TREASURE TIME!

(Translated from Wang Ming Tao's "Admonition of Christians")

"Redeeming the time, because the days are evil." (Eph. 5:16)

"Walk in wisdom toward them that are without, redeeming the time." (Col. 4:5)

Treasure time. There are many lessons in life to learn, and many things to be done. Should we labour day and night, we would not be able to learn what we ought and to finish

the things we ought to finish. How dare we spend time carelessly, wastefully? Treasure time!

Treasure time. Do not waste preciõus time in chit-chatting. This is a common malady, most despicable. To discuss a problem of value whereby we polish one another's knowledge of the Scriptures or of some academic subject, is no idle talk of course. Idle talk brings no benefit either to our faith or character, nor to our knowledge and work. To ramble along without any objective and without limit wears away a lot of time. It

ties up proper work. This is a common malady, and more so with those who like to prattle. Let us take heed to do away with this bad habit by exhorting and supervising one another. Those who fail in this matter can never attain to anything. Treasure time.

Treasure time. Don't waste time on novels that entice you. Generally, most people like to read novels. If we have time on hand, let us use our leisure reading up on religion, ethics, education, history and those novels that edify our character. In these we can find something good. But let us flee those that purvey immorality and violence, that speak of weird things, that are not only of no value but are injurious to the reader. Take your eyes off them! Do not read novels that have some value but so take up one's time as to hinder proper work. Treasure time.

Treasure time. Do not play overtime. After work, take up some game or exercise that is not hurtful to the body for recreation. This is in order to recover from fatigue. Such relaxation is essential. But if we are immersed in these things at the expense of time and work, how pitiful! Do not spend too much time in exercise, such as playing ball. Do not spend too much time on music or on chess. Let there be a limit of one or two hours for such recreation. When on vacation, this limit might be stretched a little. At any rate, let there be a cut-off point. Let not anyone be so engrossed in these recreations as to hinder proper work. Treasure time.

Treasure time. Do not patronise any crowded places unless it is necessary or for the sake of buying something. The things you find there play on your senses. They glue you down, and dissipate your time. They drag you into the world and away from God. Do not go there lest you fall into temptation. If you treasure time, don't go!

Treasure time. Keeping birds and fish, nurturing flowers and trees, collecting antiques, are hobbies not absolutely forbidden to Christians. To have such recreations as give restfulness to the body and take away fatique is not without benefit. But if one has to spend much time and money on these things, then it becomes a loss. Never waste big money on these things. The money God has entrusted to you is not to be used on these things, neither your time. To live is to work for God, not to play for your own sake. Treasure time.

Treasure time. Don't sleep beyond your bodily needs. For some adults, seven hours, more or less, is enough. Ordinarily it is eight hours. Those who are weak might need nine to ten hours (this does not include children or the sick). Oversleeping is a waste of time. The lazy bones who like to slumber should cut down. Treasure time.

Treasure time. No matter how busy, cease not to pray and read the Bible. To stop these two exercises, our spirits become dried up. Our spiritual growth is retarded to our great loss. Except for official business or some unavoidable matter, "Do not forsake the assembling of ourselves as the manner of some is." When a Christian neglects these things he begins to backslide. Treasure time.

Treasure time. Everyday, whether at home or at work, finish up everything that is to be done. Don't say, Tomorrow! Do not shirk your work over to another. Don't fight shy of responsibility. Don't be afraid of work. The more the work, the stronger the muscles. The more trading of your talents, the more your gain of experience. Although you could not do it at first, if you're a willing worker you will succeed in the end. The unwilling worker, though talented, will be laid on the shelf. "For unto everyone that hath shall be given, and he shall have abundance; but from him that hath not shall be taken away even that which he hath" (Matt. 25:29).

Treasure time. Apart from diligently fulfilling our duties each day, we need to take time to read. Read books on the Christian faith and on good character, books helpful to your work and knowledge. We have no opportunity to meet personally the saints whom God has mightily blessed to be taught by them, nor have we the resources to employ the learned and experienced to be our teachers. But we can learn from them through their books. Apart from reading let us learn from the people we meet each day, and add to our knowledge from every experience. Each day we live on earth is a day in the school of life. Treasure time.

BATAM OCCUPIED FOR GOD'S KINGDOM



before our original plan. So, on Thursday Dec. 29, Rev Kim, Mr Jeong (another Korean student), Mrs Tow and I "escorted" Roska with all her paraphernalia to Finger Pier to take the 40 minute ferry across to Sekupang. Elder Khoo and his whole family were there to see us off. Mr Choy, representing Mr Hwang Kyu Tae the Shipyard manager came in the shipyard's car to receive us. (The return boat ticket is now reduced to \$30.)

An half-hour's drive brought us to the shipyard which now has 12 Koreans and 60 Indonesian employees. We were received with a big Korean lunch, famous for big bowls of rice and Kimchee, with broiled prawns, Japanese style.

Roska stays with two Indonesian girls in quarters, for a start. She was asked first of all to explain in Indonesian the film of the Blind Korean Pastor to the Indonesian workforce. She would have a busy time hereafter evangelising the Indonesians and helping out the Koreans as interpreter and letter writer. Her coming here, observed Mr Hwang the manager, is a Godsend! Pray for God's Kingdom in Batam.

My dear Readers,

That Batam has opened its door

to our Church so quickly and smoothly is of the Lord, "and no man can shut it" (Rev. 3:8). We thank God that while some fold their arms and look on derisively, others rally to the Lord's help. The Anniversary offering of the YAF and YF totalling \$666 is a great encouragement. A New Year cheque earmarked for "Expansion of God's Kingdom" goes to sustain our supply lines to the following 9 outreaches: The Philippines, Melbourne, Adelaide, Perth, Burma, Kenya, Bethlehem, K.L., Kelapa Sawit (where a secondfloor two-classroom extension is nearing completion).

Meanwhile, Roska has returned to Medan to register her transference of residence to Batam. Flying Batam-Medan costs half what you'd pay S'pore-Medan. This is one reason for Batam suddenly coming alive! As Singapore's invasion of Batam mounts, bigger and faster ferries are built. The latest is one that can take 4-500, a marine Jumbo!

There are those who criticise our Church as being understaffed and underpaid. But pay is not counted only in hard dollars. More than dollars are an uninhibited and pleasant environment, and fringe benefits. As to "understaffing," like not having a fulltime caretaker, those who say so are not in residence. They have not seen how the whole campus is being maintained by the FEBC student body. And there are Amir and Kamala, gardener and sweeper. By being stringent on expenditure, and following the Apostle Paul to work with our hands (rather than jogging) we have conserved not a little. With the liberal and loving giving of the faithful, and the regular tithing of the God-fearing, we have surplus to help those B-P Churches that have a genuine need. Jesus says, "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35).

By loaning to Melbourne, e.g., at a time when the Australian dollar was low, they have made a substantial amount in foreign exchange. The land they had bought partly with Life Church help has greatly appreciated. When we trade for the Lord with a desire to see His Kingdom extended, He blesses with further increase. As you have contributed to the building of God's House so has He responded to build your house. But those who withhold their tithes put it "into a bag with holes" (Haggai 1:6).

By God's grace we intend to press on through every door God has opened to Life Church. We need not seek one our own, such as "going to China on a mission trip" when there are calls from all over Southeast Asia and Australia and we can hardly keep up.

"Insights into a Short Stint at FEBC"

Here is an exemplary deacon's testimony on what he has received from FEBC after one academic year. Deacon Charles Fong, who comes from Nazareth BPC, writes:

November 11, 1988 was the last day of my second semester at FEBC. It marked the end of a 6-day examination trial, which was concluded with a traditional gathering at Dr Tow's residence. Looking back at my year at FEBC, I would like to convey to you some of my insights into a Bible college

education:

Academic Studies - "The half of knowledge is to know where to find it." The key benefit of a Bible-based education is that it provides us with the tools to study God's Word. The Bible contains its own rules for interpretation - this was explored in our study of Hermeneutics. I was made aware of where to locate background study materials in Bible Encyclopaedias, Dictionaries, Bible Introductions, Surveys and Atlases. Other subjects of vital importance are Systematic Theology, O. T. History, N. T. Survey, Bible book studies.

Personal Growth - FEBC has a healthy emphasis on character building and the cultivation of a devotional discipline. Each morning began with prayer and the chapel hour which gave prominence to God's Word. There were some specific areas of sin in my life which I had to confess before God, to be replaced with Biblical values.





<u>Fellow Students</u> - There was also much to learn from the lives and aspirations of fellow students. They came from all walks of life (and age ranges too), and it was eye-opening to learn of the different ways in which each individual was called of God to train at FEBC for His service.

Finally, I wish to thank the LORD God, members of Nazareth Church, my parents and my wife for supporting me in my studies at college. Praise God for FEBC, its faculty, and its devoted stand on the Inerrant and Infallible Bible. To borrow the words of Ps. 118:23, "This is the Lord's doing, it is marvellous in our eyes."

Incidentally I had a first translation of Wang Ming Tao on "Treasure Time" in this Weekly a fortnight ago. This article, plus his proverbs for Christian living, will be broadcast this Lord's Day evening from SBC, with the support of our Church choir.

As Wang Ming Tao is considered "Chief of the Three" of China's greatest saints, the others being Watchman Nee and John Sung, it will do you well to read his writings that are beginning to be translated. His autobiography, "These Fifty Years," now translated as "A Stone Made

Smooth[®] by A. Reynolds a retired CIM missionary, and published by Mayflower of England, and 20 articles of his under "Spiritual Food" by the same publisher should be read by every Lifer. Our Book Centre imported a goodly number a few months ago, but these have been snapped up. Let us have another consignment, N.B., CLBC!

Do you know that Wang Ming Tao and his wife were imprisoned for Christ--his wife for 15 years and he 23 years? Is Communist China more relaxing on Christians today? Here's the latest from Christian Beacon:-

For Churches in Red China - This Year's New Regulations

I. All places for religious worship (including Christian "meeting points" or house churches) must register with the Religious Affairs Bureau or be closed down.

2. Pastors and theological students from the TSPM college must get permission from the municipal or provincial government authorities before taking up leadership positions in the churches.

3. Pastors and other Christian workers must get permission from the Religious Affairs Bureau before they can go outside their area to take a meeting.

4. No one, except registered Christian workers, can evangelize or preach.

5. All religious literature must obtain approval for publication from the Religious Affairs Bureau (which as a party organ is staffed by atheists).

6. Donations from visiting overseas Christian delegations or individuals have to be approved by the higher provincial authorities before the official TSPM churches can use them.

7. Those who disobey these regulations will be "criticized and reeducated" by the Religious Affairs Bureau, or in serious cases dealt with by the Public Security Bureau.

What a contrast with the freedom of religion we have in Singapore! Under a just and good government, Christianity in Singapore has increased to 18+%. There's a saying, "Make hay while the sun shines." Jesus says, "I must work the works of Him that sent me, while it is day: the night cometh, when no man can work" (Jn 9:4). Let us double our evangelistic effort this year. We have a gospel film, "No Longer Alone," Sat. Jan. 21,



The end of this age is drawing to a close. False prophets are arising in the Church. Many people who are not careful are led astray, some even making total shipwreck of their faith. Having left the pure Gospel, they imbibed an unscriptural doctrine. Since the leaders are blind, their followers must naturally fall into the ditch (Luke 6:34). Christian, take care of yourself.

"The love of money is the root of all evil: which while some coveted after, they have erred from the faith, and pierced themselves through with many sorrows." East, west, south, north, we have seen many Christians fall into bitter sorrows because of covetousness. Christian, take care of yourself.

Promiscuous love, unbridled sex, these have ruined both body and virtue, and harmed the family. In the annals of both Scripture and history and by what we see and hear today, countless people have slid into these pits. Christian, take care of yourself.

A little spark can light up a prairie fire. A wrong decision can cast into a grave error. Many enormous sins have sprung from a whim of greed, or lust, of jealousy, or hatred, of pride, or from selfishness lurking in the heart. And who ever knew an evil thought like one of these would lead to such awful crimes, a curse to self and a curse to others. Christian, take care of yourself!

"Our adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour." Some Christians, by a moment's slumbering, being unawakened to certain matters, come to great grief. Christian, take care of yourself.

When a Christian becomes most fervent in spirit, and reaches the pinnacle of virtue and height of devotion in the work, then they fall into the greatest of sins--pride. Christian, take care of yourself.

A fisherman must use a little bait over the hook to catch fish. So does Satan use money fame, food, raiment, friends, love, pleasure to bait us. Many Christians, having coveted after these things, are hooked. Christian, take care of yourself!

A word that escapes our mouth does not count very much. But we have seen how by a few careless words they have spread chaos, wounding others and ruining themselves. Proverbs 10:19 says, "In the multitude of words there wanteth not sin: but he that refraineth his lips is wise." Christian, take care of yourself!

When a Christian fears men, he will be snared by Satan's net. He will do things displeasing to God. When King Saul feared the Philistines, he did not wait for Samuel, but, exceeding his powers, he sacrificed whereby he brought down God's chastisement on his own head (I Sam 13). Batamail



ROSKA writes (Jan 10):-

I spent the opening New Year in Medan. I gave my parents a good surprise by my sudden coming to Medan. I had blessed times with them and on 5th Jan '89, I returned to Batam.

I enjoy staying with the two Indonesian girls. Elizabeth and Priscilla are their new names given by me and they like their new names very much but they do not know that those names are Christian names. Elizabeth and Priscilla are devout Muslims, praying 5 times a day without fail, but I don't see them reading the Quran. I hope and pray that they may one day come to believe in Jesus.

Mrs Lee is the name of the cook (deaconess). She stays with her husband. She does not speak Indonesian at all and very little English. So you can imagine how I communicate with her everyday. She cooks Korean food and puts lots of Ajinomoto in it. Kim Chee is always served during makan time.

Last Sunday I attended the Korean service (5 pm). Of course I could not understand! They requested me to lead in the Pastoral Prayer. I was shocked. I did not know what to pray for. So I prayed for all things under the sun. Thank God! The Lord helped me how and what to pray.

Last Sunday, the Indonesian service for the Indonesian workers was started. It was held in a container where the Indonesian workers stay, not in the Korean Church. Thirteen of them came. All are Bataks. They are very happy to have Indonesian service in the Complex because there is no transport for them to go to church in town every Sunday. Unfortunately, all of them are men, and soon I will become a gentle man!

My Batam I.C. has not come out yet. I hope it comes soon, so that I can go to Singapore without paying so much money for the fiscal (tax).

So far I have not been going down town since the last time, when Mr Hwang the General Manager took me there just before he sent me to the airport. It takes half-hour from the Shipyard to Nagoya town. So these few days I have been in the Complex, helping in the office (translating some letters into English) and in the kitchen (cutting). It is indeed my pleasure to help them.

I am sure you have been praying for me. Thank you for praying. My special thanks for sending me to Batam and for carrying my things. I am touched by your love, care and concern. May the Lord bless and help us. - ROSKA

"God moves in a mysterious way, His wonders to perform"

Our Batam Mission has been in our prayers for almost a year. We were convinced that with Roska graduating and expressing her keen desire to be sent to Batam, another Gospel Door was opening. At first we thought this Door was to be entered from Tanjung Pinang through Deacon Teck Hock who has some business connections there. This did not work out until we heard from our Korean students that one of their Deacons was General Manager of the Batamas Shipyard. Mr Hwang who heads this new enterprise is a devout Christian. Before building the shipyard he had a little church installed to cater to his Christian staff (9 out of 13).

Upon further inquiry, we were invited to visit the Shipyard and to meet with Mr Hwang the General Manager. It was like love at first sight when we saw the man and the place. Roska trusted us, and here she is, serving the Lord not only among her own countrymen but also with the Koreans. The population at the Shipyard is around 80 now, but soon will increase to 200. "For who hath despised the day of small things?" (Zech. 4:10). Pray for Roska! - T.T.

CORRESPONDENCE from N.E.W.S.

Re: EXPANSION OF GOD'S KINGDOM

The expression "Expansion of God's Kingdom" came to the Life Church Treasury with a \$9,000 cheque three weeks ago. This sum was distributed as widely as possible to 9 outreaches.

Closely linked to Life Church is Far Eastern Bible College. When we named our Bible College "Far Eastern", we thought that was a broad enough horizon in our sphere of service for the Lord.

As we entered the eighties, however, our horizon was expanded to take in Australia, and beyond ASEAN to India and Burma, yea, even to Kenya, Africa.

Kenya sent us three of her sons--Stephen Masila, Richard Kivai and Michael Koech. All three have become Church leaders, as pastors and teachers.

As more and more applications are received from distant lands (this week we have one recommended by Rev Noah Quashi, author of "Bird's Eye View of the Bible," Ghana), the Lord seems to tell us it's time to take in the whole world! As Life Church and FEBC are situated in a global city within easy reach of hemispheres beyond (S'pore is both the 1st seaport and the 1st airport of the world), our congregation must lift up their eyes with their pastor to undertake a much greater task in the days ahead, while He tarries.

To widen your vision, here are four letters received during the week, CORRESPONDENCE from N.E.W.S., re: "Expansion of God's Kingdom."

I. <u>GHANA</u>

Dec. 23, 1988



This year's ICCC Congress was certainly a blessing to me and my people. This is also the first time we had such a large group from Ghana.

Thanks a lot for the books you gave me, I have given all out. God bless you for your contribution toward the work here in Ghana.

As we discussed, I am planning to build a Bible College in Ghana, if the Lord tarry by 1990, but some of the young men here need further studies to be able to help when our School takes off. As you promise, I am recommending two men for 1989-1990 Academic Year at your school.

They are Pastor Yeboah Gaisie and Pastor Abednego Boye. I am enclosing Pastor Gaisie's application; that of Pastor Abednego will follow soon.

Could you help us with at least 50 copies monthly of the RPG?

Please find enclosed American Express money order US\$290 for whatever is urgent, may be for Philippines' unfinished church buildings.

III. <u>KUALA LUMPUR, MALAYSIA</u>

The Lord had been good to us in 1988. We have altogether baptised nine persons: six adults (five women and one man), one teenager and two children. We expect at least three more to be baptised this coming Easter.

A man by the name of Khor Phek Sing is under severe pressure from his wife who is an ardent Buddhist. Mr Khor loves the Lord and reads our RPG materials for devotions.

Another man is Mr Ang Lian Huan who underwent surgical operation three times. The Lord saves him. He is now completely recovered, driving his newly-bought car and doing his own business.

We do hope you would pray specially for these two men by name before the Lord that they may come to the full knowledge of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Financially we did have some improvement. The entire year's offering exceeded \$2,500/= which was about \$208/= per month. At the moment this is given to the pastor for his transport allowance, plus other church expenses such as electrical bills, Sunday School gifts, etc.

IV. ADELAIDE, AUSTRALIA

Rev Paauwe writes in Lively Hope, the weekly correspondence of Hope BPC. He tells of fellowship with one of his former students at FEBC:-

Today we welcome Brutus Balan to our pulpit. He is a graduate of Far Eastern Bible College in Singapore and the pastor of Wyndham People's Church in Wyndham, Western Australia. We also welcome into our midst Mrs Taya Balan and their two children, Joel and Talitha. May God bless their short visit with us.

In the April-June 1988 issue of the <u>Reformation Banner</u>, the Balans tell about Wyndham and their work there. They write:

"Wyndham, the 'top town of the west' - Western Australia, is quite unknown even in Perth. Once a thriving gold-mining town, then a beef exporting port, which brought in the crocodiles, which brought in the tourists, now is dead with no industry and much unemployment. While the crocs ate the crumbs that were washed off the abattoir, the militant unions swallowed the goose that laid the golden eggs. Now the building is derelict, the crocs migrated to livelier waters and the tourist left standing wide-eyed by the estuary.

*Listed as one of the harshest places in climate and in human isolation, Wyndham spells 'win them' in God's mandate to us. Cyclones, flash floods, sudden rapid creeks, ferocious crocodiles, mosquitoes, flies and heat reaching up to 47°C in the day and 32°C at night consistently from about September to April make life here inhospitable. Yet people live here and so can we. Wyndham was home the moment we touched its soil. After all, being in the centre of God's will and knowing it for sure is home.

"The aboriginals are in a dream-world of impulsive walkabouts (now Toyota-4WD driveabouts). Almost all of them are alcoholics. Dawn draws them to the town 'water-hole' (the liquor shop) and at dusk they hit the dust drunk, one in body and spirit with their mother land. Grog, drug, disease and dirt are characteristic of this pathetic people. Perhaps in two generations' time, history books will tell a tale of the extinct dinosaur and the Australian aboriginals. There is absolutely no motivation or direction in life. The present doting government, generous with grants, almost seems sinister in speeding their 'natural' extinction. After much sweat, tears and years the white missionaries brought many to the Lord but are left brokenhearted for many have returned to alcohol and sin. Only a supernatural intervention of God can bring sanity to this race.

"This little church of 12 members and about 30 worshippers was pastorless for 14 years and an elder was sustaining the work . . . Harsh climate and psychological conditions deter many pastors from serving up here, so we are teaching the priesthood of believers, instead of waiting for a pastor to baptise the saved in obedience to divine command.

"This town is hard to reach for the Lord. The leadership in the church is weak and passive. As much as we prefer to slow down, the Spirit of the Lord stirs us all the more. We started off with a bang in this town of about 1,000 people. The Lord cancelled the invited evangelistic team for the Kimberley district Easter convention in Wyndham and I replaced them. That introduced me to about 400, mainly aboriginal Christians. Since then, we are in full swing with two Bible studies (one in Kununarra 100 km away from Wyndham)--each session two hours, prayer meetings, Bible study for marrieds, etc. These people need to be pushed, for they have no sense of timing or urgency. Many changes have taken place and we thank the Lord for that. The Lord is giving us tears like never before. Nothing can stand in the way of a mighty river of tears. Pray with us, brethren!" Ed. Note: Hope BPC has a Van Fund of only \$1,278.80. Our Session has voted S\$5,000 for Adelaide from the Christmas Offerings.

