Singaporeans going to Korea with the purpose of seeing his Church.

How Cho Yonggi became the big man that he is today may be traced from his own words in his book "The Fourth Dimension, a guide to successful living", p.14-17. Briefly, he was praying for a Philippine mahogany desk, a roller chair and an American bicycle. After reading Romans 4:17, "God raises the dead, and calls those things that be not as if they



were", he announced to his congregation that he had received these things! When three young men demanded to see the items, he confesses in his book, "I was taken aback and frightened because I had not counted on having to show any of those things. These people were living in a slum area, and once they knew I had <u>lied</u>, it would be my last time to minister there..."

To get out of this quandary Cho Yonggi invented what he has called the "incubation" doctrine. He says that as it takes nine months for a baby to be born, so his idea of having got his desk, chair and bicycle would also take that period to materialise. He admitted that he had <u>lied</u>, but ended double-talking on "incubation." Read "The Seduction of Christianity" to be informed of today's false prophets and false Christs.

As we pen these observations of Dr. Cho, there comes to CLBC a consignment of Dr. Peter Master's latest book "The Healing Epidemic." In Ch.2 of this book where Dr. Masters writes on Cho Yonggi, he sums up his occult healing that builds the world's largest church:

"Korea has also for centuries been heavily influenced by Buddhism, particularly the form already mentioned which places great stress on healing and divining. It is taught that people do not need to be in bondage to their circumstances; they can by right attitudes, by concentration, and by uniting with the eternal realm, get above suffering and sickness. The religious disposition of the Koreans is both harrassed and exploited by the 'Christianity' of Paul Yonggi Cho in his blatant mix of sorcery, mind-over-matter, self-interest, Sinkyo, Japanese Buddhism and Christianity. But to mix pagan ideas and practices with the pure religion of Christ is condemned in Scripture as the heinous sin of idolatry. It is a marriage of Christianity and the occult, and it is forbidden by Paul's words - What communion hath light with darkness? And what agreement hath the temple with idols? What has built the largest church in the world? The answer is, an idolatrous mixture of Biblical teaching and pagan mind-techniques..."

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Proclamation of Singapore

WHEREAS it is the inationable right of a people to be free and independent:

AND WHEREAS Malaysia was established on the 16th day of September, 1963, by a federation of existing states of the Federation of Malaya and the States of Sabah, Sarawak and Singapore into one independent and sovereign mation:

AND WHEREAS by an Agreement made on the seventh day of August in the year one thousand nine hundred and sixty-five between the Government of Malaysia of the one part and the Government of Singapore of the other part it was agreed that Singapore should cease to be a state of Malaysia and should thereupon become an independent and sovereign state and nation separate from and independent of Malaysia:

AND WHEREAS it was also agreed by the parties to the said Agreement that, upon the separation of Singapore from Malaysia, the Government of Malaysia shall relinquish its assureignty and jurisdiction in respect of Singapore so that the said sovereignty and jurisdiction shall on such relinquishment yest in the Government of Singapore;

AND WHEREAS by a Proclamation dated the ninth day of August in the year one thousand nine hundred and sixty-live the Prime Minister of Malaysia Tunku Abdul Rahman Putra Al-Haj Ibni Almarhum Sultan Abdul Hamid Halim Shah did proclaim and declare that Singapore shall on the ninth day of August in the year one thousand nine hundred, and sixty-live gease to be a state of Malaysia and shall become an independent and sovereign state and nation separate from and independent of Malaysia, and recognised, as such by the Government, of Malaysia.

Now I LEE KUAN YEW Prime Minister of Singapore. DO HEREBY PROCLAIM AND DECLARE on behalf of the people and the Government of Singapore that as from today the ninth day of August in the year one thousand nine hundred and sixtyfive Singapore shall be forever a sovereign democratic and independent nation, founded upon the principles of liberty and justice and ever seeking the welfare and happiness of her-people in a more just and equal society.



While waiting on the Lord, Roska has returned to FEBC for another semester. She is helping around, and bending her energies on the Indonesian Service, every Lord's Day 4 pm. She helps also across the Causeway . . . Will you not uphold each one in prayer? "Lord, revive us again, that the Cause of Thy Kingdom may continue to advance through Life Church and through other B-P Churches."

Now, what we have briefly recounted above are immediate fields. We will not forget Burma, N. Thailand, N. Sumatra, Riau Islands, the Half-finished Filipino Churches, Australia, and last but not least, the Holy Land.



One theological principle that has blessed my life is the doctrine of "particular providence" - God's special care of His children, who are "of more value than many sparrows" (Matt.10:29-31). And of the sparrows Jesus says, "Are not two sparrows sold for a farthing? and one of them shall not fall on the ground without your Father." The doctrine of "particular providence," God's special care for me, is one principle I apply in making big or small decisions. Particularly, when going on a journey!

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For it is then, as we leave the security of home, that we need God to guide us at every crossroads. Shall I proceed when I am not sure of which way to turn? The knowledge that God watches over me and has a plan for my journey, fills my heart with confidence.

Last May we were booked to fly to Amman, en route to spending a month in Bethlehem to do some writing. When the situation there became red-hot, it was only sound common sense to by-pass Bethlehem and fly direct to New York. A prudent man foreseeth the evil, and hideth himself; but the simple pass on, and are punished." (Prov. 27:12). "Particular providence" requires also our making the right decisions in the light of God's Word. Our direct flight to New York proved very fruitful and profitable.

Last Lord's Day we were to launch out to Muar and Rawang immediately after the 10.30 a.m. service. But events before Sunday, one after another, seemed to deter our going upcountry. First, the Toyota Station wagon developed carburettor trouble. Second I had a left knee swelling which subsided by Friday. Came Saturday afternoon and the swelling started again. It became so bad Saturday night that I had to phone Muar to cancel our appointment. Sunday morning saw the swelling subside by 60% but still it ached at every movement. Sunday afternoon, it got worse again! Had I persisted to drive on after service, there ,would be great deficiency working on the clutch. While God has promised to take good care of His children, it would be hazardous to drive without full response of nerve and muscle.

All in all, this episode has taught me to respect the Law of Nature and to number my days, that I may apply my heart unto wisdom (Ps. 90:12). I hope this sharing of my

understanding of God's overall rule in our lives and our responsibility to our actions might help you make your daily decisions.

"Trust in the Lord with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge him, and he shall direct thy paths. Be not wise in thine own eyes: fear the Lord, and depart from evil" (Prov. 3:5-7). Amen.

Many a time I've felt an intense and almost intplerable longing for Darren to return to earth. Once I even wished that the Lord were here to raise Darren up, just as He had raised Lazarus. Yes, when one is grieving, one fantasises.

If you've been to Prayer Meeting regularly you'll recollect how I've been overcome by tears each time I testified. Today I'm able to thank our Creator who has provided an outlet for our grief. Yes, "tears have the ability to cleanse wounds that grief has inflicted and so healing can the more readily take place" (Jim Graham's Dying to Live, pg. 144). Trying to force oneself to be brave will not heal the heart. Today I've reached the stage of "Acceptance." I know that "whatever the Lord doeth, He doeth all things well."

Throughout my experience, I've been very much comforted by the Holy Spirit. "I will

not leave you comfortless. I will come to you" (John 14:18).
 Right now, I can say that my "wound" has been "stitched up," but a "scar" remains.
I've been able to withstand the tragedy because the Lord has given me the strength to carry on.

As I read about the young Malay mother who had to quit teaching because she had been painfully reminded of her five-year-old who was beaten to death by his stepmother, I thank the Lord that I need not take such a drastic step as to guit teaching so as not to be reminded of Darren. The Lord has not only brought me out of grief, but has provided a way for me to be on study leave for three years.

After the first two weeks of returning to student life, I was overcome by illness and depression. So I spent some time on my knees, praying to the Lord for encouragement. I thank the Lord that He pulled me out of depression and I've regained my confidence. With my Lord's help, I know I will be able to proceed with my course.

I also want to thank the Lord for the series of messages that has been preached the past four months. Rev Tow may sound "hectoring" when he reminds us constantly of the reality of death, but I believe we must wake up from our complacency, or, as Dr Lim put it last Sunday, our "comatose" state. The messages have indeed been encouraging and comforting to our grieving hearts. I've "weathered the storm" well because my faith has been strengthened by attending Elder Chia's Adult Class and the various church camps throughout the years. I look forward to an even closer walk with my Lord as I prepare for the Bible Conference at Awana. Yes, life must go on, and attending Bible camps, with or without Darren, will continue to be part of our lives. I can echo Bro. Eric Choong's words when he said that his faith had been strengthened by the Bible Camp held in April before his wife's homegoing.

On this note, my brother or sister, may I urge you to grow in faith by seeking the Lord through prayer and feeding upon the "meat." Do not wait until a tragedy strikes before you seek the Lord, for then your faith, unnurtured and weak, would be uprooted and you might not be able to come out of the "valley of tears"!

SALE, SALE, SALE (ONLY BUYERS NEED ENTER)!

ONLY BUYERS NEED ENTER!

My dear Readers,

Singaporeans are confronted by SALE, SALE, SALE slogans at the superstores all seasons of the year. But have you seen one that has a restrictive note: "Only Buyers Need Enter!" That would be tantamount to Dale Carnegie's "How to Win Friends and Influence People" being turned into "How to Lose Friends and Infuriate People."

• NEED ENTER! • There is a Church in Singapore that claims to be fundamental, but teaches that when Jesus offers the Gospel to all in John 3:16, He offers it only to all the elect, and not to all mankind. Is this not like saying SALE, SALE, SALE (ONLY BUYERS NEED ENTER) at the sale premises? Is this how people trade, and for that matter how we do business for the Lord (Matt. 25:14-30)?

When we teach that John 3:16 is a universal offer of the Gospel to whosoever would believe, we are condemned as four-point Calvinists. We are branded as being weak on "limited atonement." But what does Calvin, whom these critics claim to be their spiritual ancestor, say on John 3:16?

On page 74 of Calvin's Commentary on John's Gospel (W. B. Eerdmans Publ. Co.), he says, "And he has used a general term, both to <u>invite indiscriminately all</u> to share in life and to cut off every excuse from unbelievers. Such is also the significance of the term 'world' which he had used before. For although there is nothing in the world deserving God's favour, He nevertheless shows He is favourable to the whole world when He calls all without exception to the faith of Christ, which is indeed an entry into life."

Of John 1:29, "Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world," Calvin's remarks are these: "And when he says the sin of the world, he extends this kindness indiscriminately to the whole human race, that the Jews might not think the Redeemer has been sent to them alone. From this we infer that the whole world is bound in the same condemnation; and that all men without exception are guilty of unrighteousness before God, they have need of reconcilation. John, therfore, by speaking of the sin of the world in general, wanted to make us feel the misery and exhort us to seek the remedy. Now it is for us to embrace the blessing offered to all (not to the elect only), that each may make up his mind that there is nothing to hinder him from finding reconciliation in Christ if only, led by faith, he comes to Him" (page 32).

How can a person know he is elected to salvation? Answer: When he <u>believes</u> in the Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world. To believe and to be elected are two sides of the same coin. Cheer up, you who say "ONLY BUYERS NEED ENTER." According to your reasoning Christ should say, "For God so loved the elect that He gave . . .," which is not John 3:16.

Evangelism Begins in Every Pew

We have a Sunday afternoon evangelism that goes to Toa Payoh. We have a Sunday morning evangelism that goes with the Sunday School. But we seem to switch off evangelism at the big Church services! We can see an increasing number of new faces at both the 8.00 am and 10.30 am services.

Evangelism should begin in every pew! Old Lifers, that is your duty! Everyone of you! The pastor has his job, the elders and deacons theirs. So does every member of the Church according to Ezekiel 34:17, "And as for you, O my flock, thus saith the Lord God: Behold, I judge between cattle and cattle, between the rams and the he goats."



What does God require of you? You who are stronger and senior members of Life Church? Every Sunday, new friends are joining Life Church who sit either on your left or right. Being new, they need guidance. Since we purposely do not provide Bibles in the pews and newcomers may come without them, do you share your Bible with them? LOOKING UNTO JESUS crucified, to find in His shed blood our ransom, our pardon, our peace.

LOOKING UNTO JESUS risen, to find in Him the righteousness which alone makes us rightecus, and permits us, all unworthy as we are, to draw near with boldness, in His Name, to Him Who is His Father and our Father, His God and our God.

DR J. C. MARIS, GENERAL-SECRETARY, ICCC, WRITES PASTOR TOW

Dear Timothy,

How often have I planned to write you a letter of appreciation when I received one of your publications on John Sung, or when reading your weekly. But our daily occupations seemed to have priority. A Congress does not leave much opportunity for personal talks, and in that respect, is always disappointing. I would have loved to see you in Amsterdam, and I certainly missed you, though I could hardly expect to have time for refreshing our bonds of brotherly love--we were so very busy!

On coming back home I found a pile of letters and papers that demanded my attention. Among them was an article in the paper "Truth and Unity," a conservative Reformed publication. It represents a group of concerned members of the Reformed Churches (to which Mr Warnaar belonged). Earlier they had published a contribution from Mr J. P. de Klerk (New Zealand) about your churches in Singapore. This caused a reaction from a Mr K. Koers, who had visited Singapore about a year ago. The Editor then asked him to send a contribution telling about his experiences. I was thrilled to read it and I am enclosing a photostat. If I had time enough, I would love to translate it for you. And, indeed, if desired, I shall be most happy to do so later on. For the time being I must limit myself to a general survey.

The main heading is, "GOD'S WORD IN THE WORLD." The heading "Amazing Grace" refers to one of the pamphlets Mr Koers received when he visited your church. Under that caption you find some introductory remarks by the Editor, Rev J. B. van Mechelen.

Mr Koers' article follows under the heading, "A Living Church in Singapore." He first gives a description of the city of Singapore, its modern buildings, skyscrapers, beautiful parks, and outskirts. The highway to the Airport is called "a jewel." Singapore is a very clean city. The population is mixed. First impression: an islamic town. But Mr Koers is surprised to discover that there were so many Christians.

Upon entering a department store, he noticed a photoshop owned by a Chinese. On the counter was a box with flyers "God Cares." The proprietor did not offer his merchandise, but . . . one of the flyers. (I see that on re-reading the whole I am tempted to give you more than a summary, so I had better go on !!)

Mr Koers did not expect to find any <u>reformed</u> church, so he thought he would worship in a Baptist Church, or even a Pentecostal group, as he hoped to find a purer exposition of the Word of God than in the usually liberal ecumenical Anglican or Presbyterian churches. But in the same department store on the 5th floor he discovered a Christian bookshop. When looking around he saw a booklet written by Dr Tow dealing with the difference between Calvin and Arminius, published by Life Bible-Presbyterian Church, and indicating that this was a Reformed Church.

The girl at the counter told Mr Koers that she used to go there herself, and she even designed a plan, so that he would be able to find the church. It was quite a distance, but he easily got there. The girl at the desk of the hotel wished me a good service, and on my return she asked whether I had enjoyed the meeting, Mr Koers says. Then follows a description of the building with some 500 seats, a number of large annexes, and an open square for parking.

"I was early, and in the hal. I was received by a number of people who shook hands with me. A man, who evidently originated from India, handed me a church paper and some other literature, and then showed me my seat. The church was already filled for twothirds, part of it was separated by a curtain. Apparently there was a catechism class for young people of about twenty, some in Chinese, others in Malay, and others in English. It was revealing to me. I could not count the number of Chinese-speaking youngsters, but the number in front of the partition was, I think, between 100 and 120. They held the Bible in their hands, listening to the teacher, and taking notes.

"Round about ten o'clock the partition was removed. The Chinese group went to a Chinese service. Then the church became filled. Though there were elderly people, I think that about 60% of the audience was made up by young people. No children. There was a special service for them in one of the annexes. There were only two other whites. Just like in The Netherlands, the service was preceded by announcements. The order of the service was almost as in The Netherlands. There was a choir, but they did not wear gowns. Singing was from a Hymn Book. Rev Tow did not wear a gown either. The church did not have embroidered carpets or other decorations.

"Rev Tow read John 1. The Bible (which I had received from the girl in the Christian bookshop, and who was sitting behind me) had verses in red and black. The pastor would read the black, and the congregation said the red ['responsive reading is unknown to the Dutch,' JCM]. The text was John 1:29 (on the Lamb of God). The preacher pointed to all the places in the Bible that deal with the lamb, and closed with referring to the Lamb



in the Book of Revelation. By way of application, he asked whether our names were written in the book. I cannot repeat the whole sermon, but I have been strengthened by it. It is marvellous to experience the communion of the saints. I noticed that the majority of the Scripture references were looked up by the youngsters.

"The service lasted for about two hours. After the meeting I made my acquaintance with the pastor and some of the elders. A great deal of the congregation spread over the annexes, where youngsters under the age of 20 were still being taught. I met again with the girl from the Christian bookshop who had given me the address of the church. She was busy selling Christian literature.

"In the annexes there was also a restaurant where many Chinese people were eating. It appeared that the whole of the church life for the English- and Chinese-speaking members took place between 0900 and 1300 hrs, and that in the afternoon services were held for Koreans, Thais, and some other nationalities.

"I also had a talk with the other white couple that attended the service. They came from Australia. The man was an Anglican priest. He said he was strongly attracted by the doctrine of the Reformation. Back in the hotel awaited another surprise. The reading room was occupied by an evangelistic group and there was a church service in the nightclub. Another church meeting went on in the hotel from 0900 to 1300 hrs.