Padbury

Adelaide

Melbourty

Perth

We are called to minister in Perth again during Chinese New Year to speak at their 3rd Anniversary, the two Sundays of Feb. 5 & 12, and at other services in between, one being the showing of the Blind Korean Pastor. Our visit coincides also with the starting of Renovations to the Church at Mount Pleasant on Feb. 6. I write on Australia this week not only to request your fervent prayers for us in Perth, but also to widen your horizon to other cities shown on the sketch map--Padbury, Wyndham, Cootamundra, Melbourne, Adelaide.

Perth

Perth was founded exactly 3 years ago at Chinese New Year by Dr Tow Siang Hwa in answer to Mrs Sector's repeated requests. Mrs Sector was a convert at Calvary-Jurong (Chinese). Incidentally,

I had the privilege of baptising her because she is Cantonese (and there were other Cantonese candidates), and they required a Cantonese-speaking pastor. So, when I was sent to Perth in the early days, wasn't I glad to meet the Sector family? But I was happier to meet Robin Tan and his wife Patricia, Lifers who had migrated to Perth five years ahead.

Today Perth is managed by a committee comprising Robin and Eng Lam (another Lifer) with Mark Heath and his wife Grace (of Sembawang) both FEBC graduates, and others who are well settled in the Land.

Then there is a second Church founded at Padbury coming soon to one year old. This second church was an outreach to the northern part of Perth, some 20 km from the Mount Pleasant Church. This caters to a fast-growing township and needs the more our prayerful support because it is still young and tender.

As both Perth and Padbury look more to us for succour, let us do our best for them, especially you who have visited these two churches. Though Session has voted A\$100,000 as a gift and another sum on loan, this is still a long way to the total cost of A\$360,000. The Church has so far collected A\$30,519.60 + S\$2,000. Our Chinese Service, hearing that we're going downunder, gives a S\$300 hongbao. "Many a mickle makes a muckle."

Wyndham

If you have read last week's N.E.W.S. letters, you'd recall the fourth one vividly describing this remote township with a burning desert climate. Here are situated Brutus Balan, an FEBC graduate, and his wife and two children, ministering to the aboriginals, a ministry truly of sweat and tears. We have therefore included them in our "Christmas List." Let us not forget to pray for the Balans.

Cootamundra

Making a big hop across the continent to the southeast, we come to Cootamundra. In this little city between Sydney and Melbourne, there are Peter Clements and Anne (Gradussov), both FEBC graduates. They are a wonderful couple as you can recall their smiles, full of joy and peace. Peter was a WEC missionary to Indonesia, but being refused entry, was led to study at FEBC. He spoke good Indonesian and was one of seven founding members of our Kebaktian, Feb. 7, 1982. Interestingly, Anne joined the FEBC by first coming to our Indonesian Service. "God moves in a mysterious way, His wonders to perform." Today the young couple have a child and both are happily ministering to a Presbyterian Church with a congregation of 50.

Melbourne

Melbourne is much in the news with a brochure released by Dr Tow Siang Hwa. This is the farthest outreach of Calvary BPC. According to a Chinese saying, it takes the strength of "nine oxen and two tigers" to maintain this mission. As it has no resident pastor, my brother has to go there several times a year, also to hold Bible Camp. Among the "oxen" sent to Melbourne waters (Isa. 32:20) are Elders Khoo and Chia, Dr Patrick Tan and myself, representing Life Church. Then there is Lim Hai Seng of Batu Pahat (now migrated to Austtralia) another FEBC graduate serving on the church staff. Hai Seng edits a full church paper, preaches once a month, and drives the church van.

The Church today has an attendance of 70, and worships on the borrowed premises of a school. Nevertheless, they have purchased an AOG Church which should come into full possession by the end of this year. This property costs A\$750,000, half of which is borne by the local congregation.

Adelaide

There's a saying, "Australia is the driest continent, and South Australia is the driest state," and Adelaide its capital is perhaps the driest city. If not physically dry, I can believe, spiritually driest! Known as a city of churches, you can rarely see a congregation of a hundred. I'm told that a white church, if it has 30 on a Sunday morning, that will be very encouraging. Into this situation were the Paauwes sent over five years ago to start a Fundamental Bible College of Australia. It was soon after Perth that the Paauwes were led to establish a Hope BPC (affiliated with S'pore). In this city dry like a desert and the ground hard as rock, the Paauwes have been labouring ceaselessly. Today, they have several core families and the Sunday Service gathers between 20 and 40. What makes it harder to work is the lack of public transport. To alleviate this situation, the local church has started a Van Fund. After some months they could gather only A\$1,200. Our Session has therefore voted S\$5,000 from our "Christmas List" to give them a boost.

This is one very needy area where our tithes and thankofferings can go. If you cannot go out with the Gospel to win souls for Christ (note that Gospel is spelt first with GO . . .) you can have a share in the Adelaide Evangelism by giving to their Van Fund.

Let me tell you a little anecdote before I close. As you know, we have a great development at Kelapa Sawit. Now Kelapa Sawit Church is situated on the very top of K. S. village. When our second storey rose above the Kindergarten Complex, the roof could be seen from far below. In order to make Christ known to distant passers-by we suggested a stainless steel cross above the gable. This cross, 8' by 4', costs M\$600 to put up. I said to Elder Sng at the Prayer Meeting, "Perhaps if we announce it, someone might want to have a part in that cross." An hour or so after Prayer Meeting, a phone call came, "Two persons have claimed that cross!" Perhaps another two persons can so give as to let Hope BPC in Adelaide start off with a second-hand van!

Now, I'm sure you have enjoyed visiting Australia with me through this flying Weekly. The Lord is coming soon. S'poreans are living in a southern paradise. How obedient are we to the Lord who has commissioned us to go into all the world? How thankful are we to Him for daily showering us His bountiful gifts--joy of salvation and abundance in livelihood?

Pray for us, that our going to Perth again might be a blessing, not a burden. Yours for the Gospel, T.T.

Alleged plot to convert Malays to Christianity

JUDGMENT RESERVED IN ISA APPEAL CASE

(The Straits Times, Feb 1, '89)

KUALA LUMPUR — The Supreme Court here has reserved judgment on an appeal by the government against the High Court's release of an Internal Security Act detainee accused of involvement in a plot to convert Malays to Christianity.

Jamaluddin Othman, who is also known as Yeshua Jamaluddin, was detained on five charges under the Act.

He was alleged to have been involved in activities which were said could cause tension and enmity between Muslims and Christians and thus endanger the country's security.

Jamaluddin was subsequently released from detention when the High Court allowed his application for a writ of *habeas corpus* on Oct 6 last year.

DPP Mohamed Raus Shariff told the Supreme Court, comprising Lord President Tan Sri Abdui Hamid Omar, Chief Justice of Malaya Tan Sri Hashim Yeop Sani and Supreme Court judge Datuk Ajaib Singh, that Jamaluddin had left the country.

Jamaluddin was, however, represented by counsel Lee Min Choon at Monday's hearing. After the submissions, Tan Sri Hamid said the court was reserving judgment because the issue had a far-reaching effect.

In his submission, Mr Mohamed Raus argued that the Home Minister had said in his order against Jamaluddin that the detention was necessary to stop him from threatening the country's security.

He said that the order was valid and that Jamaluddin's involvement in an organised plot to convert Malays to Christianity could cause tension and hostility between the two religions.

Mr Lee submitted that to detain Jamaluddin for planning to propagate his religion was to detain him for exercising his constitutional right under the constitution.

The minister had acted in excess of his power and outside the scope of the Internal Security Act when he ordered Jamaluddin to be detained, he added.

When releasing Jamaluddin, High Court Justice Datuk Anuar Zainal Abidin had ruled that the detention order was null and void and was made against the constitution and outside the purview of the ISA. — Bernama.

My dear Readers,

What has Happened to the Bukit Batu Fund?

The Bukit Batu Fund was started on the eve of New Life's Inauguration, Oct. 1983. This enabled us to acquire 25,000 sq.ft. of high land in Bukit Batu Village at M\$1 per sg.ft. At that time the exchange rate was S\$0.90 = M\$1.00. This land is held in trust in the names of Elder John Ling and Elder Dr (Dato) Tow Siang Yeow (be-

ing Malaysian).

This prime land at the head of a proposed new housing estate was to be developed in a year. By that time, however, the building bus-Ayer Benban Kelapa Sawit iness began to totter. The recession was on by 1985. The development of the new estate has therefore been held in abeyance to this date. Our plan to develop a Church-kindergarten-campsite complex fell through.

As an alternative, we paid out of the Bukit Batu Fund a sum to lease a terrace house in the town area for 2 years, plus furniture and fixtures. Meanwhile, there was a move to buy over No. 6 Gilstead Road, the property opposite our Church. To rally to this immediate need, we transferred the BBF to our Church Extension Fund. Now that the deal is off (as you can see when you come to church), the BBF is naturally preserved. When the day comes to revive the Bukit Batu Project, Life Church will release the sum designated to make full payment. Cannot a Mother Church thus manage the affairs of an infant Church?

The openness of our Weekly receipts, designated or otherwise, has inspired full confidence in our givers. As the Lord has led Session to promote certain worthy projects, so have members spontaneously responded. Another reason why support to these Gospel enterprises has been so fervent is the assurance that we have managed our funds prudently and cost-effectively. Our accounts are open to any member to investigate, yea, everything is bare before you at every Annual Congregational Meeting. Whether the Bukit Batu Fund or the latest Batam Fund, it is administered with utmost care by our honorary and honourable treasurers. Amen.

Questions From a Young Christian

QUESTION 1 :"I'm 15 years old and I have some questions which I really need help. So I thought of seeking the FEBC for help. I am from Yio Chu Kang Gospel Hall and we not practise tongues-speaking.

"A year ago, my friend invited me to her (Charismatic) Church. When I saw them speaking in tongues, I was very frightened, as this was my first time. She then told me that the Bible did mention the Baptism of the Holy Spirit. For example, John the Baptist told the crowd that someone greater than him would come to baptise the people with the Holy Spirit and fire. However, there doesn't seem to be any interpretation.

"I also attended a part-time camp organised by the Assembly of God. Each time after they sang, they would start tongues-speaking again. However, when the song leader said, "You may sit down," they stopped immediately and sat down. I don't understand why they stopped so adruptly.

"I would like to know more about tongues-speaking and should we practise it? In what circumstances?"

ANSWER: Proper tongues-speaking came from God at Pentecost. Proper tongues-speaking is the speaking of a foreign language not learnt by the speaker. The tongues of Pentecost have ceased (I Cor. 13:8).

The type of tongues-speaking you heard is the confusion heard at the Corinthian Church. No interpreter (I Cor. 14:5). One qualification of God-sent tongues-speaking is "words easy to be understood" (I Cor. 14:9). Mere da-da-da-da or ba-ba-ba is no speech, therefore disqualified. Paul says, "Yet in the Church I had rather speak five words with my understanding, that by my voice I might teach others also, than ten thousand words in an unknown tongue" (I Cor. 14:19). To call off so-called tongues-speaking shows all this is humanly motivated, not Holy Spirit power. Get a copy of "A Stone Made Smooth" at our Bookroom. Here Wang Ming Tao tells how he gets out of tongues-speaking.

QUESTION 2 : "Are the Roman Catholics' doctrines totally different from ours? Would some of them get to heaven also? Bo they believe in water baptism?"

ANSWER : We are Protestants. Luther our leader got out of Roman Catholicism because of its evil doctrines. If a Roman Catholic sees the light and comes out like Luther, surely he will find salvation.

QUESTION 3 : "My father does not allow me to be baptised (water baptism) as he says I'm too young. Do you think I should go ahead, keeping it a secret, or to pray and wait for his consent?"

ANSWER : This is between you and God. The Holy Spirit will guide you as you search the Scriptures.

QUESTION 4 : "My cousin met with a Jehovah's Witness but fortunately, she managed to escape. If the government knows about it, will they get into trouble?"

ANSWER : Jehovah's Witnesses are against National Service. For this reason, our Government is against them. Your cousin is O.K.!

QUESTION 5 :"I would also like to know more about the Seventh Day Adventists."

ANSWER : Seventh Day Adventists' worship on Saturday is like "go-stan-balek"! They want to follow Jewish practice when Jesus has blessed the Lord's Day and the Apostles kept Sunday (Rev. 1:10).

A Glimpse of FEBC's Homiletics "Swimming Pool"

Every Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock, you can hear a sermon preached live by a student at chapel to the whole College. Sometimes a model sermon is distributed to the class for study and comment. The following comment by Korean student Rev. Lee Won Bok on Spurgeon's exposition of the Good Samaritan (as reprinted in <u>The Sword and Trowel</u>) is enlightening. As one with a good number of years in the pastoral ministry, he sees in depth what younger students do not.

Rev Lee Won Bok comments:

C. H. Spurgeon is one of the greatest preachers. He always preached the revelation of God from the Bible. I had preached this parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:30-37) a few times in my Korean Presbyterian Church. Still, when I read Spurgeon's sermon, I felt big shame. I found myself so poor in spirit before God.

Of course, I have my own style and principle for preaching. But I need to learn more homiletic principles and skills for delivering sermons. Spurgeon's sermon is expository and has a theme. His message makes application to all, both young and old, rich and poor. So, his message has a power to change one's soul, which is the fundamental purpose of a sermon.

When I read Spurgeon's sermon on the Good Samaritan, my heart burnt in me. I thank God because I became another healed through the Good Samaritan. I confessed to God that I did not care for the wounded, weak and rejected ones as a good steward who received much blessings from the Lord should. Spurgeon has taught me how to preach to the congregation and how to live with Jesus Christ as a good Christian.

REPORT ON MISSION TO WESTERN AUSTRALIA

With your fervent prayers we arrived safely in Perth Saturday night and were cleared of Customs by 10 pm without a hitch. We were warmly received by Robin, Mark and Grace, Eng Lam, Shirleen and Baby Swee Lee, and a number of young people.

Sunday morning we taught an open Sunday school on the Moral Law of God, after which was the 10 am Morning Worship. Here we spoke from Haggai on "Exhortation to Rebuild God's House," applying it to the Renovation of the Mt. Pleasant Church. At dusk, we were driven to a brand new school at Padbury where the Evening Worship was held at 7 pm. Here we preached on the true meaning of Christian Fellowship (through His blood) from I John 1. Both services were not fully attended, because it is school vacation time in Perth, so the students that made up a good part of the congregation were still

at home in Malaysia and Singapore, and these would not return till end of February. Attendance at Mt Pleasant was 230; Padbury, 34.

The Blind Korean Pastor Film we had brought along was shown to a nearfull house. A good number were new people, from the white community. Some who had been dropouts came back. Many were moved by the Return of the Prodigal Son as portrayed by the Blind Korean Pastor's life-story. A collection taken yielded A\$637.85, half of which converted into S\$540 was handed me to be sent to Pastor John Ahn. Fifty "Roska" tapes sold at A\$3 add to the Renovation Fund. The feedback was so strong that a second showing of the Film will be made in a fortnight, when the students are back. Many indicated they would see it a second time. A lady who had no money

the night of the showing told me she would bring an offering Sunday morning. It was a hongbao of A\$40 which is equivalent to S\$67.60. The total sum to Pastor John Ahn is S\$607.60.

After a second show, the Film will be sent to Rev. Paauwe, Adelaide. From Adelaide it will head for Melbourne, and from Melbourne it should be brought back to S'pore after the Easter Camp.

The Chinese New Year Dinner which celebrated also the 3rd Anniversary of the Church was attended by 155. What made it significant was the religious service woven into it. A dozen testimonies were given, interspersed with singing of hymns. My message, which was interpreted into Cantonese by Mr Stephen Cheng, dwelt on the V Commandment. Chinese New Year is a time to show filial piety to our parents and to receive their blessings. From our earthly father we traced up to the Heavenly Father. So Chinese New Year is meaningless without Worship and Thanksgiving to God. Praise God, Life Church's Chinese New Year Worship, drawing both English and Chinese congregations together, is a good example for BPCWA.

The YF has grown tremendously. Younger members have stepped up to a new leadership. Some of the young people whose parents I had baptised in S'pore and even at Batu Pahat were like my grandchildren. The message given to the YF was from Prov. 3:5-10--Formula for Success and Prosperity: 1. Confide your problems with Christ; 2. Consecrate your livelihood to Christ. To seal the message, an old chorus, "Trust in the Lord and Don't Despair" was sung over and over again.

The climax of this Mission was reached when we taught the open S.S. again on "The Sevenfold Will of God" to dispel Dispensational and Hyper-Calvinistic doctrines that have invaded the Church. The young Church here not only needs nurture, but also culture from virus attacks. One such attack is "Double Predestination" without due consideration of God's Justice. To dispel Hyper-Calvinism, I quoted liberally from Dr Buswell's <u>Systematic Theology</u> in the BPCWA Weekly (edited by Mark Heath).

The climax of this Mission was reached, indeed, when we baptised three University students at their own request. When Cornelius was saved in his house, Peter "commanded them to be baptised" (Acts 10:48). How could anyone prevent these three God-loving people from baptism who have gone through the Church Catechism Class and have testified by pen their salvation and the Spirit's prompting for baptism? Surely you would rejoice together with angels above "over one sinner that repenteth" (Luke 15:10). A sample testimony of salvation is from Yong Chor Hon:

"God put a desire in me to seek after a Supreme Bring, namely Himself. I went through different phases, viewing God through perspectives of different religions. All this I went through bound by intellectual human reasoning; it was fruitless. God gracefully brought me to a point whereby I had to accept Him purely by faith alone.

"That was a little over 3 years ago, and I am grateful that the Lord mercifully put me on a path to Him.

"Ever since then I've been growing at a fast rate, observing (painful) changes in areas of character, priorities, needs, and especially the knowledge of God (which is the most wonderful of all!). Most of what I've learned of God has been through my personal morning devotions. I thank God the Holy Spirit for His reproving, correcting, instructing and preserving till now and till I meet the Lord.



"Now I do not wish to disobey the Lord any longer, but to carry on with my Christian life by taking this step of baptism. I've not only been missing out on one, but two, sacraments: Holy Communion as well. Not taking the Lord's Supper makes me feel like a heathen, only allowed to watch the Communion. But I understand that to take it in the heart is more important than taking it only physically.

As to our challenge to members who attended the Chinese New Year Dinner to bring a Hongbao to the Lord for the Renovation of His House, the Thanksgiving Service received a total of over A\$1,000. (There is much room for improvement.) One of my purposes of going downunder was to prod the Congregation, especially its leaders, to give their tithes, the sacred tenth, to the Lord. Those who withhold have robbed God (Mal. 3:8). And those who dwell in "cieled hosues" (houses with luxurious furnishings) while God's House is lying cold, "earneth wages to put it into a hag with below" (Haggai 1:6)

lying cold, "earneth wages to put it into a bag with holes" (Haggai 1:6). Australia is now served by B-Ps and FEBCers in Perth, Padbury, Wyndham, Cootamundra, Melbourne and Adelaila. The greatest need is Melbourne as they do not have a pastor. Therefore we are sinding Elder Khoo Peng Kiat and his wife to Melbourne again, Feb. 14, 1989. Pray for Melbourne. Pray for all the other cities we have listed above.

What is the Greatest Event that can Happen in the Life of a Church?

Anniversary? When the Church is packed to overflowing? In the parable of the lost sheep, Jesus regards not the 99 in congregation but rather the one that is lost in the wilderness: "I say unto you, that likewise joy shall be in heaven over one sinner that repenteth, more than over ninety and nine just persons, which need no repentance."

What about exorcism? "And the seventy returned again with joy, saying, Lord, even the devils are subject unto us through thy name . . Notwithstanding in this rejoice not, that the spirits are subject unto you; but rather rejoice, because your names are written in heaven."

From these two passages we conclude that the greatest event that can happen in the life of a Church is when the lost soul has come to Christ, and the occasion that "officially" marks his salvation is Baptism Day! If Baptism is not so important, read the Great Commission in Matthew 28:18-20: ". . . baptising them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost . . . " Mark 16:16 says, "He that believeth and is baptised shall be saved."

Now, the importance of baptism and therefore at the earliest opportunity is stressed by none other than the Apostle Peter. He baptised the three thousand the same day they were converted. When Cornelius and his household were saved through his preaching, he declared, "Can any man forbid water, that these should not be baptised? . . . And he commanded them to be baptised in the name of the Lord" (Acts 10:47,48).

At seminary we were taught not to delay baptism in anyone who requests it so long as he can show forth the fruits of faith and repentance. Therefore, in my recent trip to Perth I baptised three University students who came to see me specially about this. Below are two more testimonies of the candidates, the first being published last week.

1. Testimony of Lee Seow Cheng (BPCWA)

I came to know the Lord in a very gradual way. He has always surrounded me with Christian teachers and friends to witness to me. Through their testimonies, I came to receive Christ as my only Saviour and begin to trust Him more and more.

The year before I came over to Perth, I attended a Methodist Church. During that time, I always questioned myself because I found that I was looking forward to meeting the YFers more than receiving God's Word. One year has passed by and it was God's will to send me over here to further my studies. I realise that my attitude towards God's Word has changed. I look forward to YF, Sunday School and Church Service because I want to learn more of His Word. It is so encouraging to know that God has given us so many promises and His love toward us is always steadfast. In these two years, I have grown to love the Lord more and more, for He never fails to carry me through in times of difficulties. He has even opened the door for me to serve Him in the YF. This is a new challenge to me whereby I can see God giving me an opportunity to take part in one of His ministries.

I have decided to seek baptism because it is a fulfilment of God's commandment, a public confession of faith, and a blessing on my soul, i.e. being allowed to partake of the Holy Communion. Last but not least, I would want to be an example as a YF committee member by taking this step of obedience.