"All in all an unforgettable day, which gave hope for the Church. Later on I heard that a great number of doctors and teachers of secondary schools in Singapore were Christians."

So far Mr Koer's story. I translated it to the best of my ability, though somewhat hurriedly. But I myself enjoyed reading it. It strikes me, however, that the author did not say anything about the other B-P churches in Singapore. Nor did he mention the ICCC. Yet we found that he has been reading our paper <u>Getrouw</u> for a number of years, and has often sent us a little gift.

Timothy, you brethren have been greatly blessed by the Lord. You may well realise that the Christians in this part of the world are now more familiar with a situation like yours. Praise the Lord! . . .


FEBC BIBLE CONFERENCE REPORT by Mrs Linda Chan

Two hundred and forty campers set out on Monday morning, September 5, 1988, via coach, train and plane to converge at the beautiful Awana Country Club, 8 miles Genting Highlands, to spend five days of sweet fellowship with one another and with our Risen Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Praise God for journey mercies to and from Awana. Our hearts are thankful to the Lord for the spiritual grounding in matters pertaining to "Declaring All the Counsel of God in Perilous Times," through the study of the great prophets of old, namely, Elijah and Elisha. Messages on "Elijah--the Prophet of Fire" and "Elisha--the Prophet of Water" were expounded by Dr Arthur Steele and our dear Pastor respectively.

This fire was started by an old woman who burnt joss papers to the hungry ghosts. May some victim of this holo-cause "turn from idols to serve the living and true God" (I Thess 1:9). We were well received by several other homes which we entered to visit and pray.

I want to thank the Lord for restoring me to perfect health by the seafood and briny breezes under a hot sun. Also for bringing us back in good time to send the Steeles to the airport. Truly the Lord is good to His own children.

I try to introduce new songs as much as possible, and we have one from Awana. However, "Each Step of the Way," published this week, lacks something. That something I've tried to bring up by adding stanzas 3 & 4. I have our struggling younger generation in mind. Lord, help them through this new song as they sweat it out in school, junior college or N.S. - T.T.

#### DR ARTHUR STEELE'S FAREWELL LETTER

"If we walk in the light, as He is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanseth us from all sin" (I John 1:7).

I am, writing this from Tanjung Pinang on the last day of our 8-week ministry in the Far East. Yesterday and today we have again seen the evidence of the blessed fellowship in Jesus Christ. As our boat from Singapore docked at Tanjung Pinang, Dr Timothy Tow, my wife and I were met by Pastor Joseph Liu and his wife Esther of the Presbyterian Church, and two other members. We had a time of fellowship at a seafood restaurant which was most enjoyable. Of even greater blessing to my wife and me was our meeting Christians at their shops as we walked through the town and then visited in their homes. Precious were the times of prayer with them when the Holy Spirit bore witness with our spirit that we are one in God's family.

In Indonesia, as at Singapore, we have been impressed again that those whom we have never met before came to know Jesus Christ as Saviour just as my wife and I have--halfway around the world! What a testimony to the truth of God's Word and evidence of the Lord of Calvary.

The privilege of ministering the Word at FEBC was an opportunity, honor and joy that I would not have expected the Lord would give to us in our retirement years from Clearwater Christian College. We have been greatly enriched, blessed and encouraged by the choice students God directed to FEBC. My wife and I love them dearly. We sensed keenly their love for us as we sensed their love for their Principal. I trust every member of the FEBC Board, and every pastor of the B-P Churches will always realize the strategic importance of the College in its far-reaching ministry. The testimonies of the students from so many nations and their burden for their people made a great impact in us. Again, what great confirmation of the truth of I John 1:7.

We are grateful for the many invitations to speak in sixteen B-P Churches during our time in Singapore. There was great freedom to preach and I believe I know the reason why. These churches have been faithfully taught the Word so the congregations were of a ready heart and mind to receive the Word. The same was true at Awana and at the Sunset Gospel Hour meetings.

Lord willing, my wife and I will return next July to teach at FEBC. We want to say thank-you to the FEBC Board for the invitation.

Last, and of particular significance, was the providence of God in bringing Dr Timothy Tow and me together in 1958, 30 years ago, at Faith Theological Seminary in Philadelphia. I had left the business world, at age 36, with 4 children, and enrolled in seminary. I almost quit, but God spoke to me and brought me into close fellowship with Timothy Tow. I feel a real debt of gratitude to him and now the Lord has given me the privilege of serving together with him and with so many other Christians in the fellowship of His Word. I John 1:7 is indeed true.

#### PASTORAL CHAT

My dear Readers,

#### It is later than you think!

Last week I wrote about Sudan, Bangladesh, Jamaica and Mexico, and the deluge that has come upon these lands, overturning ten-thousands of homes with loss of lives in thousands. If we live in these lands and become numbered among the victims, we will wake up to the nearness of His coming.

Because we are favoured with peace and plenty and are smiled upon by nature, we are oblivious of trouble ahead. We need to be reminded by the Prophetic Word! Hear what Paul says to the Thessalonians: "For yourselves know perfectly that the day of the Lord so cometh as a thief in the night. For when they shall say, Peace and safety; then sudden destruction cometh upon them, as travail upon a woman with child; and they shall not escape" (I Thess 5:2,3). Let me ask you, dear Reader, if you will be "caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air" (I Thess 4:17) at His Second Coming? (Thanks, YAF, for your labour of love in the projection). This film is being shown to 10 constituences in our B-P Church. May God give every Church souls for hire!

In my sermon on Noah last week at the 8.00 am service, I mentioned how he and his family put all their resources into the building of the Ark. If we realise how short-lived our future is in the light of Christ's return, we will also throw in our lot with the Lord. Wherever there is need to extend His Kingdom, we will not hold back.

#### Two Unfinished Filipino Churches

For our immediate needs, there are the two unfinished Filipino Churches in Manila that require our sustenance. We need another US\$20,000 to finish the job! May God's Spirit speak to your heart to give before I leave Nov. 15 for the Philippines to lecture at Rev Dan Ebert's School of Biblical Studies.

We commend Elder and Mrs Chia Kim Chwee to the Lord as they head for Melbourne to relief Elder and Mrs Khoo Peng Kiat who are soon returning. The Chinese saying, "Those who have money give money, those who have strength give strength," expresses the spirit of our service.

Lastly, there is the recent revival of our Extension Building Fund. If the Lord should grant us the choice property across our street by His appointed time, we will not deserve our heritage if we do nothing until then! Faith without works is dead! To make the bomb only when the War is declared is to lose for sure!

#### Redoubling FEBC's Training Programme

Because the Lord is coming soon, we are redoubling FEBC's traning programme. We have sixty students from ten nations. Won't you pray with us and for us that each year we may graduate an increasing number and send them back to their respective countries?!

Last week I mentioned Linda of Indonesia now studying music in Holland and also her loving gift to the alma mater. This week let me give you this paragraph from Michael Koech, FEBCer 1987. Writing from Kenya, he says, "I praise the Lord that I was able to study at FEBC. The Lessons that I learned are very helpful in my ministry, even the informal instructions you occasionally gave either in class or around the table during meals. I share some of these tips with our students and other friends.

"The Reformed Tract Distributors of Life BPC printed some Swahili tracts for us and Charles Seet who initiated this work has mailed some to us; some are now in the mail. These tracts have been helpful to us in evangelism and our thanks be to RTD for what they have done.

"Our Bible institute is now 1½ years old; we have six students and three fulltime teachers and one part-time. In our current term I teach Christian Doctrine, Church History and Homiletics. The Lord has so far provided basic physical facilities needed. We have two classrooms, an fice cum library, a dormitory (partly used as staff house) and a newly completed dining hall, kitchen and store. The hall also serves as a venue for a local church. Early this month we had students from America visiting. They were invited by Rev Ray Carlson who works with us. Two of them are students of Dr Steele at Clearwater. I showed them what you wrote in the weekly about him. One of them, a young man, is interested in coming to FEBC. P.S. If possible, may I have a copy of your recent book THE ASIAN AWAKENING."



#### "By All Means Save Some" (I Cor. 9:22)

When over 800 (according to a Calvary Pandan elder's estimation) saw the film of the Blind Korean Pastor last Sunday night, I can safely say that my expectation of 3,000 for 13 showings in all BPCs is exceeded. (There were 600 at Life BPC.) Many who came to see. this Gospel film were first-timers, who had never entered a Church before. Whether Christian or non-Christian, practically everyone left the Church with tear-washed eyes and

in sombre mood. Yes, tears were profusely shed in sympathy with the Blind Pastor in his deepest sorrows. And mingled with the tears were no doubt tears of repentance and of consecation or reconsecration. Man likes the outward appearance of a showing of hands, but God looketh on the heart (I Sam 16:7).


Though there was the hang-up of a picture of Jesus with the sacred heart at the shack where the Blind Pastor started his Church, the Gos-

pel was powerfully preached through his return to the Lord from a prodigal life, and his dedication to minister to the blind and distressed. The first song, "Barley Fields," which was composed during the Korean War, told of a life lost without Christ, like wandering in the Barley Fields in the twilight. The Second Song, "Jesus Came and Touched Me," tells of the Blind Pastor's deliverance after his abortive suicide attempt. The Third, "O Come Unto the Lord," a famous hymn composed by a Korean Evangelist, is Korea's interpretation of the Story of the Prodigal Son through music. "The Precious Blood of Jesus Christ that pardons sins" was sung by two blind girls. O Lord, continue to use the two new Korean Hymns mightily, as they are being sung in our Churches--a new breath of life fusing into many a languishing heart!

The debut of the Film at the Sunset Gospel Hour, with a give-away of John Sung Revival Sermons Vol. I, was a tremendous boost to a new series of Gospel messages planned for the last quarter of the year. Pray that the Lord will anoint the lips of every Gospel messenger, and for me as I deliver the opening message this evening under the theme, "The Great Invitation."

#### Concrete Evidence of Your Gospel Investment





She was thrilled to see the auditorium fully packed. Isn't this a ten-fold dividend from the A\$140,000 offered by a sister of Life Church for its purchase 2 years ago? As the Church has reached its saturation point for accommodation, the committee has felt the time has come for extension and renovation. Lifers are taking an important part in the leadership of the Perth Church, and I hope Lifers in Singapore will not forget their brethren downunder. Every help will be appreciated by our brethren holding the fort there.



#### Our Stepping Stone to Batam Found!

When Rev Kim Kyung Soo my (FEBC) student informed me of a multinational shipyard taking shape on Batam Island under the management of Mr Hwang Kyu Tai, a Deacon of the Korean Church, I was persuaded here was our stepping stone to Batam. We spent half a day Oct. 5th exploring the Island in the Shipyard's car, Mr Hwang himself leading the way. After going through several sprouting townships, he finally took us to his domain, P.T. Batamas dala Nusantara at Tanjung Uncang.

Starting operations but a year-and-a-half ago, the colony now has 13 Korean (9 are Christians) and over 40 Indonesian labourers.

By next January, the total workforce should exceed 200.

Our visit to Batamas Shipyard seemed timed of the Lord to answer a Macedonian call. Mr Hwang is delighted that Roska could come to evangelise in their midst. For, situated at a beautiful spot overlooking the sea is a pocket-sized church he had built, before anything else. This little church is airconditioned. Every Lord's Day the Koreans worship here. But he would see Indonesians converted and join in the service of the Lord. He offers our missionary free quarters and every assistance. Batamas Shipyard is 20 minutes' drive from Sekupang, one of two ports of entry to Batam. Pray that if it be the Lord's will, Roska would start work on Batam Island January 1989. (The advantage of location on Batam is that Roska can henceforth come to Singapore without paying that exhorbitant exit tax of S\$350. The sea-trip between Singapore and Batam takes 40 minutes.) - T.T.

#### COURT GRANTS DETAINEE'S APPLICATION

KUALA LUMPUR - The High Court here yesterday granted an application by detainee Jamaluddin Othbecamee Jamainddin Oth-man for a writ of habeas corpus to be freed from de-tention under the Internal Security Act.

Justice Datuk Anuar Zainal Abidin, in allowing the application, said the detention order was null and void as it was made against the Federal Consti-tution and outside the purview of the Act.

Jamaluddin, who is also known as Yeshua Jama-luddin, had been detained at the Kamunting deten-tion centre in Taiping on five charges under the Act in relation to his alleged activities which it was said

00 would cause tension and enmity between Muslims ťЪ and Christians and could endanger the country's security.

curity. In his oral judgment, Justice Datuk Anuar held that Article 11 of the Fed-eral Constitution gave ev-ery person the right to profess and practise his re-ligion and, subject to Clause (4), to propagate it. Clause (4) states that the state law and, in re-spect of the federal terri-tories of Kuala Lumpur Times Straits

The tories of Kuala Lumpur and Labuan, lederal law may control or restrict the propagation of any reli-glous doctrine or belief among persons professing the religion of Islam.

The judge said that this article was conspicuously absent under Article 149 of article the Constitution pertaining to the legislation against subversion, action prejudi-cial to public order. "I understand that what-

ever law that is enacted under Article 149 shall not be inconsistent with the

provision of Article 11 and no act under the law enacted under Article 149 can be done inconsistent with

be done inconsistent with the provision of Article 11," the judge said. "That is to say, to my understanding, the ISA does not cover or have the power to restrict the pro-vision under Article 11." The tudge said it sources

The judge said if power was exercised under the ISA which affected the rights and freedom of a person exercising his religion and propagating its reli-"to my mind, it would be on illegal exercise of such power

Earlier, in his submissions, defence counsel Lee Min Choon, for Jamalud-din, contended that his client was detained because of his personal religion and his religious activities and that he would not be released until he renounced Christianity and converted back to Islam.

#### **Tension** and hostility

Mr Lee added that in the Mr Lee added that in the circumstances, the act of detaining Jamaluddin was unlawful, mala fides (bad faith), outside of the scope of the ISA and a blatant violation of not only his constitutional right to lib-erty but also his right to profess, practise and prop-agate the religion of his choice. choice. Senior federal counsel

Mohammed Raus Shariff submitted that the detention order was valid, claiming that Jamalud-din's involvement in an organised plot to Christianise Malays could cause tension and hostility among the two religions. - Bernama.

My dear Readers,

#### 38th Anniversary Reminiscences

As our Church is celebrating her 38th Anniversary next week the Lord seems to lead me with a purpose to read of another 38th anniversary! It relates to Israel and Moses leading them in their Wilderness Journey: "And the space in which we came from Kadeshbarnea, until we were come over the brook Zered, was thirty and eight years; until all the generation of the men of war were wasted out from among the host, as the Lord sware unto them" (Deut 2:14). These 38 years of the Israelites were years of oblivion, like serving a prison sentence, because of Israel's unbelief that stalled their quick entry to the Promised Land. They are a warning to the Church today, and by God's grace Life Church has been spared from aimless wandering. By God's grace, since we started out at Prinsep Street 38 years ago, we have followed rather in Joshua's footsteps to conquer our Promised Lands.

Now, as Moses also recounted how the Lord led them to victory over the Amorite kings this side Jordan, it behoves us also to review the outreaches of our Church since 1950. Can you follow these milestones? -

Report on Layang Layang by Deacon Mani (FEBC Graduate)

Thanks be to God for giving me the privilege to serve Him in Layang Layang. Thank God also for strength and safety in travel over the months. I also want to thank you, members of Life Church, for your prayers and financial support for this ministry. Indeed, God, in answer to your prayers, has shut the mouths of the Hindu temple authorities and Malaysian Indian Congress officials who had vehemently objected to our preaching of the Gospel to the Tamils in the estate. Moreover, God has also provided helpers in the persons of Pastor Burt [Subramaniam]

who administers Holy Communion, John Kanna from Ulu Tiram who helps in the children's work, Preacher David Wong of Kulai Besar and other Bethlehem Jurong and New Life Church members who go up with me regularly.

At present, the children, 10 to 15 of them, meet at 2 pm every Friday. The Worship Service, on the same day, is held between 5 pm to 6.30 pm every week except on the second Friday. Due to the fact that the Catholics use the church premises on this day, worship service on the second week is delayed to 6 pm. The regular attendance is about 20. Recently we had two new-comers, namely, Mdm Arokiamary and Mrs Harikeran.

I do covet your prayers for the spiritual growth of the children as well as the adults. Do also pray for the salvation of more estate-workers, especially for George, Vilayan, Harikeran and Manoharan.

#### The Reviving Power of Hymn-singing

Writing on Luther and German Hymnody, Philip Schaff the Church historian discusses the place of music in the Protestant Church, "It introduced congregational singing in the place of the chanting of priests and choirs. The hymn became, next to the German Bible and the German sermon, the most powerful missionary of the evangelical doctrines of sin and redemption, and accompanied the Reformation in its triumphal march. Printed as tracts, the hymns were scattered wide and far,

and sung in the house, the school, the church and on the street. Many of them survive to this day, and kindle the flame of devotion."

Believing with Luther that sacred music is next to theology, we have endeavoured to introduce new hymns and songs on this Weekly sheet in order to bring refreshing and reviving to our parched souls.

The showing of the <u>Blind Korean Pastor</u> has introduced three new songs to our Singapore Churches. Most familiar is "O Come Back to the Lord," which we have taken from the English translation of the Korean Hymnal.