2. Testimony of Bonnie Wong (BPCWA)

I was born into a Christian family and, ever since I can remember, I've been attending church and Sunday school. I thank my Lord for both my parents and my grandparents; they have always given me the opportunity to learn about God and Christianity. However, they have never forced me to go to church or forced me to accept Jesus Christ. I gave my life to Christ and accepted Him as my personal Lord and Saviour on 18th April 1978. And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God."

Indeed, I want to give myself to the Lord as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable unto God. I pray that He will use me in whatever manner that is according to His will.

Having stayed in Batamas for nearly two months, I got to know the Indonesian labourers who attend the Kebaktian better. Most of them came from Christian homes. They migrated from Sumatra to Batam, working hard under the suffocating heat of the sun to earn a living. Sad to say, the condition of their spiritual life is very cold toward God. As a result they like to smoke, drink and gamble among themselves. After hearing the Gospel preached to them and how God hates sin, there is a little change in them. They begin to see the gleams of God's truth and love to them. It is then my great privilege and joy to reflect God's character to them by loving them in Christ, in words I speak and in things I do and in explaining God's Word to them patiently, and as clear as possible.

The Lord is increasing the number of people coming to Kebaktian Indonesia. There are now sixteen people. Praise the Lord!

One of them came to believe and accept Christ as Lord and Saviour. He gave up smoking and drinking and wrote his decision on a sheet of paper saying, "I do not want to smoke and drink any more." Salvation comes from the Lord! "... there is the joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner that repenteth" (Luke 15:10). Praise the Lord!

Last week I received 30 copies of Indonesian hymn books, given by a Korean man (I do not know him) sent from Malang by mail. God provides. Praise the Lord! Reflection: Won't it be wonderful to see in the near future the baptism of the first Indonesian converts on Batam Island? If there is joy in heaven over this, will there not be joy on earth--even at Gilstead Road? - T.T.

REV. DANIEL JOHN EBERT III

A Biographical Impression by his son Dan IV

On Sunday afternoons young Dan Ebert could often be found at the side of his father, Rev Daniel Ebert Jr., as the latter ministered to the drunks and outcasts of Philadelphia's Skid Row. His father, who worked as a press manager for the Curtis Publishing Company, was a lay-preacher. By the time of his death three years ago Rev Dan Ebert Jr. had established several churches in the New Jersey-Pennsylvania area, had won hundreds of men and women to the Lord, and had influenced the lives of countless young-people for Christ. Though this is the story of his son, the father must not be forgotten: he is the root from which the tree has sprung.

In such a home, the call to the foreign mission field was received with bitter-sweet joy. There would be sorrow in the years of separation from loved ones, but joy would come from following Jesus to the ends of the earth. Upon receiving his call from the Lord, Rev Ebert underwent his missionary preparation at the New Tribes Mission training institute, this was supplemented with linguistic studies at the University of Wisconsin. Rev Ebert also completed his studies at the South Jersey Bible Institute. Soon the young

missionary found himself, along with his wife and three small children, living in the midst of the jungles on the island of Palawan in the Philippines. The Lord had placed him in an obscure corner of His vineyard in an unheard of part of the world. In such a place, surrounded by a primitive people, facing frequent sickness from Malaria, his father's life verses often gave him strength:

"Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and LET US RUN WITH PATIENCE the race that is set before us, LOOKING UNTO JESUS the author and finisher of our faith; who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down

at the right hand of the throne of God" (Hebrews 12:1,2).

The Lord's timing is perfect. The hearts of the Palawano tribe had been cultivated by the Spirit for conversion. Within the first few years of his labour, a large part of the tribe had turned to Christ. Witch doctors burned their medicine bags, entire villages turned to the Lord, and little churches were built. Now the long and arduous work of translating the New Testament into the Palawano language began. Rev Ebert gave himself to this task with singleness of mind and heart. He would not be distracted. Rarely would he leave the jungle for rest and refreshment. The yearly trip to Manila, wisely required by the mission, he found an irritation. The Palawano saints must have their Bible. The months and years passed. Finally in 1965, despite failing health from malaria and overwork, the task was complete. The first Palawano New Testament came off For having completed this New Testament translation, and for the quality the press. of his work, Rev Ebert was elected to be an honorary life-time member of the United Bible Societies. This was of little value to the weary missionary in comparison with the reality of Palawano Christians now reading God's Word in their own tongue.

During his furlough in America the following year, the Lord led Rev Ebert, in fellowship with several fundamental pastors, to found the Christian Training and Missionary Fellowship. Under the auspices of CTMF, of which he has served as the field director for the past twenty years, Rev Ebert has contributed in many ways to the separatist Biblebelieving movement in the ASEAN region. He has taught for many years at the Fundamental Baptist Bible Institute in Metro-Manila, where he presently serves as Dean of the Faculty. During the course of his ministry he has written numerous popular commentaries on various books of the Bible, a series of books on Bible doctrine, and a most significant work on biblical separation entitled, Will our Sons Defend the Faith? Many of these works have been written in preparation for lectures given at yearly pastors' and workers' conferences in the Philippines, but their circulation has extended far beyond this.

In 1977 his eldest son joined him in the work, and in 1979 his younger son also took up the task. Rev Dan Ebert III had been very close in heart and spirit to his own father, this despite their almost constant separation during 30 years of foreign missionary service. When Rev Dan Ebert Jr. was called Home in 1986, the Lord tenderly timed it with the son's furlough. After having spent some happy days together, the father passed away in the hospital. His last conversation had been with his bed-side nurse, to whom he bore witness of God's saving grace. The father who had led the son down Skid Row for Christ so many years ago was now gone. His presence could never be replaced. But the Lord had eased the loss for Rev Ebert by the balm of one son on his right hand and a second on his left. The tree which had sprung from the root now had two branches. Under the counsel of their father the sons have established the Center for Biblical Studies, a small graduate school committed to training pastors in Biblical languages and theology

for the cause of the fundamental separatist Church in the Philippines. At the Centre Rev Ebert teaches Hebrew, Contemporary Theology, and Old Testament studies.

Several years ago Rev Ebert began making annual trips to Singapore, where he has ministered among the Bible-Presbyterian churches. He is a regular contributor to the popular RPG devotional series, and has been a guest lecturer at the Far Eastern Bible College, as well as a guest speaker at several family camps. These visits, as well as the important visits of Dr Timothy Tow and his brother Dr Tow Siang Hwa to the Philippines, have helped to cultivate a healthy and fruitful relationship between the separatist churches in these two ASEAN nations. Important funds coming from the churches in Singapore for relief work in the Philippines, as well as substantial funds for the building of Filipino churches, have been channelled through Rev Ebert.

In the midst of these heavy teaching, writing and administrative ministries, Rev Ebert is preparing for a second publication of the Palawano New Testament, as well as a new edition of the Palawano hymnal.

PASTORAL CHAT

Calvin's Interpretation of Colossians 1:24


"[I] who now rejoice in my sufferings for you, and fill up that which is behind of the afflictions of Christ in my flesh for his body's sake, which is the Church."

According to Calvin, the Roman Church, which deny the free remission of sins, have required works of satisfaction. When the satisfactions do not fill up the right measure, they call to their help the blood of martyrs, that it may, along with the blood of Christ, avail as expiation at the judgment of God. And this mixture they call the "Treasury of the Church." They twist the above verse to say that Paul here affirmed that his sufferings were for the taking away of men's sins! Thus the Papists gather from this verse that saints are redeemers, whose blood, like Christ's, is shed for the forgiveness of sins!

Calvin refutes this, quoting Augustine, "Though the brethren die for the brethren, yet no blood of any martyr is poured out for the remission of sins. This Christ did for us. Nor has He in this conferred upon us something to imitate, but to give thanks for."

Calvin concludes, "Now that this is the meaning of Paul's words is very clear from the context. For he adds that he suffers according to the dispensation that was committed to him. And we know that there was committed to him the ministry, not of redeeming the Church, but of building it. And he immediately afterwards expressly acknowledges this. This is also what he writes to Timothy, that he endures all things for the sake of the elect, that they may attain the salvation which is in Christ Jesus (II Tim. 2:10). <u>Welcome Rev Dan Ebert III</u>

I count Rev Dan Ebert III one of my most esteemed friends. If you have read the story of this missionary of the cross last Lord's Day, you will know him as one serving Christ in the steps of St Paul. It is therefore our great honour to have him speak at our Malacca Camp. I'm sure God has reserved a portion of blessing for each one of you campers. To benefit those who cannot attend, I've asked Rev Ebert to speak at both the 8.00 am



and 10.30 am services the Sunday after camp. Kelapa Sawit Dedication This Afternoon, March 12, 3.00 pm

One token of God's blessing is the dedication of the New Two-storey extension and kindergarten. After some years, it came under Life Church's sole mandate. In 1978 Kelapa Sawit built a handsome church, parsonage and a two-classroom kindergarten. Now it has 4 classrooms and 2 other rooms added.

During the years, Kelapa Sawit has branched out, with the help of Life Church, to Bukit Batu and Air Bemban. Elder John Ling meanwhile has joined FEBC to train for the pastoral ministry. He is completing his second year. The future of this southern church base is bright. What next, Kelapa Sawit?

My dear Readers,

Holy Week, 1989

Today is Palm Sunday. This beginning of Holy Week, 1989, brings us once again to that Royal Event of our Lord's entry into Jerusalem on a donkey amidst chants of Hosanna by palm-carrying crowds. The Son of David, King of Israel, Son of God, had come to redeem

a lost world by His death on the cross. Let us on the anniversary day join with the children of old to sing praises to Him. Let us come and worship before Him.

Every year, during Holy Week, we urge members to set aside special time to prayer and meditation, to come to the Lord's Table, Good Friday night, 8.00 pm, "and none shall appear before Me empty" (Exo. 23:15). This is a B-P tradition ever since we started in 1950.

This is our 39th year. To celebrate the 40th Anniversary, Session has decided to do a thorough renovation of these "aging" buildings (built 1962-63). 
brought by Rev Dan Ebert III.

Everyone, however, came together for buffet meals and breaks in the "Parameswara Restaurant" on the premises, where we shared good fellowship one with another. The afternoons were free and a guided bus tour of the places of interest in Malacca was conducted on the fourth afternoon.





My dear Readers,

INDIAGRAM

Knowledge is Power, Knowledge of God is Divine Power And, that branch of theological knowledge I'm discussing that gives divine power is the knowledge of God's providence. God rules over everything, both great and small, even the sparrow and every hair on my head (Matt. 10:29-30)!

Now, the timetable Mr Ee worked out for me to Hyderabad did not seem best, but that was the only one available. Why I wasn't very happy was, coming to India I had to fly MH via K.L. and Penang, and my arrival in Madras would be just before midnight. Then I had to take a taxi to a hotel 20 km out, but had to fly the next morning, 6 am. This meant I could have barely 3 hours' sleep in between.

When I got out of Madras airport, however, I was informed by Mr Rajkishore and Baskaran who received me that the 6 am flight was delayed to 8.15 am. Moreover, there was no need to waste the taxi fare and time going to the city hotel, for the Airport Hotel had accommodation for me. Thus, I was able to settle down immediately while the extra bed gave accommodation to Baskaran (FEBC graduate), so we could have time for fellowship. God always has a better timetable in store for us, if we would just patiently wait.

Arriving a day ahead of schedule has given me time to meet a Mr Beard from the U.S.A. He is an itinerant evangelist stressing the use of Gospel'posters. His zeal on evangelism as manifested in his talk to the students here made a deep impression on me. Therefore I've invited him to visit FEBC when he comes to S'pore in April. Without this earlier arrival I'd have missed him.

Bharat Bible College was founded 20 years ago by Dr Buraga. He was a contemporary of Rev Paauwe at Faith Seminary. Starting out in a small way, he has waxed great, providing a fundamental Bible education to hundreds, to the sons of India and to a goodly number from Burma. So far 370 have graduated.

Today Bharat Bible College is beautifully situated on 14 acres of prime land not far from a lake. The College is in constant expansion, building and building. It has ample facilities for 100 men and women students, runs its own printing press and a recording station. It has a radio ministry. It is so efficient that my typewritten message given to the printer upon arrival would appear on the College Magazine the day it was delivered. My message is, "Why Bible College?"

As for the Missionary Conference it was noted such a meeting was salutary to the graduands who were now leaving the alma mater. It should bolster their faith and assure them of the Lord's pleasure and provision according to the Great Commission, Matt. 28:18-20. An exposition of the whole chapter of Matthew 10 builds on the Great Commission, showing how God would provide for them in every aspect of their ministry.

There were to be book prizes for the 29 graduands. As some of these books did not arrive on time, the numbers I've brought along such as <u>Asian Awakening</u> and <u>Law of Moses</u> were awarded instead.

Hitherto we have been mailing our publications mostly to poor pastors in the Philippines, and to the Centre for Biblical Studies (Rev Dan Ebert). My visit to Hyderabad has opened a new vista to this book ministry. Our books are Gospel missiles! They are like ammunition for the pursuit of war. Now we have a war with Satan to the bitter end, as God in Genesis 3:15 has declared: "And I will put enmity between thee (Satan) and the woman, and between thy seed and her seed . . . " These book ammunitions we send to other parts of the world, could we not call them book missiles?

BOOK MISSILES are a new avenue for your service to the Lord. The books we publish are freely offered to the Lord's use. But to send them takes quite a lot of postage. If you want to have a part in the BOOK MISSILES, please so indicate under this title! Hundreds of dollars have been spent mailing out theological books, e.g. to Burma. In this connection, we want to thank the donor of a second batch of 10,000 tracts of <u>Faith: True or False</u>. This tract will be out soon. There's a request from an Australian reader to have my article THE HOLY LAW OF GOD in the Banner printed into a tract. Who'll give \$500 to BOOK MISSILES for this? EASTER IS MISSIONS

The Command to go into the world with the Gospel was not given on Ascension Day only. It was first given, in fact, the Evening of Easter Sunday: "As my Father has sent Me, even so send I you" (John 21:21). Indeed, Missions is broadcasting the Good News of the Risen Saviour to anyone we meet, wherever we go. Missions begins with your next door neighbour, but Missions extends to Hyderabad too. Let this Easter see our Church arise to a new dimension in Missions! Yours in His glad service, T.T.

The Story of Institute Alkitab Indonesia Barat

2 B-P WEEKLY

Our contact with North Sumatra dates back to November 1972 when we were invited to meet certain Lutheran Church leaders for the purity of the Faith. Through this contact a stream of young Indonesians have been attracted to FEBC, beginning with Dohar. Sahat



followed suit the next year, and there continued to come Glorya, Haposan and Agus, Ranto and Roska. The first four graduated with the B.Th. and the rest with Dip.Th.

Since graduation in the early eighties, Dohar and Glorya have worked with Rev Djunaidi in Pontianak. Though they left after a season for their hometown Medan, they have founded an assembly of their own with Miss Britto, a children's work and a growing Sunday School. Dohar also teaches theology at a Bible School at Banda Baru, several hours out of Medan.

Meanwhile, an outreach to Kuta Bahru, also several hours out of Medan in the Mountains, was established. This was manned by Bapa Siregar, father of Dohar and brothers, whom we ordained that the flock might have regular Lord's Supper and Baptism. Kuta Bahru is now attended to by Agus every weekend and on the Lord's Day. Bapa goes up for the Lord's Supper.

Bapa Siregar has a house at Perumnas, Mandala, a crowded Government housing estate. This house he bought upon his retirement. This became the nucleus of the City work. Here I had baptised the first batch of half a dozen believers in the early eighties. As the Church grew, especially the Sunday School, it was deemed necessary to acquire some property nearby. Now, as Life Church was short of hands, we gave our Medan work and Kuta Bahru station to Galilee (Rev Frank Low) about 1985.

The Galileans did a splendid work buying over a 14 x 40 m property with a minibus at 25 million rupians. They converted the dwelling house into a kindergarten and added a two-room schoolhouse to the existing property.

Today, the B-P Church of North Sumatra (pending registration) has a registered kindergarten of over 60 and a primary school of the first three standards, also with over 60 pupils. On weekends, the Lord's House bristles with 120 in the YF; on Sunday, an adult worship of 40 and a Sunday School of 1501 As there is a pressing need for further physical expansion and there is a four-square piece of land 40 x 40 m abutting the Church and School, I was invited last week by Haposan, who brought the Pakpahans to Singapore for medical examination, to see the land and advise on the work. We left on Friday and I returned Saturday the following day, having accomplished our mission. (On Sunday at 10.30 am, however, Mrs Pakpahan was taken by the Lord. A farewell service was held the same night at Casket, Sin Ming Estate.)

On that Friday Night we held a meeting of the Siregar Family consisting Bapa Siregar, Haposan, Dohar and wife Glorya, and Agus (Sahat had met us earlier in the afternoon). We realised the strategy for North Sumatra is not to build a Church but a Bible school. Already Haposan has been holding a term of evening classes like FEBC's Monday and Thursday evening lectures. He also calls his "Basic Theology for Everyone." He has 15 regular students.

Medan itself has a population of 2 million. Young people everywhere are in search of education which is hard to come by. The establishment of a Bible Institute is most welcome by the Government which, under "Pancasila," prescribes Christianity as one religion taught in all Government schools.

To start a Bible School in Medan, we have four who hold the B.Th. from FEBC. Dohar is studying for the Masters in the meantime, while he teaches. What we lack is adequate physical facilities, and what better opportunity than the next door land, so fair and square! For a name to the new Bible School we finally arrived at <u>Institute Alkitab Indonesia Barat</u>, which, being interpreted is, Bible Institute of West Indonesia.

Now, the Lord has said, "For everyone that hath shall be given, and he shall have abundance" (Matt. 25:29). The B-P Church in Medan and the Kindergarten has accumulated 5 million rupiahs = S\$5,500. To encourage the local church, we added 200,000 rupiahs from Life Church, a pledge of our support. Henceforth, Medan must take a greater lead with Galilee. Life Church can support from the side.

The concluding thoughts of this week's poetry by Linda Chan, are they not an expression of the missionary spirit of Lifers?

Let it always be said

That Lifers are not only a giving people,

But also an out-going people,

Winning souls for our Risen Saviour!

Let the story of Institute Alkitab Indonesia Barat soon be sung with the buying up of the land next door! Amen.

Altogether there are 15 students, and there are some new applications.

As far as the building is concerned, we have finished an eleven-room dormitory, a kitchen-cum-store and a dining room. And because the present place where we are has become like Elisha's (II Kings 6:1-7), we will transfer to this new place in May if electricity is ready. We need one more dormitory, two classrooms and a library. Meanwhile, we will use the Church building as a classroom.

Ed. Note: To help replenish their library, we will send BOOK MISSILES from our publications, e.g. Asian Awakening, Gospel of Life, etc.

THE WEDDING IS ANNOUNCED between Michael K. Koech and Susan C. Maemba on April 21, 2) 1989 at the Chesoen African Gospel Unity Church. An FEBC graduate 1987, Michael Koech, Box 33, Bomet, Kenya, is pastor and lecturer at a Bible Institute. He writes:

I spent much time in prayer asking the Lord in which area he wanted me to serve. My church had just started a Bible school and was expecting me to come back and teach. In answer to prayer, the Lord led me to teach in the new school, Bomet Bible Institute. This decision was confirmed by the fact that there was also a church near the school which was in need of a pastor. Thus, I could combine the two responsibilities. This was a practical lesson learnt from my FEBC lecturers who were also pastors. I prefer to be a pastor and lecturer rather than being a lecturer without a pastoral ministry..

Silibwet Africa Gospel Unity Church where I preach and the Bible Institute at Bomet are 10 kilometres apart. Since we are short of pastors and other helpers in our churches, I do almost everything in the church. My Sunday morning begins at 7.30 a.m. with a 45 minutes bicycle ride to the church. At the Sunday School, I lead the opening devotions at 8.30 a.m. I teach the beginners' class while the other 3 teachers take the other classes. This takes an hour altogether and allows 30 minutes to prepare for worship which ends at noon. When I am not speaking at the ladies' fellowship in the afternoon, I visit absent members or witness to non-christians...

It is at the Bible Institute where the skills acquired at FEBC are utilized. Since joining the teaching staff here, I have been teaching Systematic Theology. This is a class where students have many questions. The lessons I have learnt from "Calvin's Institutes" have been helpful in answering these questions. I have also taught Homiletics and Church History. Presently, I am teaching Hermeneu-tics and the Swahili language which is the "Mandarin" of East Africa. Since it is not the mother tongue of our students, there is a need to improve their command of this language for preaching purposes. We do not teach the biblical languages because it is beyond the comprehension of our students at this time. Besides, the duration of our training is only 3 years. Our medium of instruction is English.

Our first 4 students will graduate at the end of this year. We only admit male students at present since we do not have sufficient facilities. We hope to admit ladies in the fulure...

Family Salvation Night by Life Bible Class

Last Saturday, a "Family Salvation Night" for Cantonese and Hokkien parents was held at the FEBC Hall under the auspices of the LBC. Since I can speak Cantonese, I was the preacher. Mr Peter Chng was interpreter. This was about the fourth occasion that such an outreach was made by LBCers to their parents. Previously Rev Djunaidi and Rev Lim Jui Kai were speakers.

Such a noble effort on the part of our young people should be widened to include the whole Church. The whole Church should be concerned for the salvation of unsaved parents, grandparents, uncles and aunts. The English-speaking younger generation must not neglect their seniors.

An Exemplary Forerunner

The first B-P Church to launch a Family Salvation Night is Nazareth. Since they started this Gospel project in 1980 I have been closely involved. Here's an overall report under the caption 27th Family Salvation Night that makes thrilling reading--that shall encourage our LBC young people to plan for another and yet another Family Salvation Night. Now, we need not stick merely to sermons. We can follow their example of using a 30minute Cantonese Gospel Film. A picture is worth a thousand words. After the film, a commentary leading the listeners to the foot of the Cross can be very effective.

"The Lord is not slack concerning His promise, as some men count slackness;" but is longsuffering to us-ward, not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance." (2 Peter 3:9)

By faith and with God's grace, Nazareth held her first Family Salvation Night on 21st March 1980. The first meeting was attended by 11 loved ones. This Friday, 7th April at 8.00 pm, we will have our 27th Family Salvation Night Meeting in the Fellowship Hall. A Gospel film will be screened. The speaker is the pastor of Life B-P Church. We thank God for him who has faithfully preached the Gospel of Life in Cantonese and Hokkien to our unsaved loved ones for the past 8 years. Elder Adrian Wong's grandmother, Mdm Leong Kuan Fong, has consented in sharing her testimony on God's mercies and grace upon her. Do pray earnestly that God's Spirit will touch and move the hearts of our parents, relatives and friends to attend the meeting.

We praise the Lord that since we started the Family Salvation in 1980, more than 50 loved ones have heard the Gospel at least once. Last year, we witnessed the salvation of Jeffrey Chua's mother (61 years old), Adrian Wong's grandmother (85 years old), Charles Fong's mother (62 years old), Susan and Henry's mother (67 years old) and Ray Ang's mother (64 years old). Thus far, we have a total of 35 loved ones who have believed. Six of them have gone to be with the Lord.

This year, let us continue to pray and trust God that there will be breakthrough in the salvation of unsaved fathers. Thank the Lord that "For with God nothing shall be impossible" (Luke 1:37). Be encouraged too with these comforting words, "Behold, I am the LORD, the God of all flesh: is there any thing too hard for me?" (Jeremiah 32:27).

My FOREWORD to <u>Blind Korean Pastor An Yohan's Autobiography</u> now being printed by CLBC: Ever since I came to know the "Blind Korean Pastor" An Yohan through his film four or five years ago, a bond of friendship has developed between us because of Calvary.

Realising the power this film has over its audience to turn prodigal sons to Christ, I inquired to have it shown again in Singapore. By courtesy of the Embassy of the Republic of Korea, we had the Blind Korean Pastor film screened 23 times betweeen September and December 1988 to all Bible-Presbyterian Churches and to several other church groups. Over five thousand people were blessed. The feedback was tremendous. Backsliders have returned to the Lord, tears of repentance and consecration were shed by both sinners and saints.

By putting three Korean songs of the film into English and having them sung by Miss Roska Sihombing, graduate of Far Eastern Bible College and Life Church missionary to Batam, five hundred tapes have been made for the nurture of grateful hearts. Since then the film has been introduced to B-P Churches in Australia, to packed houses, with the same response.

Behind this film is Pastor An's autobiography which was published in Korea, 1981. This biography has now gone through fifty-four printings, making it a bestseller in the history of publication of books in Korea. Now that it is translated into English, should it not be put into print for the benefit of the English-speaking?

Having read the English version with the film at the back of my mind, I am all the more impressed by the Blind Korean Pastor's noble thoughts and insights into the spiritual world. This book shows the way to life everlasting in the Lord Jesus Christ and revives hope for the handicapped to live vibrantly through this world below. If you, dear Reader, have been heavily battered by the storms of life, read on to the very end. You will become a different person!

Inasmuch as the film has turned thousands to Christ, I have no doubt that the publica-



tion of this English version will translate many more from the kingdom of darkness to the Kingdom of Light. In this regard I must express my deep appreciation to Deacon Paul Wong of the Christian Life Book Centre for his part in the printing of this book. - T.T.

Monday, July 31 at New Life BPC, Woodlands, the night of the ordination of 5 B-P Pastors. In the introduction to his autobiography, Rev An writes of his father:

"Although the city of Soonchon in Pyongnam Province, where we lived, was an extremely active Christian town, Father had absolutely no interest in Christianity until the spring of the year I was born. His family had been deeply rooted in its strict traditions. Coming from a wealthy family and being a youth with a free spirit had made him obstinate and proud. Christian teachings concerning God as Creator, God as Father, original sin, the forgiveness of sin through the blood of Jesus Christ, heaven prepared for believers and the temporary nature of life here on earth, were laughing matters to him.

"Then one day, God confronted him. By chance, it seemed, he was led to a revival meeting in a neighbouring town, and he returned from that meeting a changed man. He has not been the same since. I never had the courage to find out the details of his conversion, fearing that I would not be able to face his overwhelming, mystical religious experience. The fact that father was filled with the Holy Spirit and immersed so deeply in Christianity at the time of my birth could only be seen as an inescapable reality.

"From the time of my birth, Father attached the disciple's name John to me as an anchor to hold me fast to his dream of making me a servant for God. Not only was I the centre of his dream, but he took away all of the worldly privileges and pleasures to which I was entitled. He even donated most of his inheritance to the Pyongyang Theological Seminary, and became a student at the school himself. He moved the family there, relinquishing the responsibility of a father as the head of a family and as its provider. Instead of being the son of my earthly father, I was adopted by a God whom I had never met, and inherited poverty and suffering in place of security and comfort."

It had been an agonising year for me; I was emotionally unprepared to plunge into studies. It had been difficult to mingle studies with tears, but the Lord has been good. Whenever the tears blurred my vision and wet the printed page, my grieving heart cried, "Lord, Lord, comfort me!" He never fails to comfort me (John 14:18).

Pastor was correct when he wrote in the Americourier No. 6: "The Lord will give you the strength to carry on, but above all through your agonies to alleviate the sufferings of other mothers in a similar situation" (Life B-P Weekly dated 19th June 1988). for throughout the year I was able to comfort three Christian mothers who also lost their only sons through illness. As Elder Lim Teck Chye once said to the Adult Class when he preached on II Corinthians, "Only those who have lost their loved ones are able to empathise with the bereaved. Other than that, we can only sympathise with them." I thank the Lord for using me as a human comforter by moving me to write to comfort, and share my testimonies with these mothers in the times of their sufferings.

As I read the RPG during my daily devotions, like Naomi, I believe that whatever happened to me was not "hap" (RPG, 10th Apr '89) nor was it "bad luck." Whatever happened to me is within the Lord's sovereign will. Yes, even my studying at NUS, despite my age. I believe the Lord is in full control of my life. Somehow studying has a therapeutic effect on me, for throughout the year I have been too busy with the heavy amount of reading to find time to grieve. I thank the Lord for giving me strength to carry on, for helping me through my first year at NUS and for helping me pass my first examination for the BA degree. May He continue to give me strength and wisdom to help me through my second year.

Yes, as God's creatures He cares for us, and no one cares for us the way Jesus does. Praise God for restoring my soul and for healing my broken heart. Amen. (Eph. 2:16-19)

Further to our ACM last Lord's Day, I would like to add my appreciation to Deacon Charlie Chia our Assistant Treasurer for presenting so neatly and clearly all the financial transactions of our Church. Won't you say a kind word to him when you see him at the counter today?

As for the question put forward by Mr Eio Eng Hua (Treasurer of FEK) on the loans extended to Bethel BPC (Melbourne), Shalom BPC (Pasir Ris), New Life BPC (Woodlands) and Kelapa Sawit BPC (Johore), these being help to our needy brother churches, no interest is charged (Lev. 25:36). On their part, however, great profit has been made! e.g., Bethel BPC (Melbourne). Using the money we had loaned them, they bought 5 acres of land, with

a view to building their sanctuary. Meanwhile, there came a sale offer from an ACG church (seating capacity for 500) which was clinched at A\$750,000. As land has appreciated by leaps and bounds, the eventual selling of the 5 acres should more than pay for the price asked by the AOG church. Besides this, when we loaned Melbourne a first sum of \$\$350,000, the exchange was \$\$1.40 to A\$1.00, much lower than today's rate. So, it has been profit all around. Not only in dollars, but also in souls saved. Melbourne's congregation has now reached the 3-figure mark.

Melbourne That we had surplus to help these brother churches was due to our purchase of No. 6 Gilstead Road falling through. The Lord's higher will be done. This alternate investment of our money, you'll agree, is working to the greater extension of God's Kingdom.

Incidentally, the time of our departure for Melbourne has come. We're flying out to Melbourne May 3. There we shall minister till July 9. To kill two birds, we stopover one week in Perth in order to attend the Dedication of the new building July 16, returning to Singapore the same night. Pray for us, that wherever we go our feet might be "shod with the preparation of the gospel of peace" (Eph. 6:15).

Concurrently, Charles Seet, senior student at FEBC, is being sent to help the Paauwes in Adelaide, May 12 - July 11. As his 60-day cheap ticket (S\$1180, SIA) fits in perfectly with his two-month stint, we praise the Lord for a saving of \$300 on the usual one-year ticket. Pray also for Charles Seet and the Paauwes, that Hope BPC and the Fundamental Bible College of Australia might grow up together strong and healthy. "It is more blessed to give than to receive," says our Lord (Acts 20:35) and isn't it also more blessed to give of our sons than our substance?

Not only our sons, but daughters as well. Pray for FEBC students that each one, man or woman, may find a corner of the Lord's vineyard to serve during their long vacation. Marilyn of Kuching will visit with her people in the longhouse for a season before going over to Batam to assist Roska. This is one glimpse of our students doing their "practical."

We thank God also for a good intake of students July 24 when the College reopens. Pray for the Steeles who were such a blessing to us last year. The Steeles will arrive July 24 and teach the whole Semester until November. One taking a new role on the faculty is none other than Dr Tow Siang Hwa, President of the College. He will teach 2 hours on Genesis.

Soon after the College reopens there will be a whirl of activities. There will be the return screening of "Academic Award" Film of the Blind Korean Pastor An Yo Han, Sat. July 29, 8.00 pm at Life Church, Gilstead Road; Sun. July 30, 6.00 pm at Sunset Gospel Hour, Calvary Pandan BPC; Mon. July 31 after the Ordination of B-P Pastors, 7.00 pm. This is to cater particularly to members in Johore.

The English Version of An Yo Han's Autography will be launched on July 30 at Calvary Pandan, whose Korean original has gone through 54 printings! I've read the book twice and heartily recommend that you get one. Give it to a friend in need of spiritual help. God's plan of salvation comes to the needy in a new wrapping!

The five for ordination are: Elder Koa Keng Woo of Muar, Eric Kwan of New Life, Tang Wai Kay of Calvary BPC, Yap Beng Shin of Bethlehem-Jurong (English) and last but not least, Mark Heath of Perth. Pray for these ordinands that they may persevere to serve the Lord to the end.

Then there is the FEBC Graduation Service to be held at Calvary BPC, Sun. August 20. It will be a double graduation of the Classes of 1987 and 1988. Four amongst these graduands are now preparing for further study at Bob Jones University, viz., Dr Patrick Tan, Quek Suan Yew, Jeffrey Khoo, Jemima Tow. Yes, I am. More so, a Christian Singaporean. Here are some statistics about Singapore and Christian missions:


Singapore is 20th among the world's richest countries. Looking from the other end, an average Singaporean's income is equal to 49 Nepalese workers' pay, or that of 46 Bengolis, 37 Burmese, 26 Indians, 25 Chinese in China, 32 Pakistanis or 16 Sri Lankans. There are 186 missionaries sent out by Singapore churches. Forty-one are serving amongst the Chinese while the other 145 are involved in cross-cultural work: 126 in Asia, 30 in Africa, 13 in Europe, 7 in North America and 10 in the Pacific Region. Of these 186 missionaries, 46 are short-termers.

"The harvest truly is plenteous, but labourers are few" (Matt. 9:37). At the Sunset Gospel Hour last Lord's Day, I once again challenged both young and old to give themselves to fulltime service. To enter the Lord's vineyard at 60 is not too late!

*MORE BLESSED TO GIVE .

Elder E. Mahadevan

It is a tremendous feeling of joy and blessing to know how others look up to Life B-P Church with a deep sense of gratitude and love. I had the privilege of experiencing this profound thankfulness when I attended the Dedication of the newly-completed BINILI

NG DUGONG IGLESIYA NI KRISTO - (BLOOD BOUGHT CHURCH OF CHRIST) at Pandacan, Manila, Sunday 30th April 1989.

This is one of the six impoverished churches in and around Metro Manila, that some five to six years ago our Pastor came to know through Rev Dan Ebert III. As a result, Lifers from both the English and Chinese services have given cheerfully to the Philippines Churches Fund. Your giving was channelled through Rev Ebert by whose diligent disbursements three out of six churches are now completed. The remaining three churches are still "working out their salvation."

When our Pastor was in Manila to lecture at the Centre for Biblical Studies, which is under the charge of Rev Dan Ebert III, he visited two of the three finished churches. They were the Kapitbahayan Church and "Tai-Tai" (spelt as "Tay Tay") Church.

On Sunday 30th April '89 at 9.30 am I worshipped at the Tay Tay Church, pastor Harsenio Manzano. The congregation of 120 were delighted to see me as one from Life Church. Their expression of thanks was sincere. They asked me to convey their best wishes to Pastor Tow.

Later in the afternoon at 2.30 pm (also accompanied by the Eberts), I was taken to the newly-completed Blood Bought Church at Pandacan, Pastor Wilardro Bona. To my great astonishment here was a three-storey edifice standing tall over a slum district.

A crowd of 200-250 attended the Ceremony. Amongst them were a city council member for that district, older members of the Church, well-wishers, friends and pastors of the other Churches. Two tablets fixed on the wall at the entrance were unveiled by the senior members of the Church. One of the tablets mentioned thanks to Life Church. At the entrance to the Church the ribbon was cut, both by the Pastor of the Church and myself. This was a great honour bestowed on me representing Life Church. At the end of the service presentations of plaques of appreciation were made. I received one on behalf of Life Church. The tribute paid to Life Church is a blessing to everyone of you who gave. I responded with a short exhortation. Truly I was overwhelmed with the joy and praises they expressed to Life Church.

Quoting Pastor in the Weekly of 13th November 1988, ". . . We do not want to discuss (empty talk), but rather to dispense our dollars on soul-saving projects that could not get off the ground, e.g. in the Philippines, whereby hundreds will hear the Gospel when their half-finished churches are completed. The Lord bless every item of love-gift offered . . . and bless each giver as your sweet-savour offering comes up to Him 'for a memorial' (Acts 10:4)."

LETTER FROM REV EBERT TO PASTOR

Please convey to the Church our appreciation for their sending Elder Eric Mahadevan to the dedication of the Church in Pandacan. His visit was a blessing to all and a great encouragement to the Church. The neighbourhood surrounding the church was so impressed by the new building that they detoured traffic from in front of the church for the opening of the dedication service which began outside.

Pandacan now joins Kapitbahayan with a finished church. Taytay is nearly completed. The three other churches are coming along quite well. Thank you for the additional US\$500 which will be added to the fund for these churches. Because of the difficulty in travel we were not able to get Elder Mahadevan to see these churches. But we did give him a report of their progress. This outreach of Life B-P Church has surely had a great impact on these Bible-believing separatist churches.

My heart was strangely warmed as I viewed the plaque in front of the Blood Bought Church in Pandacan. It was engraved in Tagalog, the language of the people in that area. Located next to the doorway, it will be read by the great number of people who pass by the church each day. Recorded there are words of thanksgiving to God for the completion of that beautiful place of worship. And also a mention of Life Bible-Presbyterian Church of Singapore which was greatly used of the Lord to make that place of worship a reality. I thought of how the ecumenists struggle through unbelief to make unity. But here we have tangible evidence of true Christian unity and love in action. Although most members of Life Church will never see this crowded area called Pandacan, even the heathen there will know of your love and see a living testimony of what God has done.

We want to pray God for devoted people who are using their time wisely for the advancement of God's Kingdom. I would like to quote from John Bunyan in his essay on "What True Prayer Is."

"Sincerity is such a grace as runs through all the graces of God in us, and through all the actings of a Christian, and has the sway in them too, or else their actings are not regarded of God. David speaks particularly of sincerity when he mentioned prayer: "I cried unto Him with my mouth, and He was extolled with my tongue. If I regard iniquity in my heart, the Lord will not hear me" (Ps. 66:17,18). Part of the exercise of prayer is sincerity, without which God does not accept it as prayer (Ps. 16:1-4). "Ye shall seek Me and find Me, when ye shall search for Me with all your heart" (Jer. 29:12,13). The want of this made the Lord reject the prayers of those mentioned in Hos. 7:14, where He says, "They have not cried unto me with their heart," that is, in sincerity, "when they howled upon their beds." It is rather for a pretence, for a show in hypocrisy, to be seen of men, and applauded for the same that they pray. Sincerity was that which Christ commended in Nathaniel, when he was under the fig tree. "Behold, an Israelite indeed, in whom is no guile" (John 1:47). Probably this good man was pouring out his soul to God in prayer under the fig tree, and that in a sincere and unfeigned spirit before the Lord. The prayer that has this in it is one of the principal ingredients is the prayer that God regards. Thus, "The prayer of the upright is His delight." (Prov. 15:8)." - P. Tan

LETTER FROM NORTH SUMATRA


Medan, 22/4/89

Dear Pastor Tow,

Greetings in the most blessed Name of Jesus Christ our Lord.

I am sorry for not writing to you for some time. It is due to my busy schedule. Indeed your visit to Medan has been a great blessing to us for we are challenged to work harder for the Lord. I have some things to share with you as follows: I.A.I.B.

As regards the Institute Alkitab Indonesia Barat (IAIB), already it is written twice in our weekly of how its name came about. When we received the Life B-P Weekly, we read the same story. We were amazed. Anyway, we are all for you and your story about Institute Alkitab Indonesia Barat. It was translated last week in our weekly as the third



story. The story of IAIB is already familiar to the people as a result of your visit. Items received for the Building Fund are recorded in our weekly, so the people may learn how to give according to their ability. The amount of their gifts may look little, but when it comes out of sincere hearts, our Lord will be pleased. The Late Mrs Pakpahan

We were thanking and praising God to hear that Life and Galilee churches cooperated in showing Christian love to the Pakpahan family. Mr Pakpahan testified of all the good things he received from B-P churches in Singapore during the funeral service [of his late wife] before big crowds, and called it an unforgettable memory. We were present at that funeral service and I was asked to speak. On the first day I spoke about Heavenly mansions (Jn. 14:1-6) and on the second day, "Resurrection and Life" (John 11:25,26). Last week when we visited him, he told us of his desire

to attend Basic Theology for Everyone at our Church. Do pray for him. Two American Missionaries (Munson and Lyman)

These two missionaries were sent to Sumatra in April 1834. When they arrived, the first place they went to was called Nias Land. After that they went to Padang and stayed there for more than a month. Their journey continued and they finally arrived at Sibolga in June 1834. From Sibolga they went to Silindung (about five days' walk). When they arrived at Silidung they thought their presence would bring great joy to the Batak people. But the reverse happened. The Bataks said to themselves, "These two missionaries are sibontar mata (white eyes). They come to spy. The Dutch have dominion over us." Finally they caught and killed them; not only that, they took their goods and ate them (this happened on 28th July 1834 at Lobu Pining about 20 km from Silindung). That is why on one of the Batak Church Anniversaries 75 years ago a memorial stone was erected for these two American missionaries. On that monument was written the saying of Tertullian: "The blood of martyrs is the seed of the Church." It was written in Dutch above and in Batak below.

For personal interest and because of my promise to you, I searched and found this page of early Church History of Batakland at the Indonesian School Library. Praise the Lord. Amen.

Family Worship

By now we have 17 families registered to be members of Medan B-P Church, but, sad to say, they are not active in the Church. Their knowledge of the Bible is very shallow. AUSTRALETTER I

May 10, '89 💒

Flying at a top speed of 609 mph at 37,000 ft., Qantas landed us in Melbourne at daybreak. We thank the Lord for a smooth and "prosperous journey by the will of God" (Rom. 1:10) and for Lim Hai Seng and Elder & Mrs Khoo to have come to receive us. We want to thank Elder & Mrs Mahadevan, Elder & Mrs Chia, Elder Tay, Dr & Mrs Tan and Clement, Deacon & Mrs Paul Wong, Deacon Geoffrey Tan, Bro. Leow Ban Tat and a goodly number of FEBC students and my children for sending us off. In Chinese we say, "Happy Welcome and Happy Send-off." How unhappy it would be were we to leave by ourselves and arrive unwelcomed.

What makes our arrival to this new assignment more pleasant is a welcome dinner by the Committee at the newly-bought Parsonage. Lunch was given by Elder & Mrs Khoo. The Parsonage at Shepherd Road serves as the Church Headquarters for every activity--Prayer Meeting, Youth Fellowship, Bible Study. It has three bedrooms and two sitting rooms, so two meetings can be held simultaneously. The worship service on the Lord's Day is held at Clayton Primary School where seating capacity for 150 is available in the gym room. It gave ample accommodation to 92, old and young, when I ministered to them last Sunday.

The night of ur arrival was Prayer Meeting night--a Thursday night. Before prayer we had a half-hour Bible message. Teaching them a new song, "Each Step I Take," I spoke from Psalm 37 on the ordering by the Lord of a good man's steps. In contrast I brought out the steps of a superstitious man without God, who relies on fortune-telling or astrology. Then there is the stoic who is the captain of his own salvation and the master of his own soul. Thirdly there is the self-willed like Saul who, knowing God's will, rebels against Him. Not so with David, the man after God's own heart, whose testimony is given in Psalm 37:23,24. Make sure, whatever you do, wherever you go, to be in the centre of His will. Then you will have good success.

Saturday Night the YF met at the Parsonage to hold a Talentime Night. We joined them with certain members from the Church. We enjoyed the fun and music items thoroughly. The young people like our new song "Each Step I Take." Our hearts were naturally warmed, notwithstanding the cold breath of winter coming in.