With the writing of lyrics in English on our part for "Jesus Came and Touched Me" and "The Prodigal Son" to the tune of Barley Fields, we have now the three new songs in print. A good number of you have got both lyrics and music from CLBC.

We have the same song in Chinese taught to Life Chinese Service, and they too are singing.

My dear Readers,

#### A New Promised Land in Our 40th Year!

In my sermon last week, I noted that the 38th Anniversary of our Church has a parallel in Israel's 38th year of wandering. Having "served their sentence" the nation was rid of the older generation and their unbelief. Now, there had arisen a new generation, born in the desert, full of life and vitality to do battle for the Lord. At God's command, they sprang to action. Numbers 21:21-35 tells the epic story of Israel's blitzkrieg over Sihon, king of the Amorites and Og, king of Bashan who occupied the eastern lands outside Jordan. This was followed by war with the Midianites in Numbers 31 whom Israel vanquished without loss of a single man.

Now, as we enter the 39th year, there is also a parallel between us and Israel! We have two 3/4 Finished Filipino Churches to help complete. All we need, after an influx that came into the Treasury last Lord's Day, is only \$18,000. Can we find this sum in the next three weeks?

Then I told you of a pressing need in Perth--to extend the present Church auditorium which is much too small for a congregation of over 250, and more new arrivals will find no space to worship. A brother reading of Perth's plight handed me \$1,000 after service. So, there are Lifers mindful also of Perth!

Our New Promised Land is just across the road. Will the owner sell us by 1990? The answer depends a great deal on whether we are quick to respond to the Lord's call today. Tomorrow is what we make of it today, or need we have to take another 38 years to learn it?

One blessing I can assure you, concerned Reader, is that long life and good health, as was bestowed on Joshua and Caleb, will be yours when you serve Him wholeheartedly. That's my experience through the last 38 years as your pastor. - T.T.

### A Page of Church History for Reformation Sunday

#### (From Philip Schaff)

Tetzel travelled with great pomp and circumstance through Germany, and recommended with unscrupulous effrontery and declamatory eloquence the indulgences of the Pope to the large crowds who gathered from every quarter around him. He was received like a messenger from heaven. Priests, monks, and magistrates, men and women, old and young, marched in solemn procession with songs, flags, and candles, under the ringing of bells, to meet him and his fellow monks, and followed them to the church; the papal bull on a velvet cushion

was placed on the high altar, a red cross for the indulgence money. Such chests are still preserved in many places. The preachers, by daily sermons, hymns, and processions, urged the people, with extravagant laudations of the Pope's bull, to purchase letters of indulgence for their own benefit, and at the same time played upon their sympathies for departed relatives and friends whom they might release from their sufferings in purgatory "as soon as the penny tinkles in the box" . . .

There he provoked the protest of the Reformer, who had already in the summer of 1516 preached a sermon of warning against trust in indulgences, and had incurred the Elector's displeasure by his aversion to the whole system, although he himself had doubts about some important questions connected with it.


Luther experienced the remission of sin as a free gift of grace to be apprehended by a living faith. This experience was diametrically opposed to a system of relief by means of payments in money. It was an irrepressible conflict of principle. He could not be silent when that barter was carried to the very threshold of his sphere of labour. As a preacher, a pastor, and a professor, he felt it to be his duty to protest against such measures: to be silent was to betray his theology and his conscience. . . .

After serious deliberation, without consulting any of his colleagues or friends, but following an irresistible impulse, Luther resolved upon a public act of unforeseen consequences. . . .

Accordingly, on the memorable thirty-first day of October, 1517, which has ever since been celebrated in Protestant Germany as the birthday of the Reformation, at twelve o'clock he affixed (eithe- himself or through another) to the doors of the castle church at Wittenburg, ninety-five Latin Theses on the subject of indulgences, and invited a public discussion. . . . He chose the eve of All Saints' Day (Nov. 1), because this was one of the most frequented feasts, and attracted professors, students, and people from all directions to the church, which was filled with precious relics. . . .

The Theses were copied, translated, printed, and spread as on angels' wings throughout Germany and Europe in a few weeks. . .

We have thus set before us in this manifesto, on the one hand, human depravity which requires lifelong repentance, and on the other the full and free grace of God in Christ,

which can only be appropriated by a living faith. This is, in substance, the evangelical doctrine of justification by faith (although not expressed in terms), and virtually destroys the whole scholastic theory and practice of indulgences. By attacking the abuses of indulgences, Luther unwittingly cut a vein of mediaeval Catholicism; and by a deeper conception of repentance which implies faith, and by referring the sinner to the grace of Christ as the true and only source of remission, he proclaimed the undeveloped principles of evangelical Protestantism, and kindled a flame which soon extended far beyond his original intentions. #### STATEMENT ON DISSOLUTION OF THE BIBLE-PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF SINGAPORE

The Bible-Presbyterian Church of Singapore (B-PCS), at its 38th Synod Annual General Meeting held on 30th October 1988 at Life B-P Church, considered the recommendation made earlier by the Synod Standing Committee and other B-P ordained ministers that the B-PCS be dissolved. This recommendation had earlier been referred to the individual B-P Churches for consideration at their respective Boards of Elders, Sessions or Congregations.

The Synod accepts this recommendation by the required majority vote and hereby declares the B-PCS voluntarily dissolved.

The decision was arrived at after much prayerful consideration and discussion over certain protracted issues. These issues centred mainly on strong differences in interpreting the Doctrine of Biblical Separation, Fundamentalism, and Neo-Evangelicalism. Concerted attempts were made during the past two years at reconciliation through personal discussions and formal meetings. Even a moratorium failed to resolve these differences and break the impasse. Dissolution is accepted as the last resort.

With the dissolution of the B-P Synod, each B-P Church nevertheless continues to retain its autonomy by virtue of its individual registration with the Government. Each B-P Church is answerable to God Almighty and to the Lord Jesus Christ, Head of the Church Universal.

May this parting of ways bring an end to the deadlock that has hindered the progress of the BP-CS. And may God help each individual B-P Church hold fast to the precious Biblical Separatist and Fundamentalist position, till He comes. Amen.

#### PASTORAL CHAT

#### My dear Readers,

#### Let Dr Buswell, My Teacher, Comment

The dissolution of BP-CS may come as a shock to you, younger members of the Church and to our overseas Readers. Some lament it like attending a funeral. As for me, I praise the Lord for the solution of an impasse that has blockaded us the last two years. For me, dissolution is not only solution, but resurrection! Now, dissensions in the Church, from time immemorial, is not an uncommon thing.

In this matter Dr Buswell my teacher, in his Systematic Theology on the Church, comments: "Dissensions, <u>aireseis</u>, are regrettable (Gal. 5:20). Thayer defines <u>aireseis</u> as 'Dissensions arising from diversity of opinions.' But Paul plainly says that dissensions, as choices of opinion, are necessary. Doubtless he means to say that they are necessary in view of the frailty of our minds, but he says they are necessary in order that the approved may become evident (I Cor 11:19). It was far better that Peter and Paul divided the territory and did not seek to rule over one another when they separated in Jerusalem

"To imply that the existence of denominations recognising one another as branches of the Church, is a sin, or a reproach, is to voice a wholly unscriptural opinion. [On the other hand] the word 'schism' whenever it refers to the Church in the N.T., refers to quarrelsomeness and never applies to a peaceable division among Christians who cannot see eye to eye in all matters which they consider important. As the word is used in Matthew 9:16 and Mark 2:21, it refers to a literal tear in a piece of cloth . . . .

"In I Corinthians 1:10ff, Paul is rebuking silly partisanships within the Church of Corinth, caused by the false loyalty to different personalities, all of whom agreed on the great principles of the Gospel . . .

"But Paul continues, 'It is necessary indeed there be choices of opinion (Buswell) among you in order that those who are approved may become apparent among you.' . . . If as Paul so plainly says, 'Those who are approved' are, by the dissensions, 'made manifest,' it would appear that those who are disapproved are to be judged and blamed as the cause of the dissensions."

Leaving Buswell's valuable commentary, and returning to our Synod's dissolution F will not say which side in the struggle within the BP-CS is right or wrong. Let time be the judge. Let history be our guide, as it is recorded, "But David waxed stronger and stronger, and the house of Saul waxed weaker and weaker" (II Sam 3:1). - T.T.

My family, especially my father, prayed to the Lord to heal me. I prayed and my weak body was strengthened. Praise the Lord for answering my prayer.





Nov. 1, 1988

I trust this letter arrives before you leave for the Philippines. We had difficulty getting the picture and mailing it because of the storms that have been passing by. This is the end of the typhoon season and there have not been many sunny days of late. The last typhoon to pass by came very close and quite strong. Electricity was down

and travel was difficult. The Post Office was closed for a number of days. We had hoped to mail this on Monday but the President declared Monday and Tuesday as non-working holidays so the Post Office will not open at least until tomorrow.