At the Lord's Day service I spoke on "some spiritual Gift" (Rom. 1:10) I'd brought to the young Church, viz., "How can a man be acquitted before the Judgment Seat of God* or, as Paul puts it in Habbakuk's words, "The Just Shall Live by Faith." How can a hellbound sinner be made just before a God who hates sin? Justification = "Just as if I'd not sinned" comes to us not by works, as the Roman Catholics teach, or as you self-imagine, but by FAITH = Forsaking All I Take Him. This is God's prescription to life everlasting, to Acquittal, to Justification. Quoting John Calvin, whose master-research gives us 43 aspects of FAITH, I dealt with 4 in the context of our Bible passage, Romans 1:1-17. 1) Faith, not nebulous faith in the wishful thinking of those outside Christ. Faith that Paul here talks about is Belief in the Gospel (I Cor. 15:1-4) which is the power of God unto salvation to every believer. 2) Faith's other side, like a coin, is Repentance, a turning away from sin and evil. 3) Forgiveness of sins sealed by Baptism. 4) The Gift of the Holy Spirit (Acts 2:38, Jn. 3:5), not tongues-speaking but a new life from Holy Spirit baptism (I Cor. 12:13). Praise the Lord, this message has some effect on a white Australian couple who discussed God, Hell, and Salvation at Loke Tat Luen's home after a steamboat dinner! Reader, can you say your sins are forgiven and you are on your way to heaven? The White Couple wasn't sure and we are praying for their salvation.

Now about the Blind Korean Pastor Film. We brought it downunder to Perth when we came at Chinese New Year. The Film was shown in Church twice. After that it was despatched to Adelaide, and from Adelaide to Melbourne. The film was to be shown at the Church's Easter Camp but without a projector it was postponed to one show at the Loke Home. This catered to only 40 people.

Before Elder Khoo brings home the film on May 18, we have one last chance to show it in Church May 14, after morning worship. Promising the people sandwiches with hot tea and steaming coffee, we believe all will stay. My faith is for 150 to attend, which will establish an all-time second. The Blind Korean Pastor Film as well as his book have been used of God to bless thousands throughout the world.

So, not only Perth, Adelaide, Melbourne have obtained the blessings of this Film. Peter Clements in Cootamundra is also showing it. He independently applies for one from the Korean Embassy in Sydney. Peter comes to know about the Korean film from our Life B-P Weekly.

Lim Hai Seng, a graduate of FEBC, is doing a multi-job. He drives a minibus to fetch people like us from the Airport. He has a practical ministry with migrants coming in needing help. He edits the Bethel Weekly. He preaches once a month. He does visitation. This morning he has come to take us to the supermarket and stores to attend to our daily needs. God has prepared him for such a time as this.

Since coming here we have been in touch with Perth, Adelaide and Cootamundra by phone, and with my brother in Singapore. The latest is we'll be in Adelaide the third week of May to speak at their Lord's Day Service. There is also a request by Perth to ordain The Lord willing, my Mark Heath in the local context, before the whole congregation. brother Dr Tow will have to fly down to Perth to rendezvous with me July 16. The Lord's will be done. Ordination of a pastor is a very important part of the life of a Church. The people here are very conscious of our needs in the on-coming winter. So we have been heaped up with all kinds of warm clothing. This is how God takes care of His children. Some even bring us food. We reciprocate by entertaining some who are lonely and Meantime I've re-read the finished part of my biography. come here for fellowship. I hope to complete this work that was first started in Perth 2½ years ago. Pray for us as we pray for you. Shalom. Yours faithfully, T.T.

1. WORSHIP

PURPOSES OF THE LOCAL CHURCH

The first purpose of a local church is to facilitate corporate worship. The whole of the Word of God from Genesis to Revelation places emphasis on sharing in worship. There is something very significant about corporate worship, for it will continue to be the great theme of eternity. We read that all the angels of God worship God together, making a great chorus of

praise. The glory of praise is to be found in but also in the its depth and sincerity, but also in the number of people joining in it. Therefore one of the main functions of the local church is to provide an orderly, harmonious, congregational means of worshipping Almighty God.

Corporate worship is, incidentally, a very powerful witness. And if worship is to impress the world such a witness cannot normally spring from the worship of an individual believer, because individual worship is a very private and intimate activity. Praying and almsgiving in public by individuals was actually condemned by the Lord because of the problem of human pride. But the worship of a company of believers is an essentially humble activity. The fact that a company of people are seen heart and soul committed to the Lord, adoring and revering Him as though they felt and sensed His presence and benefitted from His power and glory - all this is a powerful witness.

We can see that certain duties as church members flow from this. To worship God worthily we must be early settled and spiritually prepared for the worship services. We should have resolved our problems, confessed our sin before the Lord, and prepared our hearts for praise.

The next purpose of a local church is to teach the Word and to evangelise, to represent God in the world. We see the church at Jerusalem engaging in the study of the Word and in vigorous

And they, continuing daily with one accord in the temple . . . (Acts 2.46).

personal witness and preaching.

What were they doing in the temple? They certainly were not worshipping there, for the passage goes on to say that they engaged in 'break-ing of bread' in their houses. They were in the temple to speak to people, to witness (particularly at the time around Pentecost when all the pilgrims were crowded into the city)

To teach the Word and evangelise requires a local church organisation. Some people (and they would seem to be a minority) have particular capa-bilitics for teaching and preaching. Others have other capabilities.

The New Testament requires us to train (2 Timothy 2.2) and support preachers of the Word for evangelism and the efficient instruction of believers. This command could not, of course, be carried out without the existence of churches.

Each purpose of the local church represents activities which cannot be efficiently carried out without the church. It is very obvious that corporate worship cannot be carried out without a gathering of people. Simi-larly there could be no colonies of heaven on earth, no manifestation of spiritual family character, without such a gathering. And we could never effectively support numerous teachers and preachers without churches.

The carrying out of the great commission and duties of church great

members will include supporting all the meetings that are convened to teach the Word and to evangelise.

3. SPIRITUAL GIFTS

Another purpose of a local church is to pool the resources of Christian people for Christ's service, to potentiate the abilities of church members and to rightly organise their efforts. This includes the training up of a succeeding generation of the Lord's people. Now these things cannot be done effectively without a local church. Christian people cannot pool their resources unless there is some binding unit - a local church. Nor can they have their abilities trained and refined and potentiated without mutual help.

Our individual capacities, natural and spiritual, can only be brought to maximum usefulness if we are working together. The task of the local church is to pool all our resources and all our. different gifts to make one, cohesive, complete, large effort for the Lord.

The stewardship of our means is also included in this function of the local church. We have there a duty to pool our resources and to support the full-time ministry. The main passage of Scripture commanding this is 1 Corinthians 9 (particularly verses 6-14).

But we must strive to honour this last purpose of a local church - the pooling of our resources, the poten-tiating of our abilities, so that all our members become a real local army for the Lord.

AUSTRALETTER II Melbourne, May 18, '89

My dear Readers,

Peter says, "As newborn babes, desire the sincere milk of the Word, that ye may grow thereby: If so be ye have tasted that the Lord is gracious" (I Pet. 2:2,3). The young leaders of Bethel BPC in Melbourne have tasted the graciousness of the Lord. So they desire the sincere milk of the Word. Therefore, they've requested me to hold 3 Bible classes apart from the Lord's Day sermon. During Thursday night prayer meeting I'm teaching the Gospel of John (textbook: Gospel of Life). Friday night we have X Commandments, etc. (I give them charts from "The Law of Moses" and of Jesus"). Sunday after worship: The Book of Revelation (6 lessons to take a panoramic view of the whole book). The YF has got me to speak on ISRAEL in the Light of His Second Coming. Every month they have a cottage meeting. The coming one is a House Blessing. As for Mrs Tow she has elected to take the Children's Sunday School and other children's meetings at the Parsonage.

The Parsonage is located at 58 Shepherd Road. The surrounding rolling grassland with a park at the end of the road gives evidence this was a sheep ranch. Now it is being encroached by man as more and more houses are built. The distant mountain range and the autumnal skies remind one of Cameron Highlands. As if we had brought the sunshine from Singapore, the past two weeks were clear and bright. The Lord has thus given us a probation period before colder weather sets in. To brace us up for winter, kind hands have piled into the parsonage every kind of woollen wear.

As the Lord has blessed Perth with an instant Church, so has He the Bethel congregation in Melbourne. Mr Hai Seng our Church worker took us to see the AOG church at Oakleigh. Oakleigh is served by several bus-lines and has a railway station nearby. It is like Shalom Church situated at Pasir Ris. It is a stone's throw away from Monash University. It can become a university Church! A 500-seat Auditorium with 3 outhouses on 26,000 sq.ft. of land at A\$750,000 is sold to us for a song. Since purchase of Oakleigh was effected with a 10% deposit October 8, 1988, the price of landed property in Melbourne has increased by leaps and bounds. The loan we've given to Melbourne via Calvary is earning good dividends everyday. Yea, even 15.5% interest, out of which the Committee has apportioned A\$2,000 in thanksgiving towards Rev Paauwe's Van Fund. (The Church holds 3rd Anniversary Thanksgiving May 28). A young Church is beginning to bear fruit, to lend support to Mission! "Give, and it shall be given unto you" (Luke 6:38).

By His appointment I had the honour of publicising and showing the BLIND KOREAN PASTOR Film Sunday May 14 after Church service. The worship attendance was 100, and special collection for the BLIND KOREAN PASTOR'S BOOK, A\$300. The film has blessed them so much that several have requested videos from Calvary BPC. Having completed 5 showings downunder, the Film is despatched with this Australetter II by hand of Elder and Mrs Khoo leaving here May 18, 89.

One night last week Mr Eric Choong got me to accompany him to visit a nurse having terminal sickness. We invited her to Worship May 14 and to the Film following. During Worship Service we sang as a prelude to the film "O Come Back to the Lord," the song of the Father calling the Prodigal Son home. This so touched her heart that she was overwhelmed with tears. "Prodigal Son" to the tune of Barley Fields sung by Christopher Tan in-between reels, like Roska did, spoke to many a young person from Monash University. One young man from one of our BPCs in Singapore.studying here confided in me: "The subjects we are studying will be of no use as we look for the Lord's Return." Apparently the Lord is beginning to induce him to the fulltime ministry. I told him there was no great sacrifice we could make following Him. When the Lord calls, will he respond? Will you?

Well, Charles Seet did. He had already had 3 years of Medicine at NUS. When the Lord spoke to him in an accident from which he was narrowly saved, he left the University to study at FEBC. He promised the Lord he would become a missionary. Answering Charles in no time, the Lord has sent him to Adelaide to help the Paauwes in their very tight programme. Charles will not only preach but teach, including Greek, at the Fundamental Bible College of Australia. Incidentally, we are preaching Sun. May 21 in Adelaide and speaking at special meetings during two week days before returning to Melbourne Wed. May 24. Pray for us that wherever we are called, we will glorify His Name.

The Lord has also given me a ready pen this time to complete my biography. I told you before how I had written 250 pages in Perth. I needed 50 more to go. Now I have exceeded the 50 and I want to praise His Name for enabling me to finish it.

Our Ministry at Bethel B-P Church, Melbourne

My wife and I left Melbourne on 18th May 1989 after ministering to the Bethel B-P Church for three months. We were supposed to return home by about 8.00 pm on that day, but our flight was delayed for seven hours due to mechanical problems. We praise and thank God that the problems did not develop during our flight. So we took it as Divine Delay, for God's timing is always perfect! We also praise and thank the Lord for Bro Hai Seng who fetched us, together with Rev & Mrs Tow, to the airport. We thank the Lord for them and for some of our close friends in Melbourne who saw us off.

We count it a privilege to have had a part in ministering the Word of God to the congregation there. I preached a total of seven messages: Five at Bethel, and one each at Hope B-P Church and Pure Korean Presbyterian Church in Adelaide. I also spoke at Youth Fellowship meetings, both in Melbourne and Adelaide. During Thursday night Prayer Meetings we studied the book of Esther (eight lessons). The Family Bible Camp was held at the foot of Mount Evelyn, March 24 - 27. It was a Recreation Camp nestled in unspoilt surroundings. There were 86 campers--almost the whole Church was there. The camp theme was, "Exceeding Great and Precious Promises." Dr Tow Siang Hwa was the camp speaker. He spoke about the Christian hope in the time of trial and about "perilous times" confronting the Church and how to prepare in meeting them. They were very timely studies from the General Epistles of Peter. At the camp, two Monash University students, Irene Lim and Tan Swee Kheam, and a high school student, Richard Lee, were baptised. Four were confirmed in the Faith: Karen and Karin Koh, and Joyce and Grace Chong, all high school students.

My one great request to you, dear Readers, is that you earnestly pray for the continual supply of preachers to man the pulpit at Bethel B-P Church. Pray in particular for a permanent resident preacher, because the sending of pastors/elders can only meet the spiritual needs of the flock there up to a point. There is a great thirst and hunger for the Word of God, and the people need to be fed in order to grow in grace and in knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. But how are they going to be spiritually nurtured without preachers? "And how shall they preach, except they be sent? as it is written, How beautiful are the feet of them that preach the gospel of peace, and bring glad tidings of good things!" (Romans 10:15).

"The harvest truly is plenteous, but the labourers are few. Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that He will send forth labourers into His harvest" (Matthew 9: 37-38). Amen.

Revival is Brotherly Love

In Psalm 133 King David extols the reviving power of brotherly love as expressed in communal harmony. It is like the fragrance of "precious contment" that is used for the ancinting of the high priest - how pleasant to the nose and exhilarating to the spirits! It is like the dew borne by the mountain breezes of Hermon upon the parched hills of Jerusalem after a hot summer night - how the withering grass browned by the afternoon

But when it is dissipated by self-reliance and turning away from God (Deut. 32:15), that conquering power is gone. When brothers unite, one can chase a thousand, and two put ten thousand to flight (Deut. 32:30). By geometrical progression, three can

rout a hundred thousand!

We were your messengers to Hope BPC, Adelaide

When we visited Hope BPC in Adelaide last week, we were entrusted with a \$2,000 cheque for their Van Fund. (As Adelaide is very limited in public transport, a minibus is evidently the crying need of a growing Church.) How your gift, like the mountain breeze of Hermon, brought joy and gratitude to the brethren

there. And how, as they sparkle under the dew of your concern for their welfare, they bless you in their prayers. "For the administration of this service not only supplieth the want of the saints, but is abundant also by many thanksgivings unto God" (II Cor. 9:12). How wonderful to see brotherly love in action between two B-P Churches in Australia. And inasmuch as they have need of us, we have need of them, too.

Meanwhile, some from Adelaide are visiting Melbourne. Dr Michael Lee, a dental surgeon, said he would worship with us beginning of July when he comes here to see his mother. Let us promote this fellowship between Melbourne and Adelaide.

From Brotherly Love to Filial Piety

Before I end this Pastoral Chat, let us not forget filial piety which is the vertical relationship with our parents inasmuch as the fraternal is the horizontal. The vertical that reminds of the honour we owe our parents should lead us on to God our Heavenly Father. Moreover, today is our Church's 3rd Anniversary Thanksgiving!

"It is of the Lord's mercies that we are not consumed, because His compassions fail not. They are new every morning: great is Thy faithfulness" (Lam. 3:22,23).

Worship, says St. Augustine, is the mother of all virtues. This is the highest filial piety. How do we thank Him in our special worship today?

Adelaide, May 23, '89

My dear Readers,

From Melbourne to Adelaide

In response to Adelaide, we took a De Luxe Coach Sat. May 20, 11.20 am, arriving the same evening 9.40 pm after a 10-hour ride. The distance between Melbourne and Adelaide is about the distance between Singapore and Penang. Bro. Loke Tat Luen kindly sent us to the bus station.

As the Church paid for our fare, A\$180 round-trip for two, we became Bethel's missionaries! The Committee also entrusted us with an A\$2,000 cheque for Adelaide's Van Fund. We were like the Apostle Paul carrying a gift from Corinth in the course of his travels. Now, Bethel is only 3 years old. Yet, she has begun to give to a sister Church, and practise our Lord's teaching, "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35). This giving in the Cause of Missions is a sweet-savour sacrifice well-pleasing to God.

Sowing in Tears, Reaping in Joy (Ps. 126:5)

When we visited Hope BPC December 1986, they were less than 20 worshipping at an old Scouts' Den. This visit, after 2½ years, sees the congregation more than doubled. There were 47. Moreover, they have been promoted from the Scouts' to a brand new red-brick building called Kensington Centre, a stone's throw from 8 Sanford Street, Kensington Gardens, S.A. 5068, where the Paauwes reside. This school for the handicapped has a gymnasium that can easily accommodate 200, and a brand-new kitchen and dining hall. The gym with a high ceiling adds to the grandeur of the auditorium. The kitchen serves Sunday lunch, as at Life Church. The problem of cooking is solved by each family bringing a dish. Rise is cooked on the spot. Sunday Lunch, whether in Singapore or Adelaide, promotes fellowship. What the Church sorely needs is a minibus, for in this "ancient" city, bus lines are limited to a few main streets. Praise the Lord, the Van Fund has now shot up to A\$7,100. This is about the ½-way mark.

Sunday Night Prayer Meeting from House to House

As Sunday night is most conducive to another Church meeting, the members here gather for Prayer and Bible study, rotating from house to house. I had the privilege of not only speaking at the Morning Worship but also at the Prayer Meeting held at Mrs K. S. Tan's. Among those who came were migrants from Malaysia, Sarawak, Beijing (China), Hong Kong, the Philippines, Sri Lanka and S'pore. Hope is beginning to gather the faithful from these countries, as well as the lost sheep, some having come to a saving knowledge of late and are on fire for God.

In order to further promote the spiritual life of the congregation, Dr Michael Lee their camp master is organising a Family Bible Camp to be held at the YMCA Campsite by the sea next Easter.

Korean Presbyterian Church

There was a saying, "Whichever country or city you go to, there is a Chinese restaurant." Corresponding to this, we can safely say today, "Wherever you go in the world (where are Koreans), you'll see a Korean Church." The Korean Presbyterian Church in Adelaide, consisting of about 40 members, has bought over a 100-year old Anglican Church (A\$85,000) with seating for 100. Its pastor is Mr Moon, a senior student at the Fundamental Bible College of Australia. Herein we see the effectualness of a Bible College!

The Korean Church, hearing of my coming, planned a special meeting for Monday night, May 22. (They were blessed recently by joining with Hope BPC in the promotion of the Blind Korean Pastor Film.) As a number of white Australians were invited, we had 65 at the special service. I spoke on the <u>Full-Four Commission</u> (Great Commission), which I declared to be the neglected <u>First Commandment to the Church</u>. It is the most important Commandment to the Church, but the least obeyed. For, as a rule, every Church is a sitting Church. Not a going-out Church. That the BPC in S'pore has come Downunder is by the special grace of God.

Calling Young Singaporeans

It is high tide for the gathering of souls in Australia today. As Southeast Asian Christians migrate here, they look for a Church. But what Church? There are the dying Churches, so they become Uniting Churches, not for any other reason than that they are on a survival programme. Their Churches are not only dwindling in numbers but drying up in the faith. The Charismatics cash in with their lively singing and working of signs and wonders. We of the Reformed Faith stress on the preaching of the Word. If we can offer them the Word of Life they will readily come.

In Perth, the attendance has reached 250. In Melbourne, 100. In Adelaide, 50. Now we hear cries coming from Sydney, Brisbane and Darwin.

FEBC graduates serving in Australia are Mark Heath and Grace (Perth), Brutus Balan (Wyndham), Peter Clements and Anne (Cootamundra), Lim Hai Seng (Melbourne), Charles Seet (Adelaide). Charles Seet, though on a two-month term, is readily acceptable. They would want him to come back.

So, here is a call and a challenge to FEBC students: Prepare yourselves well, so as to be able to shepherd a Church in this western-culture great Southland. Because we don't have enough fulltime workers, we have to seek help from Elders.

Ministry in Perth

We are scheduled to leave Melbourne Sunday July 9, immediately after worship, for Perth. We love the congregation in Perth, having given a total of 6 months during the last 3½ years. In response to Perth's request, we shall ordain Mark Heath on the spot. There will also be the Dedication of the new wings to the church. We would want especially to visit with Eng Lam and Shirleen, our loyal representatives. Meanwhile, we are praying that God will work out His Salvation Plan for His Church, not only in Australia but in all our constituencies in Asia. Yours faithfully, T.T.



Now the Lord had given us a perfect Thanksgiving Day, for there was a BBQ following Service on the school grounds, and the temperature was 20°C under the last rays of Autumn Sun. The Monday following, rain and fog set in, and with it, Winter! Here we go:-

A God Pleasing Tradition

Next Lord's Day, May 28, 1989, we shall celebrate our 3rd Anniversary Thanksgiving. How did we make every Anniversary a Thanksgiving Day? This tradition comes from Life B-P Church, Singapore, that held Thanksgiving upon her Anniversary Day from the very beginning (1951).

How did Life Church get the idea of Thanksgiving? We got it from America which proclaims the fourth Thursday of November Thanksgiving Day for the whole nation. Thanksgiving for what? For the preservation of the Pilgrim Fathers who sailed in the Mayflower 1620 to found at Plymouth, God in liberty. God pre-



from death by severe cold of a new land and from attacks of hostile Red Indians. Such a Thanksgiving Festival in remembrance of God's Saving Grace is surely pleasing to the Lord.

Now, the Bible-Presbyterian Church was founded without support from mission or church in a hostile environment. We were opposed by enemies from the Ecumenical Movement organised as World Council of Churches. Today, the battle between Truth and Error, Fundamentalism and Modernism, True Protestantism and Roman Catholicism, is waxing fiercer and fiercer. But from the beginning to this day the Lord God Almighty has been our Strength and Preserver. The Lord has supplied

our every need--physical, financial and spiritual. Has He not also seen us through every trial and temptation in this part of Australia? Hasn't He, through our brother Churches in Singapore, helped us to acquire a sanctuary for divine worship? Hasn't He helped each one of cur families to migrate to this Southern Continent of opportunity? Hasn't He opened up a way for our young people to obtain a good tertiary education, and to acquire more skills from other institutions of learning? Hasn't He kept us from danger and death and provided for our livelihood?

But we are a forgetful people. After the ordeal is over we take things for granted. We vowed to Him to do this or that when we were in hot water. We cried to Him for help out of a dire situation. The moment He took us out of trouble we said good-bye to Him.

David, in order to remind himself of God's grace upon him, wrote Psalm 103. He says, "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His benefits: Who forgiveth all thine iniquities; who healeth all thy diseases; Who redeemeth Thy life from destruction; who crowneth thee with lovingkindness and tender mercies; who satisfieth thy mouth with good things; so that thy youth is renewed like the eagle's ... * (Psalm 103:2-5).

In thanksgiving, the first thing is to reconsecrate our heart. When we were first saved we were brimful of joy and first love to our Saviour. As time goes on we begin to cool. When we love Him, we give to His Cause. Giving is loving. Giving our first fruits, our best, and not our left-overs. As we customarily bring a love offering to Him on Thanksgiving Day, let us this year bring one well prepared, not forgetting our tithe. Why not seal it in an envelope, anonymous, but write on it some special reason for thanksgiving, e.g., for passing an exam, for selling something which brings a profit, for deliverance from sickness or a grave accident, etc., etc. In our thank-offerings at Life Church, two weeks before we came to Melbourne, a lady gave an envelope with these words, "Thanksgiving: Read I Chron. 16." The cheque contained five figures.

Thanksgiving is a tradition from Life B-P Church Singapore. It is a tradition wellpleasing unto God. Let us make it a memorable one this year. Why not read I Chron. 16:7-36, a hidden psalm, yet so timely, on our 3rd Anniversary Thanksgiving? Amen. - Rev Timothy Tow

We are here because we love the Cause of Christ, we love our Saviour, we love our brethren at home and abroad. And because we love the little ones in Perth, several of whom have telephoned us spontaneously, we must go and encourage their hearts. And we think of Burma, Medan, Batam, Pontianak, Tg. Pinang, India, and 12 stations in Malaysia, not forgetting the Philippines. "Because that for His Name's sake they went forth, taking nothing of the Gentiles. We therefore ought to receive such, that we might be fellowhelpers to the Truth" (III John 7,8). June 8, 1989

In Melbourne we receive full coverage of the carnage of 10,000 students at Tiananmen. The Chinese nation is on the brink of civil war. Qantas has flown a special 747 to evacuate Australian nationals. Thousands of Chinese students in Sydney and Melbourne who protest the Killing Gates of Li Peng are being granted refugee status.

Reacting to this bloody suppression, I write in the Bethel Weekly as follows:

"Political power comes out of the barrel of a gun," said Chairman Mao. So, in Mao's name, as it were, the present Chinese Government has used her armoured cars and tanks to shoot her sons and daughters. Red, red, is Tiananmen Square soaking in blood. There is nothing new about Mao's thoughts or Communist philosophy. It is rank brutality that bursts from man's sinful heart. Whether it be Communism or Nazism, it is the same bloody killing--"Might is Right."

"Might is Right," however, cannot last forever. The editorial of "The Australian," dated June 5, 1989, under caption, "Death Throes of a Doomed Dictatorship," concludes, "Chinese leadership has sickened the world. It may have won at terrible cost, a shortterm victory." Jesus says, "All they that take the sword shall perish with the sword" (Matt. 26:52).

My friend Rev Jason Linn of "Pioneering in Dyak Borneo" fame, has ruefully remarked, "Till Jesus comes, the world is a whirlpool of a total mess." As the world staggers on like a drunken man, and in Isaiah's words, "Prom the sole of the foot even unto the head there is no soundness in it" (Isa. 1:6), she has no hope until Jesus,"the Sun of Righteousness arise with healing in His wings" (Mal. 4:2). When He comes it will be His turn to rule this world a thousand golden years wherein RIGHT is Might. Even so, come Lord Jesus. Amen. - T.T.

BIBLE KNOWLEDGE TAUGHT IN SCHOOLS

Kingdom of Iron and Clay

Nebuchadnezzar's dream of a great statue which was composed of a gold head, silver chest and arms, belly and thighs of brass,

legs of iron, and feet part-iron, part-clay, is a graphic presentation of the deterioration of Man's Kingdom until its final destruction. As Gold's specific gravity is 19 and Silver, 11; Brass, 8.5; and Iron, 7.8; we see in the first four kingdoms a descending order of weight (Hebrew <u>Glory</u>) corresponding with an increasing order of hardness. Now, as the golden glory of Babylon fades into the silver of Persia, and from the silver of Persia into the Brass of Greece, it finally ends up in the Iron of Rome. Totalitarianism, whether it be Roman Imperialism or Greek Militarism, can rule but for a season. Much less Totalitarianism of the End Times, since the spirit of the masses, called Democracy (the clay of the seed of man) can never cohere with the Iron Rule.

The iron armour of Communism that churned the people's flesh into pulp at Tienanmen, as denounced by the Australian prime minister Bob Hawk before 5,000 weeping at a Memorial Ser- vice, should awaken us not only to the brutality of atheistic Communism, but also to the nearness of God's Kingdom. Praise the Lord, Daniel concludes



with this observation of the fate of that Statue: "And in the days of these kings shall the God of Heaven set up a Kingdom, which shall never be destroyed: and the Kingdom shall not be left to other people, but it shall break in pieces and consume all these kingdoms, and it shall stand for ever. Forasmuch as thou sawest that the STONE was cut out of the mountain without hands, and that it brake in pieces the iron, the brass, the clay, the silver and the gold; the great God hath made known

to the king what shall come hereafter: and the dream is certain, and the interpretation thereof sure" (Dan. 2:44,45). The STONE can be none other than THE LORD JESUS CHRIST (Ps. 118:22).

The butchery at Tienanmen, while being fumingly resented by the Chinese masses including the millions in Hong Kong, has dismayed those nations that are carrying on a lucrative trade with China. No more will there be the hordes of tourists, businessmen and opportunities. Christians worshipping in house churches will once again be taken in (remember Wang Ming Tao's 23 years).

We who live in Singapore governed with justice and equity should never cease to pray for our leaders. In thankfulness to the Almighty who protects our people and prospers His Church, let us rededicate ourselves to serve Him anew. Young man, young woman, as the days are drawing to a close and the Son of God will descend from the blue, have you considered offering your life to HIM? Seeing that the end-time totalitarian powers will be swept away like "the chaff of the summer threshing floors" (Dan. 2:35), it is only "reasonable service" that we present our bodies a living sacrifice to Him (Rom. 12:1). "And seekest thou great things for thyself? Seek them not: for, behold, I will bring evil upon all flesh, saith the Lord: but thy life will I give unto thee for a prey in all places whither thou goest" (Jer. 45:5).

As a young man, I had turned my eyes to the glitter of this world, until the Lord broke down my stubbornness in April 1946. Since then I've been following Him daily on Calvary Road, the Narrow Way. We're here under orders from Above, and when our tour of duty ends July 16, we will be back in good old Singapore to prepare for FEBC's reopening. Many have asked why I have not made a China trip? Reason: the Lord has kept me busy in S.E. Asia and Australia. I had no occasion to visit the land of my birth. Should the Lord send me; I'll go. Jesus says, "Because I seek not mine own will, but the will of the Father which sent me" (Jn. 5:30). As of the present, we have received an earnest invitation from Peter Clements and his wife Anne Gradussov to speak at their Church (Scots Presbyterian), Cootamundra, June 17-21. It is a small railway town en route to Sydney.

Blind Korean Pastor Film

Coinciding with our coming, Peter Clements will have the Blind Korean Pastor Film, which he obtained from the Korean Embassy in Sydney, shown the second time in a Baptist Church. Now we have received a timely request from the Boxhill Chinese Evangelical Church for the Blind Korean Pastor Film to be shown in their Church, Sun. June 25, 7.00 pm. Our going to Cootamundra will facilitate bringing the reels down to Melbourne. This will be the 8th showing in Australia, which adds up to 31 since we had it last September in Singapore. Let me remind you once again of the three shows to come with the Blind Korean Pastor appearing live, July 29, 30, 31 at Life, Calvary Pandan and New Life respectively. There will also be the launching of the Blind Korean Pastor's Autobiography in English. The Autobiography in Korean has gone through 54 printings, an all-time Korean record. The English version, translated by a Korean woman and polished by a Canadian, is published in Singapore through CLBC (Dn Paul Wong). It is a wonderful Gospel-story that has won many Readers in Korea to Christ. Pray that the English version will reap similar results. "And this gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come" (Matt. 24:14). The Blind Korean Pastor Film is our effort in end-time mass evangelism.

A "Conducted . Tour" of the Oakleigh Property

From Melbourne to Cootamundra Since we have come so far downunder, and Cootamundra is only 6 hours by train from Melbourne, it behoved us to answer Rev Peter Clements' standing invitation to visit his Church. Peter is one of FEBC's honours students. As he did well in school, so he is doing well in Church. He is mightily blessed with a life partner in Anne Gradussov, another of FEBC's outstanding students. They have a baby daughter, Joy, 13 months old. Another is due in August--double joy!

The Lord has given them possession of a 30-year old house of solid structure. The interior of the house which was occupied by a syndicate of godless people had the walls and ceilings painted in dark green and purple, Not a home, but a "cage of every unclean and hateful bird" (Rev. 18:2). After Peter took over this old house, however, he has dispersed all those dark shades with pure white, and bright yellow for the dining and and light blue for the kitchen. (There is a testimony in the colours we paint our house and of the clothes we wear.) Well, our visit has hastened them to the job. But, let us all be prepared to meet Jesus at His Coming, "that when He cometh and knocketh, they may open unto Him immediately" (Luke 12:36).

Peter has made our stay as comfortable as possible. What gave us most comfort was his old-fashioned fire-place which keeps the house warm by burning chunks of wood sawn from some retired old telephone poles. He practises the economy he has learnt from FEBC. Scots Presbyterian Church

Cootamundra is an old railway town of about 8,000 souls. In this quiet community the home fires of the Old Faith were once burning bright. This you can deduce from the solid brick churches built in days gone by. The people here can identify themselves as Anglicans, RC's, Baptists, Presbyterians. But they cannot understand the language of the redeemed.

Peter is an ordained minister of the Scots Presbyterian Church. If William Burns is our spiritual ancestor, then we have a lineage with them. Now, this Scots Presbyterian Church is a member of the Presbyterian Church of Australia.

Though Peter is in a denomination in the Ecumenical Movement, he is a constant fighter for the faith, not only in his "home-town" Cootamundra, but also at the General Assembly. Since his coming to Cootamundra, he has gathered the faithful together against the unconverted leadership, many of whom are no more with him. At the Lord's Day worship, there were about 55 old and young. The same night I was invited to preach at a Baptist Church. A sort of Sunset Gospel Hour for the whole community, there were about 80 present. I spoke on "Reformation is a Perennial Process" from the 3 Reformations in O.T. History --under Joash (Jehoiada), Hezekiah and Josiah. An RC priest who has been preaching Ecumenism of late came purposely to hear me. Perhaps it was for him that I was led of the Lord to speak on a controversial subject.

At an Aboriginal Bible School

What gave us an insight into the Aboriginal Community was an invitation to teach two hours, one on the Law of God and the other on Church History, to 7 Aboriginals at the Bimbadeen Training College, established by the Aboriginal Evangelical Fellowship. Only two of the students were "pure," the rest were of mixed blood. Interestingly, the Acting Principal is a Fijian. I sighed as I looked at a dying race, not only physically, but spiritually.

I'm told that the whole Presbyterian Church of Australia has only two ministerial students for this year.

I am more convinved than ever of the vital role of FEBC. Ebenezer! "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us" (I Sam. 7:12). So will He help us in the new academic year. Praise the Lord, Dr Arthur Steele sends to me here the whole syllabus of his teaching materials on Contemporary Theology II. Then there is the Prophecy of Daniel. Pray for FEBC, for Dr & Mrs Steele's safe arrival July 28. Pray for a goodly number of in-coming students from both near and far. For the Graduation, August 20, 1989! Yours faithfully, T.T.

Chinese Christian Students in Nanjing

As the Church is universal; we are interested in what is happening in China. - On the following page is a cutting from The Australian Baptist, dated June 14, 1989 (Vol. 77, No. 12), headlined "Chinese Christian Students March in Demonstration."

CHINESE Christian students have joined in the demonstrations for democracy sweeping China, according to a report from Nanjing.

Students from Nanjing Theological Seminary, the main national Protestant school, marched on May 19 with other students in the city, carrying banners emblazoned with their school's name and Bible verses for freedom.

Christians, including a man carrying a 4 foot cross, also have appeared in demonstrations in Beijing's Tian An Men Square.

In another development, the Amity Foundation, Chinese Protestants' social service organisation, has sent a statement to government and communist leaders urging them to under-stand the students' position and to enter into dialogue.

No statement has yet emerged from the China Christian Council. Two leaders of the council, including the council president, Bishop Ding Guang-xun, were travelling overseas. Reports from Shanghai, site of the largest demonstrations the largest demonstrations outside Beijing, indicated Christian students there had no

organised participation. participation. In Nanjing, the Christian students' march was witnessed by Britt Towery of Co-operative Services International the Services International, the Southern Baptist organisation that assists in education and various projects in China and other nations where missionaries do not work do not work.

Spontaneous

"Students from the seminary did march with their own banners that had the name of the school on them and Christian Scripture verses," said Towery, a veteran of work in China. "The Christians are involved, We can say that without question. The Buddhists are also marching, so the religious element (is represented). Actually it's 99 percent of the people behind this thing. Everybody's for this. I never saw such a groundswell. The Christians feel if they don't get involved in this, they won't ever relate to China. This is the people. I never saw anything so spontaneous in my life." Towery arrived in Nanjing on

May 18 from Beijing, where he visited Tian An Men Square and talked with demonstrators there.

"In Beijing the Christians are more conservative," he said. "The seminary there said they're not involved officially, but the students have been out to watch it. But everybody's sympathetic. It's like a festival."

It's like a testival." In Shanghai, Co-operative Services International Director Lewis Myers also reported a cautious attitude among Christians. One pastor expressed concern that the students might push too far too quickly. There's no direct involvement by Christians here to take a stand in support or in criticism of them the students)."

Right and just

"It seems in talking with Chinese Christians as well as university presidents and professors that there's a great deal of general sympathy for the cause of the students," Myers said. "I don't believe I've talked with anybody who said that the cause for which the students are marching is wrong. Almost everybody agrees that the cause is right and just, that there is a legitimate complaint that they

have. "At the same time, there is a great deal of anxiety on the part of university officials that the students might be pushing too hard and either cause a pretty severe crackdown on them and thus on the whole system, or the thus on the whole system, or the whole thing might get out of hand and just cause anarchy." "Myers said students were "blanketing the city" and had brought it to a peaceful standstill. Myers and Towery both reported that all Southern Baptists teaching in Chinese universities under SCI sponsor-shin were safe and well although

ship were safe and well, although classes in most cities have been cancelled.



HOW MANY CHRISTIANS ARE THERE IN ISRAEL?

The Christian population of Israel and the administered areas numbers about 130,000, the vast majority of whom are Palestinian Christians. A double minority-Arabs in a

predominently Jewish state; Christians in an overwhelmingly Muslim Middle East--they are an indigenous population, and despite differences of current denominational affliation, most of them are probably descended from the early Christian communities of the Byzantine period. Trustees of a heritage which links them with the very roots of Christianity in the Land, and a history completely different from that of the churches in the West, these Arab Christian communities represent an aspect of the Christian experience with a unique value in the context of mutual understanding between peoples of good will of all faiths.

WESTMINSTER CONFESSION OF FAITH by Elder Koa Keng Woo

The Westminster Confession of Faith was formulated by the Westminster divines in the Assembly summoned by the English Parliament in 1643 and completed in 1646. It is the last of the classic Reformed confessions and by far the most faithful. The Confession is well known for its thoroughness, precision, conciseness and balance. Creeds and confessions

are necessary for the dissemination and preservation of the Christian truth of the Church, to prevent apostasy, to assist God's labourers to work together in fellowship and harmony, and to instruct God's people.

The Confession begins by teaching that the Bible is God's finished revelation and is entirely sufficient for all of man's spiritual needs. It also teaches that the Bible, being God's Word, is infallible and inspired by God originally written in the Hebrew and Greek languages. The doctrine of Predestination teaches that God's will is the ultimate cause of all things, including human salvation. Connected with Predestination is the doctrine of reprobation and human freedom.

The doctrine of God's Sovereignty and man's responsibility also includes the effectual calling of God, of saving faith, repentance, justification and adoption, resulting in

man being sanctified and doing good works. The doctrine on the Perseverence of the Saints teaches that the believers will not and cannot fall from grade, and that they will persevere. Believers will have the assurance of grace and salvation.

On the teaching of religious worship and the Sabbath day, God is revealed through nature and men are obligated to worship Him. God cannot be worshipped according to the imaginations and devices of men. God alone is the proper object of true worship and He can be worshipped only through the mediation of Christ.

On the Church, the Confession teaches that a true church is identical with the elect, because it professes the true religion, maintains the teaching of the doctrine and sacraments of the Scripture. Sacraments of the Lord's Supper and Baptism are also taught. Civil Government is appointed by God to maintain law and order. Finally, the state of men after death, the resurrection of the dead and final judgment are taught therein.

The Confession is comprehensive, concise and well-formulated. It should be used as a Pastor's manual, always ready to instruct, remind and keep believers from apostasy. Melbourne Breakthrough

Melbourne, July 8,'89

A composition of sacred music by Richard Lee, a high school lad here, had inspired me to write a psalm based on Psalm 103. Out of this has come another titled, "The Austral Migrants Psalm," as follows:

July 5, 6.00 am before daybreak. Hai Seng and I got into the Arrival Hall 10 minutes or so behind time, but whisked him to Shepherd Road without further delay. The drive from the Airport took one hour, which gave our brother an impression of Melbourne's wideness. (Melbourne is host to the 1996 Olympics.)

We learnt from Ngiap Koon as well as from <u>The Channel</u>, the YAF periodical, of your prayers for us, and from the mail he brought along. From the postman we've received further good news from India, Korea and Batam. In this southern winter, it would be rather like "hot steaming coffee." We have enjoyed The Channel, fellowshipping with YAFers through their testimonies and articles. Thank you, Linda, also for your letter and lines, and James for your epistles.

Ngiap Koon had a simple breakfast with us consisting of oat porridge with milk, 2 soft-boiled eggs, two pieces of toast with butter and honey, a cup of coffee, and one I enjoy myself--hot soybean drink (product of Kwangsi). This is to show you how easy it is to make a Chinese-Austral breakfast. After a time of fellowship, Hai Seng took him to Victoria Hotel at Collins Street where he'll stay 3 nights. Checking out Saturday, he'll be lodged with Hai Seng for two nights before going on to San Francisco. What Ngiap Koon is most interested in is the Worship at Clayton, Sunday morning. I'm glad he has consented to give a word of testimony.

As Bethel BPC becomes more wellknown, more migrants and overseas students are coming in. A young student hailing from KL phoned in this morning. We arrange to fetch him to Church coming Lord's Day.

Tuesday night Khoo Yew Hock came to take us to his house at Wheelers Hill nearby. There we had fellowship with Bro. & Mrs Chua Choo Ser, whose daughter here has a boy, 15 days old. We prayed for the child and for God's peace upon the family. We have known the Chuas since before the War, at Prinsep Street, when we worshipped in Teochew.

To Sam Leong and Ellen Chong: As you have booked your date with Seen Seen, Dec. 9,'89, I shall be at your service. Confirmed.

Growing Up Step by Step

Now that more and more are joining the Church, we are encouraged to see two or three of the older members coming together to discuss the forming of an Adult Fellowship. The objectives are to pray together and study the Bible. From here should be nurtured S.S. teachers, a transportation committee, a hospitality committee, etc. This will prepare the congregation to enter their Church at Oakleigh early next year.

"For His anger endureth but a moment; in His favour is life: weeping may endure for a night, but joy cometh in the morning" (Ps. 30:5). One year and a month after the motor accident, Bro. Eric Choong has found a new life-partner in Sis. Siew Leng of Calvary BPC. They will be joined together in holy matrimony, Saturday, Aug. 5, 89, 2.30 pm. We rejoice with them in the Lord.

Following this came another tune to which are married the verses, "Time and Tide Wait for No Man," brought to you in last week's Australetter Special.

Inasmuch as the Lord has given us the Breakthrough in song, so has He extended the ministry of the BLIND KOREAN PASTOR. Two other groups have asked for the Film, viz., an Aussie school and Grace Church of Christ, whose pastor is Rev Chia Chek Kwang, younger brother of Elder Chia Hong Chek of Galilee BPC. I sincerely believe God is using this film ministry to win many lost souls and backslidders. Meanwhile, Peter Clements has phoned that he is sending a cheque for A\$110, a love-gift to Rev An Yo Han, the Blind Korean Pastor.

"As cold waters to a thirsty soul so is good news from a far country" (Prov. 25:25). And more so when it is brought by Bro. Chan Ngiap Koon who arrived here safely Wednesday, We end our ministry here Lord's Day July 9 with this message: "The Paradox of Happiness and Prosperity." We arrive back July 16, QF7, 2035 hours. 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Serving the Lord in Adelaide

The Hope B-P Church is one of several growing B-P outreaches in Australia under the loving care of Rev and Mrs Edward Paauwe. I have been wonderfully blessed with the privilege of being a part of the Lord's work there for the past two months.

It was exciting to fellowship with the families that make up the church, many of whom immigrated from diverse Asian countries like Malaysia, Sri Lanka, the Philippines and Hong Kong. The attendance at worship services has doubled since last year to about 50, and at the 3rd Anniversary, there was a record attendance of 83. The Kensington Centre where they meet is also a blessing from the Lord, because this school hall is spacious and cosy, with ideal Sunday Lunch facilities.