As you can see from the picture <u>Pastor Manza-</u> no's <u>church [at Taytay]</u> is coming along quite well. Most of the work however has been done on the inside. They are now meeting up stairs and construction is continuing to progress.

We have not yet heard from the provincial churches concerning storm damage. But the city churches seem to have come through all right.

We look forward to your visit wich great anticipation. I realise that your schedule is very heavy and we do appreciate your love for the Philippines in coming to minister to us again.

I have been laid aside for a little while and been able to re-read your two books on John Sung. There is no question, of course, that he was a man especially called of God for a particular ministry. Yet in this re-reading some thoughts have formed in my mind concerning the effectiveness of his work. I notice three things strongly effecting all that he did. First, the simplicity of his message. Perhaps marked by the throwing away of his secular diplomas. Second, the simplicity of life. This was surely marked by his lack of concern for worldly possessions. From what I read he was totally uninterested not only in this world's goods but in prestige as well. Finally, a simplicity of commitment. His message seemed to ring with the idea that the believer has no choice but to live fully for God. He did not make excuses. All may not be preachers or missionaries but all must be a witness in life and action. We might do well to pray that all of us, our young men in particular, might learn this Christ-like simplicity and once again turn Asia on fire for God.

I will close for now. Our prayers are with you as you travel. We will be waiting expectantly for you at the airport. We are praying that the pastors might find a greater understanding of commitment and faithfulness as you minister to them through your teaching and testimony.



While we might use it on luxurious items such as carpeting the FEBC Library, there it is used to buy hollow blocks and cement, with free labour supplied from their own bare hands. Praise the Lord, your response last Lord's Day was overwhelming! This Lord's Day is your last opportunity to give to the two 3/4 Finished Churches, for we leave tomorrow Nov. 14. We return Nov. 24. We have also a dozen younger churches in Malaysia who look to us for guidance or sustenance. Then there are four B-P Churches in Australia that have sprung up the last three years. All these are our responsibilities. As for Burma, we hope to hear from Rev Thawm Luai soon. Indonesia's newest opening is Batam, only 40 minutes away by motor launch. Batam will soon be entered by none other than Roska, whose singing of the three Korean songs from the Blind Korean Pastor's film is now heard in 300 homes! Pray for Roska.

#### My Testimony

#### by Hoh Ee Ling

In July 1987 when I was in JC 2, we discussed the topic "religion" in our GP (General Paper) lessons. I had this belief that religion was a creation of man. But God proved me wrong.

One Saturday afternoon someone came to my house to share the Gospel with me. I invited him in. I asked my brother out too as I was afraid that this man might be a crook. I told him my view and he started quoting some verses. I didn't bother to listen and left him talking to my brother instead. After he left, my ear lobe began to feel painful later in the day. I ignored it. But it began to swell and a cyst formed. It grew to a diameter of 1.5 cm; it hurt and I had trouble sleeping every night. A doctor referred me to SGH for an operation to remove the cyst, but it burst before the date of operation and blood and pus flowed out. My brother suggested that I had perhaps offended God and this was punishment for me. I was frightened. He then handed me a rosary and told me to put it under my pillow that night. Thinking this would appease God, I took it. I had a very peaceful sleep that night.

The following morning I went to a hospital and the doctors decided I should have an operation. I insisted against it, for I believed that God would heal it. It was cured by itself after some time.

My brother brought me to his church, the Blessed Sacrament Church. The whole process of the mass attracted me, for it seemed so holy. I thought I had found God. I continued attending the Catholic church, not realising I was in darkness. My life was very sinful and I got worst during the vacations when I led a very materialistic life. I kept this from my classmates, some of whom were from the Life Bible Class, because I knew that Protestants and Catholics were "not on good terms." I didn't want to lose their friendship. But it slipped out of my tongue one day. The sisters from LBC were very worried for me and one of them called me up. I refused to listen to her and was very persistent in my "faith."

The Lord, however, was very gracious to me. One of the sisters invited me to the Sunset Gospel Hour at Calvary Pandan. There the Lord opened my heart. I began to ponder over the verse, "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me." I searched for the truth.

Although I read many books concerning the differences between Christianity and Roman Catholicism, I only got more confused. One day, however, it came to me that I had not read the Bible yet. I prayed that the Lord would help me, and He did through the Gospel of Luke. Things seemed to get clearer and brighter. I finally accepted the Lord as my Lord and Saviour in June this year. I thank the Lord for bringing me out of darkness into the Light, and electing me to be His child, giving me life so abundantly. Amen.

KELAPA SAWIT LENGTHENS HER CORDS (ISAIAH 54:2)

Last Lord's Day (November 13) it was our bi-monthly visit to Kelapa Sawit. We invited Rev Bob Phee to come along. The stretch of 43 miles from Gilstead Road to our destination took 1 hour 15 minutes.

This was a happy occasion to baptise two young persons (from Bukit Batu) and an infant. The Young Peoples' Choir surprised us with the singing of "O Come Back to the Lord," the celebrated hymn sung at the climax of the Blind Korean Pastor Film. O to realise the power of sacred music and to use it more in our evangelistic work!

Sensing this was an occasion also to remember Mrs John Ling who was taken to glory three years ago, I preached on "The Preciousness of a Good Reputation" (Eccles. 7:1). "A good name is a man's second life." This was what I had learnt from my father. A good name is especially vital to a Church leader, for "a bishop must be blameless . . . Moreover he must have a good report of them that are without . . ." (I Tim. 3). It is sad to note how even a pastor might exude a bad name who is not careful in the handling of church funds, and in conducting himself before the opposite sex. As for Mrs John Ling, she is a fragrance in the church she had served faithfully for 25 years. By her devout upbringing, her four children have become lively stones, while her husband has served as elder. What glory and praise is the Ling family to the Father Almighty.

Kelapa Sawit not only has a flourishing Church but also a bubbling kindergarten. The Church and kindergarten are served by Sisters Sang Chiew and Esther Chai, toth FEBC graduates. (Elder John Ling has just completed three semesters at FEBC and should be ordained in days to come.) Fifteen members of Life Church Evangelistic Band visited Kelapa Sawit last fortnight under Mr Colin Wong. They not only had sweet fellowship with the young people there but also branched out to Bukit Batu to the Sunday Morning Service. Kelapa Sawit has an ideal parsonage which gives adequate shelter to many.

At present renovation of the Kindergarten is going on full-steam. Two more classrooms are added on top of the old ones. When completed, Kelapa Sawit can serve as an ideal campsite. A loan of \$\$50,000 from Life Church helps expedite the lengthening of her cords (Isaiah 54:2). Amen. - T.T.

#### JESUS, MY SAVIOURI

(The Testimony of a Christian from China)

I accepted the Lord Jesus in 1970 when I was 30. It is not an early age for a sinner to be delivered; for I have seen many much younger brothers- and sisters-in-Christ experiencing the joy of rebirth in Jesus Christ. My case is quite different, as I <u>could not</u> be delivered any earlier. God knows His time. He had his purpose for me before I came to know Him. This purpose I did not realise until quite a few years after my salvation.

My 17 years' experience as a Christian tells me that a sinner will get closer to God, or, at least find it less difficult to accept God's truth, when he is obliged to follow in his lifetime journey a rough, narrow path prepared by God, full of hardships and impediments. For the narrow path leads to life, whereas the broad way leads to destruction.

When I was young I pursued the "broad way"; for, born and brought up in a fairly good family background in China, I indulged thoroughly in worldly pleasure. Being a sinner, I was proud, self-conceited, jealous, selfish, keen on seeking wealth and fame. What could I have expected if I had actually gone on living like that? Nothing else but total destruction, for "the wages of sin is death."

Had it not been for God's salvation, there wouldn't have been any more of me. God loved me too much to leave me alone. "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is near. Repent ye, and believe the Gospel." So God carried out His Plan of Redemption for me.

The first step in God's plan was taking away all my worldly pleasures. The Communists came; and my family became destitute almost overnight as our property was confiscated. Then, before my graduation from the university, I was politically persecuted on a false charge, labelled as a "reactionary student," and rusticated to the outskirts of Shanghai for three years' "reform" through hard labour at the age of 25. To crown it all, the cultural revolution came shortly before my exile-term expired, and I was further persecuted in an unbelievably hourible manner. In despair I attempted suicide, but God saved me from the clutches of Satan. Miraculously I survived, but in 1969 was "banished" down to the countryside in Anwhei Province in the same year, where I was supposed to live as a peasant making a living by toiling in the fields.

It was many years after my rebirth in Christ that come to understand that none of these things happened to me by chance; for they formed part of God's plan for my salvation.