I had the privilege of bringing God's Word to Hope B-P Church four times at the worship services and twice at prayer meetings, and of chairing the worship service three times. Besides my involvement in Hope Church, I also had the privilege of teaching lessons in the Fundamental Bible College of Australia. Sound, intense teaching of the Word of God is much needed here, in a land of many dying churches which are succumbing to the inroads of Liberalism, Ecumenism and the Charismatic movement. It was particularly thrilling for me to teach Practical Evangelism on Wed. nights, because the students were all Koreans who love the Word of God. Through them I preached one Lord's Day at a branch of their church at Renmark, an agricultural town 3 hours' drive inland.

Recently, the students of the Korean and Hope Churches got together to form a Fundamental Christian Fellowship. They will soon begin to meet every fortnight. There is great potential for this fellowship to develop and promote God's kingdom among the young people in Colleges and Universities in Adelaide.

I am thankful to God that He supplied all my needs during my stay in Adelaide: hostel accommodation in the city area, transport by bus, meals provided by families who took me to their homes for dinner. I was also much blessed by the hospitality of Rev & Mrs Paauwe, from whom I learnt much concerning effective service to the Lord. I am also thankful to all of you who have supported me and encouraged me by your prayers. All glory be to the Lord for every blessing He has given!

Letter from Beit El Baraka, Bethlehem, Israel

Thank you so much for your gift for Beit El Baraka. We appreciate your help in our ministry more than you can imagine. Times here right now are very difficult, and we have little income locally so we especially need the gifts we receive to help continue the ministry. May God bless you for your part in presenting the Gospel.

The political situation has cut drastically into the number of groups that use the Beit El Baraka Bible Conference Centre. The Holy Land Mission and Baraka Church continue to hold camps there. A few other Bethlehem-centred organisations have also had conferences, and a few expatriate individuals working in the country use it for a "getaway." But pilgrims are prevented from coming by a government policy that forbids tourist buses from going into the area. We were so sorry that a recent group from Singapore could not visit us. Also, Arabs from other areas are afraid to be too far away from home. But the ministry is still bearing fruit. In Feb., 7 young men from Baraka Church accepted the Lord during a retreat at Beit El Baraka. Strike, Strike, Strikel

Australia is a land of strikes! The latest one involves teachers. Now, Australetter VIII was posted on June 29 to be in time for Sunday July 9. When Seen Seen phoned Thurs. 6th that the letter was late in coming, I faxed the next day "Emergency Spiritual Rations" to "catch up." Then I learnt there was a postal strike in Melbourne! Romans 8:28. The same Thursday night, I received a third music composition from Richard Lee. This inspired me to write on the Second Coming of Christ:

Perth

We flew "Australian Airline" immediately after service for Perth our semi-final run. This leg of the journey took 3 hrs 15 mins, like one flying from Singapore to Hong Kong. We are housed at Windsor Tower where we had stayed four months, Sept '86 to Jan '87. Coming to Perth has given us great relief from the cold of Melbourne. Moreover it makes us feel good to know we are now on the home-stretch! For, we long to see you!

But we have our obligation to Perth members. Since settling down, there has been a stream of visitors, old and young, to our flat. Or we are invited out to lunch or dinner and to their homes. Thursday night a Chinese Bible Study was held at the Sectors', where the inaugural service was held Feb '86. The Lord has enlarged the Sector Home with an extended room that can hold 50. About 35 came for the service which used both Mandarin and Cantonese. The Sectors, founder members of Perth BPC, were immensely encouraged. The Chinese section is looking forward to a service to be simultaneously held with the English Service, patterned after Life Church. The Extension Upper Hall has seating for 200!

Now, while there are gains in the Lord's Service, there are also losses. The Padbury Branch in North Perth, owing to lack of support, has ceased to function. The attendance at Mt. Pleasant has stabilised at 200. The Building Fund, however, has received a tremendous boost when A\$50,000 came into the Treasury a few weeks ago, with another \$10,000 this week. This gives Perth the hope of returning to Life Church the A\$50,000 we've loaned them at a much earlier date.

Rev Philip Mark Heath

The chief purpose of our coming to Perth was to ordain Mark Heath and install him as pastor of BPCWA. Two other BP ministers who converged in Perth were Dr Tow Siang Hwa and Rev Edward Paauwe. On Saturday July 15, 5.30 pm, members and guests began to arrive for a buffet dinner. Well over 200 came and were fed without difficulty, for the ladies of the Church each brought a plate or pot of viands. By 7.45 pm the Worship Auditorium was filled. As there were 15 minutes to 8.00 pm Dr Tow led in singspiration. The Life Church pastor chaired the Service. Dr Tow brought the message and Rev Paauwe gave the charge. The three pastors laid their hands on the kneeling ordinand which was solemnised by prayer. Mark's wife is Grace Lauw, another FEBC graduate. She was in charge of the Church Choir.

Lord's Day Worship

The Lord's Day July 16 saw an even larger crowd. It was also the first time Rev Heath officiated the Lord's Supper. Dr Tow taught the open S.S. class while I delivered the message titled, "Forces of Destruction and Deliverance in the Church Today," according to John 10:1-16, 26-29. The Forces of Destruction are the thieves and robbers from outside the sheepfold. Inside enemies are hirelings and wolves. Forces of Deliverance are the Porter, Doorkeeper, or Pastor. A faithful pastor is really not easy to find. The porter opens to the Shepherd, the Lord Jesus Christ. Jesus is the Door, but the Pope makes himself the only channel to salvation. A pastor who exalts himself above the Lord lends himself to evil, to disrupt and destroy the Church. Jesus is the good shepherd who lays down His life for the sheep. By His death only are we saved from destruction. Jesus gives us life everlasting, so we shall never perish. "Once saved, always saved" is a good slogan to assure us of eternal security, but not to give license to sinful practices. 

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TROUBLED? COME UNTO THE LORD

(A commentary on the Blind Korean Pastor Film by Sng Jin Seng) Reading the popular and familiar parable of the prodigal son in Luke 15:11-32, one is bound to be touched by its illustration of the love and forgiveness extended to all who would come to the Lord. Now we can read another version of a prodigal son in the English translation of the autobiography of the Blind Korean Pastor An Yohan. Not only that, we will be able to see his life enacted in film and also to hear him in person. So may I encourage you not to miss this once in a lifetime opportunity. What a blessing it will be to share in the experience of God's love and forgiveness!

Very briefly, An Yohan was beset with all kinds of trouble and was trying to run away from God, until in some marvellous and mysterious way, God called him. Realising his own foolishness and wretchedness, he turned to the Lord. Having found salvation, he eventually committed himself to fulltime service even in his blindness.

Trouble comes in all shapes and sizes, at all times of the day or night and at every stage in life. They respect no one, neither the young nor the old. They crop up in all areas, touching our families, our finances, our jobs, our physical health, and our emotional well-being. We may go for long periods without them but at other times they come with such frequency and intensity that we wonder if we'll ever survive. A brief summary of the biblical references to the word "trouble" is:

1. Trouble seems to woven into the fabric of living (Job 14:1).

 Many of our distresses are caused by our own sin and foolishness (Prov. 21:23; Ps. 78:32,33).

3. Some difficulties are created by other people (Ps. 9:13).

4. God allows trouble but is always in control (2 Chron. 29:8).

5. We have a refuge and strong defence in the Lord (Ps. 59:16).

6. He invites us to call upon Him in our distresses (Ps. 50:15).

7. We can expect deliverance in keeping with His will (Ps. 107:6, 143:11).

When we run away from God and bring trouble on ourselves, we can get help. Like An Yohan, we can recognise God's correcting hand and make a new start. Better yet, we can avoid chastening by coming to the Lord before He must correct us, To run from God is never the solution. God does not promise to keep us from trouble but He does promise to be with us in trouble.

In conclusion, make sure you read the Autobiography of the Blind Korean Pastor An Yohan and make a date to watch the film and listen to him in person. And for those who do not know Christ, may you find life with Christ because life with Christ is an endless hope, but without Him it is a hopeless end.

Testimony of Im Seong Ho, FEBC

I had the opportunity to visit the Blind Korean Pastor during my vacations in December 1988. His church is a house-church where about 100 men gather to worship. Most of them are blind. Apart from this he conducts a night school for those poor and uneducated people. This is out of his concern for those who spend their life in the underworld which he had experienced in his earlier life as we see in the Film. Almost 800 students are graduated from this school. Along with this school he runs two hostels for blind boys and girls separately. He ministers to these young people. All this is done out of his heavy burden to save souls of the blind in Korea. Among the blind in Korea, only 5% are Christians, so he believes that God has given him the task to reach out to the rest (95%) of the blind in Korea. He publishes a magazine called "New Light for the Blind." He also supports blind theological students that they may follow his path in serving the Lord.

Finally I would like to say what I learned from the conversation I had with him. He was anxious to know how others thought of his ministry. When I told him of the wide reception his film has in Singapore, he was overwhelmed with joy and praised the Lord. I believe God will bless us as he appears before us in person. Let us pray for him. Testimony of Choy Mei Leng, FEBC

I was blessed by the testimony of the blind Korean Pastor An on the two occasions that I watched the Film. It reminded me of the grace and mercy of God and the need for His children to walk in obedience and faith.

I could remember how I once measured success in my career by my overseas training and paper qualifications. I had my life all mapped out for myself. Pastor An was reduced to nothing when he was made to realise that there is a God who loves him. I was made to realise that without God, I could do nothing, before I consecrated my life to Him. Life is without purpose if God is not the Lord of our lives. Is He the God and the Lord of your life? If not, come back to Him. Jesus has promised, "Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28). Pastor An stepped out of his house not knowing where he was to go and what he was to do. All he knew was that God told him, "There shall not any man be able to stand before thee all the days of thy life: as I was with Moses, so I will be with thee: I will not fail thee, nor forsake thee. Be strong and of a good courage: for unto this people shalt thou divide for an inheritance the land, which I sware unto their fathers to give them" (Joshua 1:5,6). Such is faith. Believing that God will act upon His Word. By faith, Pastor An obeyed the call of God and he is used by God to reach out to other blind people. According to Peter's writing to the elders in the capacity as an elder, not bishop or pope, there can be no domination of the pastor of a big church over the pastor of a small church (I Pet. 5:1). Fraternity of B-P ministers!

2. A pastor's effectualness stems from his <u>exemplarity</u> (I Pet. 5:3). Confucius rightly says, "He who would govern a kingdom must first regulate his family, and he who would regulate his family must first cultivate himself."

3. <u>Humility</u>. Peter takes two verses to expound this lost virtue among Christians. Humility first applies to the younger, but it takes in the elder also when Peter says, "All of you be subject one to another" (I Pet. 5:5,6). Calvin says, "The first rule of theology is humility. The second is humility. The third is humility."

Singapore, No More a Colony, But a Nation

As we draw close to Aug. 9 our National Day, let us see what the Bible has to say about nations.

As to nationhood, Paul said to the Athenians in his sermon on Mars Hill, "God that made the world and all things therein, seeing that He is Lord of heaven and earth . . . hath made of one blood all nations of men for to dwell on all the face of the earth, and hath determined the times before appointed and the bounds of their habitation" (Acts 17:24-26). God has divided mankind into nations, Romans, Greeks or barbarians. He has decreed these nations to live in their allotted spheres of space and time. He who is Creator is also Governor of nations.

Prior to Paul, Daniel says, ". . . the Most High ruleth in the kingdom of men, and giveth it to whomsoever He will, and setteth up over it the basest of men" (Dan. 4:17). Daniel particularly is prophet of the Great nations to come that will be involved in God's plan climaxing with the setting up of His own kingdom on earth.

In the light of Paul's teaching, we Singaporeans should thank God for our nationhood. Since we shed off British rule, we have been enabled to stand on our own feet as an independent nation. By good government we have been nurtured to become a prosperous people. Moreover, God has surrounded us specially with His protection so that we are not wartorn like our neighbours, Vietnam and Cambodia.

Faith at the Top

David Howard is international director of World Evangelical Fellowship (WEF), an organization of 59 regional and national bodies representing 100 million evangelicals around the world. WEF relocated its headquarters to Singapore in February 1987. CHRISTIANITY TODAY spoke with Howard about the growth of the church in that small but influential city-state.

What is the status of the church in Singapore?

A recent front-page article in Singapore's major newspaper, the Straights Times, discussed a government survey indicating that Christianity is the fastest-growing religion in the country. The article reported about 19 percent of the current population is Christian, compared with about 9 percent ten years ago. That would include Catholics and anyone who calls himself or herself a Christian. But in Singapore, those who call themselves Christians are usually what we would call evangelicals.

The most interesting part of the survey was where those Christians are found. In most non-Western countries, the Christian church is strongest in the lesser-educated strata of society. In Singapore, it's exactly the opposite. This survey said that 41 percent of the university graduates are Christians. Thirty-eight percent of those in professional, managerial, and executive jobs are Christians.

What about the rest of society?


The professionals are primarily Chinese, who make up about 76 percent of the population. Indians are about 4 percent, and they also are found among the professionals. And this is reflected in the churches.

My dear Readers,

The Malays, who make up most of the working class, are about 14 percent of the population. They are almost all Muslims, and the church has not been very effective in reaching them with the gospel.

Why this growth pattern?

When I ask believers, "How did you become a Christian?" their answer is almost always the same: They were led to the Lord through Bible studies in



high school or college—studies conducted by groups such as Youth for Christ, InterVarsity, and Navigators. Missionary studies of church growth in Singapore have shown the same. Conversion takes place most often during teenage years, in high school. These young believers go on to the university and are further discipled.

Most converts are the first Christians in their families. According to the survey I mentioned before, people are leaving Buddhism and Hinduism about equally for Christianity and secularism. Islam is holding its own.

What challenges does the church in Singapore face?

Christians there are in danger of being affected by materialism. Singapore is a very affluent society, and most of the Christians, coming from the middle and upper classes, are relatively comfortable. In any part of the world, affluence can leave believers unwilling to make the sacrifices that may be necessary for the growth of the church.

A second danger I see is that of insensitivity to the social needs of other people. Singapore doesn't have a lot of poverty. The government has been tremendously effective in its economic policies.

The closest thing to poverty in Singapore is found among the foreign workers, who come from Thailand or Malaysia to do construction jobs for the growing city, sending money back to their families. The church has not done enough to try to reach these people and to do something for them both spiritually and physically.

What are some other characteristics of the church in Singapore?

There is a good missions consciousness. About 250 Singaporeans are serving as missionaries in other parts of the world.

Singapore Christians, however, are also big on three- or tour-week mission trips to India or the Philippines, to build a church or a school building, or to sing and have gospel meetings. Church leaders in Singapore point to the danger that Christians view these trips as fulfillment of their missionary obligation. Unfortunately, these trips also use large amounts of money—much more than what is currently going into long-term missions.

But I'm pleased with the aggressiveness of the church. It is still growing. It's made up largely of young people, first-generation Christians, who still have that first love and evangelistic enthusiasm.

The report on Christianity in Singapore above by Rev David Howard in <u>Christianity</u> <u>Today</u> is accurate insofar as statistics are concerned. But he has not revealed the part played by the charismatic movement which "Operation World" registers as the fastest growing sector of Christendom. As charismatism straddles both Protestants and Roman Catholics, that growth leads to the promotion of Ecumenism and the One World Church. The word "evangelical" today has taken on a much diluted meaning. Incidentally, "Operation World" has placed B-Ps next to charismatics in Church Growth and the Far Eastern Bible College at par with S'pore Bible College as a Missionary College.

The report above mentions the sending of 250 missionaries by Singapore. But it also laments the new fad of touring "missionaries" by local churches which spends enormous sums of money (estimated by Keith Hinton, author of "Church Growth - S'pore Style," to be between two and three million per annum). We agree with Dr Hinton in this respect. We believe in cost-effective evangelism and missions. Every cent our Church spends is transparently reported. Our members can judge if giving to a certain project is wise and justifiable.

Another lament concerns not reaching out to the poor. Thai and Malaysian workers are among the neglected. (Then there are the tens of thousands of Filipino maids not mentioned.) As to helping the poor, it is not necessarily confined within S'pore borders. Our help to the Half-finished Filipino Churches with Rev Dan Ebert, and lately to the outreach of the Blind Korean Pastor, are ministries to the poor with missions outreach foremost, in obedience to the Great Commission.

As to Far Eastern Bible College, may I invite you to her 18th Graduation to be held at the Sunset Gospel Hour, Calvary Pandan B-P Church, Sunday August 20, 6.00 pm. For



the classes of 1987 and 1988, I have pleasure to report the conferment of eleven (11) degrees of the B.Th. to Chang Chian Hui (Faith), Cheong Chin Meng (Sharon), Peter Chng (Life), Hong Chi Her, Jeffrey Khoo (Life), Khoo Lean Im (Tabernacle), Patricia Lim (Galilee), Jemima Tow (Life), Quek Suan Yew (Calvary), Patrick Tan (Life), David Wong (Kulai Besar). The recipients of the Dip.Th. are: Abimannan Supramaniam (Ulu Tiram),

(Indonesia), Grace Lauw (Perth), Ngiow May San (Emmanuel), Roska Sihombing (Batam), Anne Wong (Emmanuel), Alfred Yeo (Life). The recipients of the Cert.R.K. are Betty Tan (Presbyterian) and Phoebe Wong (Life).

Of these graduands, four are headed for Grace Seminary, USA. The rest are serving in the churches and mission fields mostly of the BPC movement.

With the graduation of the above-mentioned, their places have been taken by an intake of 15 new students, two-thirds of whom are from Korea and Africa. Graduates from foreign countries return to serve their own, which is as it should be. FEBC is playing a new role in missions to the ends of the earth. Pray for the College, for the faculty and students, as we labour on into the 28th year. - Yours faithfully, T.T.

Review and Comments on Autobiography of Blind Korean Pastor An Yo Han by Charles Seet

"For God, who commanded the light to shine out of darkness, hath shined in our hearts, to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ. But we have this treasure in earthen vessels, that the excellency of the power may be of God, and not of us" (II Cor. 4:6,7).

These words which Paul wrote by inspiration of God could well be used to describe John An Yo Han today, the blind Korean Pastor, whose life is a wonderful testimony of the power of God working in spite of the most adverse situations in life. The darkness of blindness, helplessness, despair, loneliness, poverty, frustration and suicidal thoughts that befell him was dispelled by the light of the Lord Jesus Christ, so that today, so many lives have been blessed by An Yo Han's yielded life.

Reading the book, to me, was ten times better than watching the film, because I could go through the blind pastor's experiences as described in his own words, and unhindered by the film-makers' ideas and modifications (eg. according to the film, the tuberculosis patient who was blest by seeing the blind pastor's exuberance was a lady, but in real life, he was a man). The blind pastor's own words indeed reveal the innermost thoughts of his soul, for example, "I felt sorry and ashamed at being such a burden to friends. I should have told them that I would return home to ease their burden, but I knew for sure that I should leave home in search for the will of God for me. I would have told them of my plan if they could have understood my confrontation with God" (page 57).

Some episodes recorded in the book are so touching that one wonders why they were left out of the film. One particular instance was the time the blind pastor collapsed from sheer exhaustion in his ministry and he had to be hospitalised - but this was not a setback because through this, the public got to know about his plight, and responded with encouraging support for him.

Reading this book is edifying as it gives a true-life, firsthand account of one man's discovery of the workings of grace in his life. Through his triumphs and disappointments, we come face to face with the sober reality of depending upon no one at all but the LORD. We learn how unreliable it is to depend on men, as we see the apathy shown to the blind, even from Christian circles. We see the failure of putting our plans into action without dependence upon God - when he launched his first two projects and failed. We see how this made him realise that preaching God's Word should come first, when he wrote: "I trusted that when we worship Him in His house of prayer prior to all other good and noble projects, He would take care of the rest. Our hearts should be right with the Lord in order to improve the poor condition of the blind and unfortunate boys. Without God in control, our worthy plans could not be worthy" (page 101). Following this establishment of a church his ministry grew and became a means of outreach to many souls, so that even his former wife and two girls came to see his success. This is perhaps the best lesson in this book that those preparing for the ministry ahead need to learn.

As I read about the wonderful way in which God used John An, I really marvelled how a blind person with nothing but faith in the Lord could be used by Him to accomplish so much good. How much more would God then be able to use him if somehow his sight was restored to him! And I thought to myself, Am I doing all I can for the Lord, with all the faculties the Lord has given me? Am I taking too many things for granted? If the Lord could do so much through a blind man, could He not do much more through me who can see? If overwhelming odds could not cast down a blind man, how much more should I not be cast down by my circumstances.

John An's testimony is indeed a much needed one today in an age of complacency and unchallenged faith. May the Lord use this newly published English translation of his life's story to revive the hearts of many Christians.

BE SLOW TO SPEAK by Wang Ming Tao

"Let every man be swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath" (Jas. 1:19).

"Be slow to speak." In many things you merely see one side. You have not seen several other sides. In many things you know only a little bit. You have not known the greater part. If, by the little you see and the bit you know, you speak rashly, you will not escape being ridiculed and lightly esteemed by others. And when you come to see all sides and know the whole matter, you will also regret what you have rashly said today. "Be slow to speak."

"Be slow to speak." Should you see someone's badness and conclude he is a bad person, you should in fact have discovered the same person has many good points. Sometimes, you might see one with similar good points, and so you think he is a good man, when in fact he has many bad points you have not seen. If you judge a person good or bad by one thing the same person has done, will this not result in some bad consequence? "Be slow to speak."

"Be slow to speak." Sometimes you hear someone praising another how good he is. In fact he is not that good. This is a lie deliberately concocted by his supporter, and a wild exaggeration. If you are not careful and join in the praise of that person, you cannot but fall into the pit of a grave error. "Be slow to speak."