Having led me so far on the such a narrow path, God carried out the second step in His plan: He looked for me, the lost sheep, by sending His servant to bring me word of salvation. Driven together to the remote rural areas in Anwhei was a multitude of ex-convicts, scoundrels, thieves and other dregs of society, among whom, wonderfully, was God's servant, a sister-in-Christ, and a missionary too, Elsie Qiu by name. Her fiance, John Zeng, was also a missionary, who was sentenced to 12 years' imprisonment late in the fifties on a charge of preaching Christianity in close intrigue with Nee Tuo-sheng's (Watchman Nee) "Counter-revolutionary Clique." God strengthened Elsie's faith. She decided to wait for John to be his bride when his prison term expired. The year when we were sent to exile to Anwhei was in fact her last year of earnest waiting.

She brought me God's message of salvation, urging me passionately to repent and receive Jesus' blood to cleanse my sins. At first I argued, protesting against the injustice and complaining bitterly, but before long the Holy Ghost began to work in me. God's word touched me. and I became quiet; and the bitter heart so tightly locked was made slightly ajar.

As could be perceived, the process of a sinner's delivery is by no means a process of reasoning, arguing, proving with evidence and at last conluding. It is a question of God's breath of life that opens a sinner's eyes and heart so that he will readily accept the truth of salvation. At that time, I was just undergoing such a wondrous process.

God continued to work wonders. Out of 300 exiles, Elsie and I were assigned to settle in the same village! So at every weekend, Elsie, another exiled workman and I would get together in her small, dilapidated hut to hear her preach. Everything was dark in that hut except for the flickering candlelight and God's Word that lit up our souls and spirit. With the passage of time, my obstinancy gave way; streams of life began flowing into the heart of desert that longed for irrigation . . .

Then came the day when Elsie was to leave us to join her fiance for their wedding. Two sisters of hers came all the way from Shanghai to fetch her. They were busy packing up for the journey.

That night I experienced both bitterness and joy. I felt bitter in my heart because Elsie was leaving and I would be left all alone in the world; I felt joyous soon, for that night God opened my eyes and my heart. When I was all alone in my small hut, I went down on my knees and prayed. Never did I expect I could be so fluent, for the words just came pouring out from behind my tongue. I saw how sinful I was for the first time, and actually repented, crying out my earnest request for Jesus' blood to cleanse all my sins. Then, in the utter stillness of the night, I heard God tell me to follow Him. Though not audible, the voice was so clear and so encouraging that I distinctly perceived it. I opened the door of my hut and saw, amid the utter darkness before dawn, a trial brightly lit, encouraging me to take it. It was a path leading to Elsie's hut! I followed the path bravely, and, being led all the way by the light, reached the door of the hut. I heard the three of them singing the hymns "More Love to Thee" and "Follow, Follow," which touched the very depth of my soul! I could wait no longer! I threw the door open without knocking and said earnestly that I needed God. The next moment I joined them in prayer. Instantly, I felt my heart was filled with such joy as I had never felt before. I felt, at the same time, a new life reborn in me; for God transferred me from the clutches of Satan to His grace of salvation.

Seventeen years have passed, and all along I have experienced the joy of rebirth in Him. Although material life is always hard and Christians in China are so constantly shadowed with persecution, yet I fear no fears; for I believe that "though our outward man perish, yet the inward man is renewed day by day." "While we look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen: for the things which are seen are temporal, but the things which are not seen are eternal." Amen.

#### PASTORAL CHAT

My dear Readers,

When Rev Dan Ebert III founded the Centre for Biblical Studies four or five years ago, he started with 6 students. These students were graduates from Rev Ormeo's Bible Institute and were beginning to pastor small churches in and out of Manila. Today, the student enrolment has risen to 23. On the first day of my lectures, there were 36!

What has added to this year's teaching in Manila is the Blind Korean Pastor's life story in Video, plus the singing of the three songs, bolstered by the distribution of 30 cassette tapes. Filipinos are natural musicians. So they are singing "Prodigal Son," "O Come Back to the

Lord" and "Jesus Came and Touched My Soul" all over the city! We have discovered the film ministry to be a vital part in the work of the Lord.

Sunday morning we were invited to speak at the Church at Taytay, 25 km from the City. Though only 9 years old, it had an attendance of 100. Sunday Evening we showed the Korean Film at Pandacan, the second Unfinished Church. There were 50 - 60 at the service. Earlier in the week we showed the Korean Film at Tondo Baptist Church. There were 80 that night. A copy of the Video was also given to my old friend Dr Chung to show at two other churches.

Since we had two free days after Sunday, we took off to the beach at Azul. This was with the view also of exploring the possibility of holding a family camp in Manila. As the rooming arrangement at the hotel and its atmosphere are not conducive to a Bible Camp, we dropped the idea. But our going to Malacca to the Shah Beach Resort, March 13-17,'89 is ideal!

Since Manila is not suitable, the thought of Perth comes like a flash! Will the Lord lead us there March 1990? Our Annual Family Camp is a vital part of Life Church which demands the pastor's closest attention. We have invited Rev Ebert to speak at our Malacca Camp next year.

In regard to the Funds we've brought to Manila, they should help the two 3/4 Finished Churches to complete in the next few months: Our funds are used to buy the materials and pay for carpenters and masons in making finishing touches. Otherwise, it is free labour contributed by Church members. The US\$3,000 extra I had brought along under a compelling urge went to help three other unfinished churches of a smaller size. Each got a US\$1,000 windfall. How their hearts leapt at this unexpected help from Heaven! "For the administration of this service not only supplieth the want of the saints, but is abundant also by many thanksgivings unto God; Whiles by the experiment of this ministration they glorify God for your professed subjection unto the gospel of Christ, and for your liberal distribution unto them, and unto all men; And by their prayer for you, which long after you for the exceeding grace of God in you." (II Cor 9:12-14)



#### ANSWERING QUESTIONS ON THE JEHOVAH WITNESSES

A young Christian from another Church, being bombarded by Jehovah Witnesses, needs clarification on the following questions. By answering him here, may our Readers also be benefited.

QUESTION 1: Is there any Bible verse proving that there is TRINITY (Father, Son and Holy Spirit are One)?

ANSWER: Read Matthew 28:19 where "name" is singular, which comprehends "Father, Son and Holy Ghost." In Jesus' Baptism according to Matt 3:16,17, the Trinity--Father, Son, Holy Spirit--take part in unison. B. B. Warfield comments: "God in heaven, God on earth, God descending from heaven to earth."

<u>Q. 2</u>: The J.W. preach that our Bible is inaccurate because the words <u>Hades</u> and <u>Sheol</u> are translated as Hell, Grave and Pit in the KJV.

A.: <u>Hades</u> (Greek) = <u>Sheol</u> (Hebrew) is translated "hell" in Luke 16:23. Hades is the place of the departed dead. KJV in Luke 16:23 renders Hades as Hell apparently from the context of "tormented in this flame." Jesus in Mark 9:43-48 talks of <u>gehenna</u> (Greek) = hell where there is also "fire that shall never be quenched." Whether hell or hades, that's the place of suffering for the wicked, those who reject Christ in this life. KJV is as accurate as it can make us understand the terror of leaving this world without Christ.

Q. 3: J.W. claim that KJV is inaccurate because I John 5:7 is not found in the NIV, NASB and TEV.

A.: This is a textual problem, one of just a few in a library of 66 Books. This verse, though not found in earlier manuscripts, nevertheless, states the truth of the Trinity. Q. 4: J.W. do not believe that there is a Soul living after we die. They believe that from dust to dust we return as stated in Genesis. The question is: Does the Soul sleep after we die and await judgment? Is paradise here on earth or in the heavens?

A.: Jesus' account of the Rich Man and Lazarus (Luke 16) shows there is life after death (not soul-sleep). Paradise is in the heavens, not on earth, for because of sin it is withdrawn.

<u>Q. 5</u>: Why does Jesus say He is doing the will of the Father, when He is God Himself? And in Psalm 110:1 (NIV), what is meant by "the LORD spoke to my Lord"? Are the Father and Son two distinct personalities?

A.: Because the Son is a distinct personality from the Father, so he refers to doing His will. For Psalm 110:1 read Jesus' own commentary in Matthew 22:41-45!

 $\underline{Q.6}$ : J.W. do not believe in blood transfusion as stated in Genesis, Leviticus and Acts. Is this true?

A.: In none of these books is blood transfusion prohibited.

<u>Q. 7</u>: As a Christian, can I carry arms or serve in the Armed Forces since it would contradict the commandments of God: Thou shalt not kill and you shall love your neighbour?


A.: The 6th Commandment forbids murder, not judicial killing as in hanging a murderer. Nor does it forbid righteous self-defence as in Jesus telling His disciples to arm themselves (Luke 22:36-38) in face of great trials. To carry arms to defend the nation is in the same spirit as the Ruler that "beareth the sword" not in vain (Romans 13:4).

Q. 8: If God created Adam and Eve, does this mean that their children committed incest?

A.:KJV is most accurate and loyal to the text. NASB and NIV are allowable for comparative study. RSV, TEV, translated by modernists, are to be shunned and exposed!

#### BPCWA, Mount Pleasant, Perth

The architect's drawing of a renovated Fellowship Hall and S.S. rooms on the front page, hiding the Church Sanctuary, at Mount Pleasant, Perth, substantiates last week's report from Bro. Robin Tan. Now that the award to the successful contractor must be made by Christmas, and work will commence in the new year, they have need of financial help. As A\$271,000 is price of the basic contract, fixtures, furnishings and many smaller items not included will cost another A\$90,000. Since the congregation is made up mostly of students and newly-arrived immigrants, our Session has decided to advance them a grant of A\$100,000 = S\$165,000, an expression of our sincere good wishes. Designated gifts for Perth thus far, plus gifts for "Missions and Missionaries" add up to about \$10,000. Therefore, we need \$155,000 to fill the gap. May we commend this holy need to Readers, and may your offerings "come up for a memorial before God" (Acts 10:4). If you have not given your tithes, here's one channel through which you can send in the service of the Almighty. "God loveth a cheerful giver. And God is able to make all grace abound toward you, that ye, always having all sufficiency in all things, may abound to every good work" (II Cor. 9:7,8). #### PASTORAL CHAT

With Due Respect to Dr John MacArthur, Jr.

In my sermon last week touching one of 4 points of the Jerusalem decree to the churches, viz., BLOOD, which the Gentile Christians are forbidden to eat, I mentioned also the Precious Blood of Jesus Christ. In this regard, I regretted such an eminent Bible expositor and pastor as Dr John MacArthur, Jr., whose tapes and books are carried by our Church, should take a contradictory view of the Blood of Christ. In a Statement dated Apr. 30, 1986, according to Wilson Edwin, Dr MacArthur said:

"Obviously, it was not the blood of Jesus that saved . . . When Romans 3:25 speaks of 'faith in His blood,' everyone understands that to be a reference to His death--not the blood running through His body . . . Yes, the blood of Christ is precious--but as precious as it is, it could not save . . . I admit that because of some traditional hymns there is an emotional attachment to the blood . . . I can sing hymns about the blood and rejoice with them--but I understand that reference to be a metonym for His death."

With due respect to Dr MacArthur's eloquence, St. Paul never made such contradictory remarks about the Blood of Christ, nor did any other Apostle. Wilson Edwin, in an article titled "The Literal Blood of Christ," quotes the following verses to refute MacArthur, which we also quote:

"being now justified by his blood" (Romans 5:9),

"ye . . . are made nigh by the blood of Christ" (Ephesians 2:13),

"How much more shall the blood of Christ . . . purge your conscience" (Hebrews 9:14),

"boldness to enter into the holiest by the blood of Jesus" (Hebrews 10:19),

"The blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin" (I John 1:7),

"Unto him that loved us and washed us from our sins in his own blood" (Revelation 1:5), "These . . . have washed their robes, and made them white in the blood of the Lamb" (Revelation 7:14),

"They overcame him by the blood of the Lamb . . . " (Revelation 12:11).

Now, apart from Wilson Edwin's article, I have before me also relevant material received from Rev Jim Turner. Here's an excerpt from a paragraph in Calvary Contender's "News, etc.," to warn and inform:



"In several 1986 letters, Dr John MacArthur said the blood of Christ 'could not save.' He put a dangerous dichotomy between Christ's blood and death. In the ensuing confusion, which his later letters compounded rather than clarified, several preachers and Bible teachers called his teaching 'heresy.' Some Fundamental Baptist Fellowship and Southwide Baptist Fellowship preachers warned about his teachings which had

evoked a strong resolution on the Blood of Christ from the 8/86 World Congress of Fundamentalists. The Fall '87 Calvary Baptist Theological Seminary (PA) Journal said: 'John MacArthur's discussion of the blood allows for misunderstanding. By his strong emphasis on equating blood with death, he leaves the impression that only the death and not the blood was essential.' The Sword of the Lord editor (1/8/88) said, '. . . his teaching on the blood of Christ, salvation and soul-winnng are a cause for great concern.' The Baptist Bible Tribune editor (1/11) said MacArthur is 'out of step' with 'all the great theological and expositional authorities of the last 500 years.'"

#### Calvin on Christ's Blood

On p. 560 of "Calvin's Institutes of the Christian Religion, Vol. I" (John Allen Translation), Calvin says, "For we certainly could have no confidence that Christ was our reemption, ransom and propitiation if he had not been a slaughtered victim. And for this reason it is, that when the Scripture exhibits the method of redemption, it so often makes mention of blood; though the blood shed by Christ has not only served as an atonement to God, but likewise as a laver to purge away our pollutions." Calvin's treatment of Christ's Blood is opposite to MacArthur's. And Jesus, desiring us to remember Him in His death, said to His Disciples at the institution of the Lord's Supper: "Drink ye all of it. For this is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins" (Matt 26:27,28). And if "without shedding of blood is no remission" (Heb 9:22), for Christ to die in any other way, such as by hanging, that death cannot save us. So why, Dr MacArthur do you reject the Blood of Christ which you drink at the Lord's Supper?

#### Another Vital Question in Theology

Dr Buswell was my teacher in theology. With due respect to my teacher, I'd ask him this question. He says the Greek monogenes "only begetten" means unique, one and only, rather than involved with the process of begetting. Now, if the same word monogenes is used in the context of the father-son relationship between Abraham and Isaac in Heb 11:17, is there any involvement in the process of begetting? The NIV throws out the words "only begotten" in its translation of John 3:16, substituting with "one and only." Of course,

Christ is the one and only Son of God, but to throw out a word of Holy Scripture to pander to one's self-esteemed knowledge of Greek, Greek, Greek can result in treading theological thin ice. The Greek Fathers that formulated the Nicene Creed (325 A.D.) surely knew more Greek than our modern pundits, and they specially treasured and upheld the word "begotten" as exclusively expressive of the Son-relationship with the Father. Praise the Lord for the KJV. While newfangled translations cast out God's words left and right, such as throwing away "only begotten," KJV sticks to it, and New KJV dares not remove it.

#### "One Woe doth Tread upon Another's Heel"

The other day I was musing on the quick succession of disasters that befall this poor earth--the cyclone and flood upon Bangladesh, earthquake in Yunnan, Monsoon flood in South Thailand--and I said to myself, "This is God's reminder that our Lord's coming is near." For Jesus said, ". . . and there shall be famines and pestilences, and earthquakes in divers places" (Matt. 24:7). "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits: Who forgiveth all thine iniquities; who healeth all thy diseases; who redeemeth thy life from destruction; who crowneth thee with lovingkindness and tender mercies . . ." (Psa. 103:2-4).

Her bahasa is more akin to Indonesian than to Malay.


Do you have Indonesian domestic servants? Do you give your employees one day off for God-ordained Sabbath? Why don't you send them to our Indonesian Service? Or do you have Indonesian young people boarding with you while staying in Singapore? I believe if we all make a concerted effort to bring them in, our Indonesian Service will mature into a full-fledged Church.

"Self Help, with God's Help, is the Best Help"

Our B-P Church in Perth is doing her level best to self help in a big renovation project, as displayed on our notice boards. This big renovation is necessitated by the sat-

uration of the auditorium in Sunday attendances, not to mention the Sunday School. During peak periods the hall is literally filled to the last seat. The capacity is 250 - 270.

As the total renovation costs are A\$360,000, we have made them a grant of A\$100,000 and a free loan of the same sum. This immediately cuts down



their financial burden to A\$160,000. From Robin Tan's report, BPCWA has A\$25,000 deposit in bank. A grateful member pledges A\$30,000. Another good news item is that the Australian Government has approved this project for income tax exemption. Trusting the Lord, the renovation will begin, most assuredly, January 1989. The work can complete within a few months--that's the way jobs are tackled in western countries.

Insofar as Life Church is concerned, our advance of the gift of A\$100,000 must be made good by your tithes and offerings. That \$3,000 in gifts were spontaneously offered last week makes a good start. "Build God's House and God will build yours" is what King David learnt from the prophet Nathan. (Read II Samuel 7:1-17.)

Today the Church has a new three-storey brick building, beaming bright. Over 200 have been added to the Church by baptism. This time we baptised five adults and four infants. A change has also come over the ferry system. Fast launches now make the trip in three hours, and that with a break at Sekupang, Batam. Hordes of tourists are now patronising Tanjung Pinang who enliven the local economy with their spending. Hotels are overflowing during weekends and during this Christmas season.

Christians, however, are on the go for a different purpose. We come here in obedience to the Great Commission. In conjunction with our Tanjung Pinang outreach, we are now poised for Batam . . . Ahoy!