"Be slow to speak." Sometimes you hear someone criticising another how bad he is. In fact he is not that bad. It is a slander by those who envy him, to destroy his reputation. If you are not careful and join in the slander, you cannot but fall into the sin of reviling others. Moreover, you bring others great injury. "Be slow to speak."

 "Be slow to speak." What you hear consists of many rumours. Although there are many
true facts, these facts have been contaminated when passed from person to person. Unwittingly you have become a tale-bearer. "Be slow to speak."

"Be slow to speak." Sometimes you see someone fail in a certain matter. You never realise how difficult the situation was; neither did you give a thought to establish him, nor did you consider your own weaknesses. So you ridicule and judge him. You might further add words to the effect that you in such a circumstance would not result in failure. Now, when such a situation confronts you one day and you fail likewise, how you would lose face and find no place to hide. "Be slow to speak."

"Be slow to speak." Sometimes you are invited to do something. Without considering whether you can do it or not, you loudly undertake to do it. But when the time comes and you cannot do as you promised, would you not cause great hardship and despair? Moreover, you are guilty of a breach of trust. You hurt others and hurt yourself. What a miscalculation! "Be slow to speak."

"Be slow to speak." Sometimes you chance to meet a person. In the course of a little conversation you think he is an honest person, loving God and man. You take him for a bosom friend, and you reveal your secrets to him. After a while you find out he is a cunning, dangerous, selfish person. He wanted to know your secrets in order to use you. How you would regret over such a great loss! "Be slow to speak."

"Be slow to speak." Sometimes your friend may say or do something unwittingly that hurts your feelings. On his part he hasn't the slightest ill will. On your part you misunderstand him to take you to task deliberately. So you speak words that cause him much embarrassment. Later, when you discover your friend bears you no ill will, will you not feel you have offended your friend? "Be slow to speak."

"Be slow to speak." Sometimes in a conversation with your friend, you are aroused to refute him after a few words. The fact is if you will quietly listen to all he has to say, you might agree with him totally. Often have I seen such foolish people with no patience to let others speak on, who jump up in confrontation and opposition. This is a most foolish act. "Be slow to speak."

"Be slow to speak." Sometimes you want to do something. Well and good, go and do it with all your might. But do not tell others about it if there is no necessity to do so. When you succeed, that is best. If, unfortunately, you failed, you wouldn't invite ridicule anyway. Should you rashly announce beforehand anything you wanted to do, but failed to carry out, you are sure to become a laughing stock. "Be slow to speak."

"Be slow to speak." When angry you are quick to say words you should not say. When the anger has subsided, you regret your misplaced words. To avoid this, why not be slow to speak to begin with? "Be slow to speak."

"Be slow to speak." When you are elated with happiness, it is most likely that without thinking twice you would blurt out--to your own detriment! "Be slow to speak."

"Be slow to speak." "Sickness enters by the mouth. By the mouth trouble exits." Eat slowly to avoid sickness. Speak slowly to avoid trouble. "Be slow to speak."

"Be slow to speak." Don't forget that whatever you say is of great concern with God's glory, others' hurt and your own character. "Be slow to speak."

"Be slow to speak." Satan will tempt you in your speech. Evil men will trap you in your speech. The knowledgeable will judge you by your speech. A FEW WORDS ABOUT MARRIAGE

We should regard marriage as great as life and death. Then we will not easily talk about love and engagement.

Marriage must be carefully considered: the opposite side must be scrutinised and the opinions of elders, teachers and friends sought. You can do no less. The more important is: "Commit thy way unto the Lord; trust also in Him, and He shall bring it to pass" (Ps. 37:15). "Trust in the Lord with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge Him, and he shall direct thy paths" (Prov. 3:5,6).

See clearly that marriage is not a moment's blessing and happiness. It is a lifetime's blessing or curse, success or failure.

When considering marriage, to put good looks, money, property, power for priority will mostly likely result in pain, failure and regret.

When a Christian gets engaged, he should consider good character, knowledge, health, talent, and above all, the faith. Devout and God-loving young men and women must seek for a devout, God-loving partner. Else let them remain single and save themselves from many sorrows.

Marriages that are contracted through beautiful clothes and sweet cosmetics, the cinema and cabaret, theatre and restaurant, etc., will land in divoice and a lifetime of sorrows.

A girl must never marry a heartless divorcee who has discarded his wife. Neither can a man marry a woman who has left her husband. Such persons who either discard wifeof-youth or leave husband will have no compunction to abandon you in future.

Though we do not approve of marriages solely contracted between parents, young people who consult not their fathers and mothers when choosing life-partners, nor seek the opinion of experienced teachers and friends, much less wait on God; who get engaged on the spur of the moment, are faced with extreme danger.

Girls with meticulous make-up and a flair for socialising are the desire of many young men. But few from such a bevy can fill the role of virtuous wife and help-mate to the husband.

Do not rush into an engagement. Often I've observed how when an irreverent young man or woman loves one who loves the Lord, he or she would wear a mask of reverence. Should one react hastily without patient observation, mistaking him or her to be a devout Christian and enter into marriage, one would see the true colours (too late). Imagine the sorrows and great loss consequent to such a decision. The mask of deceit had worked for a season, but would surely be exposed in the end. If young Christians could quietly wait on the Lord before getting engaged and further seek the Lord's guidance, they would not fall into the pit.

Should that young man or woman who desires to be engaged to you meet with a more handsome than you and leave you, you should not feel hurt or despair but rather rejoice and thank God for deliverance from future danger and sorrow. Such lustful and covetous person can never become your life-partner. Good that she or he had left you in advance that you might not suffer heavier losses. Had you unfortunately got engaged and married, the consequences thereafter could result in untold tragedy. The sorrows you go through would be unimaginable.

When an unmarried couple is uncertain of a resultant marriage, then they should cut down going out together. For should they fall deeper in love without possibility of marriage they would end up in misery.

Do not fall in love easily with the opposite sex. This is like weaving your own cocoon and tying yourself up.

When a married man or married woman falls for another of the opposite sex, it is adultery in the eyes of God.

When a married man falls for a woman more charming than his wife and deals falsely with his spouse, yea, even taking steps to discard her, and marry the new girl, what do you think his wife-of-youth will feel? Broken-hearted or not broken-hearted? Whether she is dead or alive, he would be quite nonchalant. Such a person is of the world's most cruel and evil lot. Let them hear God's Word: "He hateth putting away; for one covereth violence with his garment, saith the Lord of hosts: therefore take heed to your spirit, that ye deal not treacherously" (Mal. 2:16). Sooner or later God will requite with His justice such a ruthless and selfish person.

Whether or not men would listen to what I say, I must declare loudly the teaching of our Lord Jesus Christ: "Whosoever shall put away his wife, except it be for fornication . . . committeh adultery" (Matt. 19:9).

Some Christians' marriages being contracted by their parents, they are troubled in many things thereby. Unbelievers in such circumstances would seek divorce, but Christians in obsying God's will, pity their ignorant wives and dismiss any thought of divorce and remarriage in order not to be a stumbling block to others. No doubt they would be sorely tried at home, no doubt their happinesses would be curtailed. But when they stand before God in future they would surely be rewarded for their love of God and man. A contented heart, a cottage secure, A life regulated, a fragrance green,

When all around you is quiet you'll see

That human kindness is diminishing.

The last two lines of this verse are of no little help to questions young people ask about marriage.

To maintain a lasting affection between man and wife and happiness in the home, there are three things most important. First is mutual love. Second is mutual respect. But before these two, of paramount importance is fearing God together. August 28, 1932

REPORT ON SCHOOL AND CHURCH FROM WEST KALIMANTAN

Dear Pastor Tow, I've not written for a long time. I'm thinking of you. May the Lord bless your ministry.

Recently I learnt from Kim Kah Teck of your coming to Kuching to hold a series of meetings mid-November, and of your desire to have me take part. I shall make sure to

come. We should have a good time talking of what has transpired since we last met.

From mid-August, this semester, the Bible Institute has become a night school (Sekolah Alkitab Timur Jauh). We have over 30 students. These are made up of school boarders as well as Christian young people from outside. This is an improvement over previous enrolment of six or seven (fulltime) students. Thus we are making fuller use of the Institute premises, as you so desire. The remaining available classrooms are used for middle and high

school students.

As for the Bible Institute, we held graduation service for three students on June 2, 1989, who were simultaneously commissioned. This included the first two graduates, making a team of five. All five are serving in the fields.

Our Church service at Siantan, from the middle of this year, has changed to the Hakka medium with interpretation into Indone-

sian. We have also taken on Mr Lai Choon Hock (a former CNEC staff-worker) to assist in the work. This has attracted a number of Chinese living in the neighbourhood to come to Church.

As to <u>Biong</u> and <u>Kumpai</u>, there is also progress (nine were baptised at Biong on Aug. 8,'89). Furthermore, we have added <u>Kampung Kapur</u> and <u>a</u> <u>preaching station at Kumpai town</u>. We praise the Lord for His grace and increase.

In addition, we have received a grant of 12 million rupiahs on recommendation from the Education Council for the extension of our Orphanage and School. Building is in progress.

Finally, here is a prayer request for my wife. She has suddenly developed a tumour in her neck. After examin-

Movement, Not Monument



FOR WELL OVER a quarter of a century now, we have been spreading the Gospel and teaching the Holy Scripture to all who would listen. It has been our privilege to teach in grass houses, out under the trees, in small churches, and in rented buildings. It has been our firm belief that as we taught the Scripture, the Church would grow and the message of salvation would spread.

Out of this ministry has grown a fellowship of young pastors and workers who have continued to study and labor together. To meet the growing needs of this work the Lord led in the development of the Center for Biblical Studies in 1982.

Today, the Center for Biblical Studies is located in a four bedroom home. The patio which runs along side of the house has been divided, serving as both library and a classroom. It is to this Center that the many pastors, who have studied with us, come for fellowship. It is here that the graduate school meets. This year some 35 students gather to study in order that they might better minister in their churches and teach their classes at the Bible Institute. From time to time, we hold special seminars at the Center. But we must limit those who can come to about 65 as there is no way to accommodate more.

It has become very evident in recent years that we needed a permanent place that could be expanded to meet the continuing growth of our various ministries. It has seemed, however, impossible for us to do this. Manila is the center of everything that Vol. XXV No. 6 17th September 1989

happens in the Philippines and has grown from 3 million people in 1955 to well over 10 million today. In each of the last three years property has actually doubled. Speculators are buying up every piece of property for three or four miles outside of the city.

Just a few weeks ago a newly converted church member came to one of the pastors, who is a CBS graduate, and told him that there was a large piece of land near-by that the owners were interested in selling. This pastor immediately contacted Rev Dan Ebert IV, seeing it as a real opportunity from the Lord. The land is situated on a hill overlooking the city. It is located in an area which is rapidly growing. All around it the land has been subdivided, but has not yet been developed.

Because of some very unusual circumstances this land has been offered to us at less than half the going price. If things continue as they are, the property will double in value each year over the next three or four years and will at that time be located right-in the center of a very excellent suburb. This 3,000 square meters of choice hilltop land would provide adequate space for the graduate Centre, the Bible college, our publication ministry and housing for the staff. The property could be purchased and made ready for development for 75,000 US dollars. The owners are pressed for funds and we must raise this money in six months. Pray that this property which has been so miraculously offered to us might be acquired for the cause of Christ.

Others fall away from the pure Gospel. These imbibe an extra-Biblical doctrine. When the leader is blind, his followers cannot but fall into sorrows. Christian, take care of yourself!

"For the love of money is the root of all evil, which while some coveted after, they have erred from the faith, and pierced themselves with many sorrows" (I Tim. 6:10). We have seen--north, east, south, west--how many Christians have fallen into bitter sorrows because of this love of money. Christian, take care of yourself!

Promiscuous love, lasciviousness and fornication, these hurt body and destroy virtue, and bring great harm to the family. In the annals of both secular and sacred history, and from our daily observations, countless people are fallen into the abyss of multiple sorrows. Christian, take care of yourself!

A little spark can burn up a prairie. A wrong decision can bring irremediable results. Many great crimes come from a little greed, a little adulterous desire, a little envy, a little pride, a little selfishness lurking in the heart. How did you know a little evil desire could cause a man to perpetrate such terrible crime? Hurting others, hurting oneself! Christian, take care of yourself!

Some who rely on their cleverness commit fraud and lying for name and wealth. These may profit for a little season, whereby they become the bolder in their transgression. When their lies are eventually exposed and their tricks laid bare, their credibility becomes bankrupt, their repute swept away, they find themselves cursed of God and deserted by man. They who cheat others cheat themselves. Christian, take care of yourself!

"Because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour." Because of a moment's slumber and drowsiness in certain matters, many Christians are brought to grief. Christian, take care of yourself.

When a Christian is most fervent in spirit and is at the zenith of virtuous deeds, when he is most diligent in God's service, more often than not, he commits the great sin of pride! Christian, take care of yourself!

An angler must put bait on his hook in order to catch fish. Satan uses money, fame, food, clothes, friends, love-passion, revelry for a bait to Christians. Many Christians who lust after this bait are hooked. Christian, take care of yourself!

A passing word from the mouth is a little matter. But we see how many who for a little word from the mouth bring disaster. They hurt others and hurt themselves. "In the multitude of words there wanteth not sin: but he that refraineth his lips is wise" (Prov. 10:19). Christian, take care of yourself!

A Christian who fears men will fall into Satan's trap, to do things not pleasing to God. For fearing the Philistine troops, King Saul waited not for Samuel but took into his own hands to perform the sacrifice, for which he entertained God's wrath (see I Sam. 13). Peter, for fearing the mail-fist of the Jews, denied his Lord thrice with an oath (Matt. 26:69-75). "The fear of man bringeth a snare: but whoso putteth his trust in the Lord shall be safe" (Prov. 29:25). Christian, take care of yourself!

Have you seen many fallen Christians? How pitiful is their plight! They are laid low in their conduct, so unclean! How sorrowful is their daily life. When you see them you cannot but sigh for them. But know this: Some of them had been mightily used, had lived a good life. Owing to carelessness, they have fallen to such a place. Christian, take care of yourself!


INTRODUCTION TO A NEW BOOK

Foreword to "Wang Ming Tao & Charismatism" by Timothy Tow

Having been privileged to read in advance of publication Dr Timothy Tow's translation of Wang Min Tao's assessment of the Charismatic Movement, I can see how very important it is that this work should have the widest possible circulation. Although this assessment was written in 1934 it struck me as remarkably modern and totally applicable to the practices that have swept through many church fellowships and house groups in our day.

<u>True</u> believers, whether in or out of the Charismatic Movement, possess an inborn desire --implanted by the Spirit--to test all things by the Word of God, and so to remain under the lordship of Christ. This book will meet their need, for it examines various charismatic practices fully and thoroughly in the light of Scripture. No reader can fail to detect that Wang Ming Tao's supreme concern is to be right by God's Word, and not merely to justify some tenaciously held viewpoint.

The method is patient, careful, and always interesting, reflecting the author's unique charm and skill as an *Depounder* of the Scriptures. No issue is "ducked," and whether the author is speaking of David dancing before the ark, or about the <u>source</u> of charismatic experiences, his conclusions are crystal clear and replete with the force of Truth.

DAKE CARE OF YOUR EYES by Wang Ming Tao



"Let thine eyes look right on, and let thine eyelids look straight before thee"

Take care of your eyes! Because he who uses his eyes properly will derive many benefits, enjoy many delights. He who uses his eyes improperly will contract many sins and go through many sorrows.

Take care of your eyes! Do not look at those frivolous young men and women. They expose their arms and thighs. They dress seductively to attract attention. They powder themselves white and paint themselves red. They curl their natural, straight-like-apen hair into weird shapes. They splash on the apparel perfume offensive to the nerves. Such behaviour is nothing less than to stir up the emotions of the opposite sex, to seduce them to their fallen ways. These are poisonous snakes. To associate with them would end up being bitten. These are snares and traps. Not to avoid them lands you in danger. The first step of their seduction is to attract attention.

Take care of your eyes. Refrain from those filthy and sexy cinema shows and dances. How many young people who delight in these shows are harmed and brought low. Those filthy and shameful actors glorify their screen work under the name of "Love" and "Beauty dancing." If at first you do not go to these shows at all, they can do nothing to you. If, however, you do not take care and go for the first time, it will be hard for you to resist going a second time, a third time, yea, even scores and hundreds of times. Your thought-life becomes thus contaminated. Your body becomes tainted with uncleanness. Finally you fall into a most horrible abyss. Your body and morality will suffer to such an extent so as to be irretrievable.

Take care of your eyes. Do not read those moral-destroying pornographic novels and tabloids. Those who publish them seek to defraud you of your money, never considering how many of their readers' characters and lives would be sacrificed by them. Knowing that young people delight to read sensual materials, these publishers do their utmost to write on things of the flesh. This type of writing increases sales and lines their pock-Except for those who are determined to suicide, I have never seen any who buys ets. arsenic and eats it. But I have seen many ignoramuses who buy more-poisonous-than-arsenic pornographic novels and tabloids and pore over them night and day. This results in adulterous thoughts filling their minds and a fatal falling away of their moral character. Some end up with display of their shameless, adulterous behaviour while others are taken by evil, harmful habits that destroy the body. How many young people in the prime of life with a bright future have I seen become downcast in spirit, emaciated in body, soiled in character, because of their craving for pornographic literature. Yes, their whole career and happiness are buried in a few filthy books. How pitiful!

Take care of your eyes. Do not look at those nudes in painting that rouse your passions. Have you seen those fly-catcher cardboards? These are thickly smeared with a layer of poisoned honey. When the flies see the honey on the cardboard they swarm upon it to feed, but the more sweetly they are satiated thereby, the more they go on feeding until they all die on the poison cardboard. Nude drawings are Satan's poison cardboards against humankind. Now if you don't look, that's the end of the matter. Once you look, you will think of looking again. As you look on, it is sweetness to you, but you rarely knew poison is hidden in the sweetness. Filthy pictures and filthy picture magazines are both injurious to us, and even more injurious than filthy literature. Take care of your eyes. Make sure a thousand times not to look at these things. Whenever you are accosted by these things, be swift to turn away from them. If it is within your power, destroy them in the fire. Let them be turned to ashes!


start making the Bomb when War is declared" is too late.

In the spirit of Joshua and Caleb, let us recall the great deeds God had done during the days we built Woodlands. When our congregation was half of what we number today, we gave, in exactly 4 years, \$3 million. Today, if a couple were to buy a flat in town, they would happily sweat it out to get ½ million dollars. It all depends on you, my Reader! If it is the Lord's will we acquire that said property, let us respond lovingly, cheerfully. He that giveth much loveth much. "God loveth a cheerful giver. And God is able to make all grace abound toward you; that ye, always having all sufficiency in all things, may abound to every good work" (II Cor. 9:7.8).

At our first disclosure of the present development, an FEBC student spontaneously responded with \$300. Kelapa Sawit Kindergarten, having received so much from the Mother Church, reciprocated with a S\$5,000 pledge! Our Extension Building Fund is launched into the deep as of today, October 9, 1989. From D-Day to Total Attack! D-Day refers to June 6, 1944, when the Allied Forces under General Eisenhower landed in N. France in the final stages of World War II. Last Sunday, when we were still nego-

tiating for the property across the street, we re-launched the sluggish Extension Building Fund. This was our D-Day. Over \$10,000 came in for the EBF.

This week we report the meeting with the owner Mrs Oh through Elder Ang Kheng Leng last Monday evening, Oct. 9. The deal was happily closed for \$6.95 million. With 29,026 sq.ft., the price is slightly less than \$240 per ft. The deposit of 10% works out at \$695,000. The rest is to be paid by Feb. 28, 1990. (Ms. Lim Li, who helped us in Woodlands, is our solicitor again.)

With 42 months to go, we have little time to waste. Forward, total attack! As the news is spread to the whole Church, members are beginning to rally to the Lord. Be encouraged in the Lord by reading the Offerings column, back page!

"Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse" (Mal. 3:10). Tithe means 1/10. That sacred tenth of all our incomes belongs to the Lord. If we withhold them, we rob God (Mal. 3:8)! We built Gilstead Road and Woodlands only with tithes and free-will offerings, not by holding concerts or fun-fairs, as modernist churches do.

As the amount is great and time is short we would appeal to those who have given to further help out with loans, interest-free! This will save the Church 6% should we be pressed to loan from the bank. Remember we have to pay that \$6.95 million bill by Feb. 28, 1990! (With taxes and incidental fees. the total amounted to almost \$7-2 million).

Giving by Lifers, since Woodlands, is a hilarious exercise to God. We want to be first, not last! Let us learn a lesson from the Song of Deborah after the Battle of the River Kishon with the northern Gentiles:

"My heart is toward the governors of Israel, that offered themselves willingly among the people. Bless ye the Lord." Praise God for a unanimous decision by the Session. There is a growing and glowing zeal among Session members as the Battle hots up!

"For the divisions of Reuben, there were great thoughts of heart. Why abodest thou among the sheepfolds, to hear the bleatings of the flocks?" In this case, instead of coming to the Lord's help, are there those who only sit and talk, who like to "hear the bleatings of the flocks"? According to several experts, the price we pay is the market price, which is still rising. But to Life Church, it is priceless, because, being next door, it has "marriage" value (using the Realtor's language). What price a wife? A discerning Lifer said, "There is no comparison even between No. 6 and this right-centre property."

What we need indeed is unity. Unity of heart, unity of action. With this spirit, when we were half the size of what we are today, we conquered Woodlands by giving \$3 million in exactly four years. Now, when the Lord has prospered us 10 times, can we not do it in 41 months? We can, we can by His strength!



THE ACQUISITION OF THE PROPERTY across the street will relieve not only the congestion this side of the street, accord our S.S. and YFs rooms and grounds for recreation, but also immediate accommodation to a bursting Chinese Service. The upper storey of this in-patients block allows for more resident FEBC students to be taken in.

Do not think the College is a burden to the Church. There's a song, "Every Burden Becomes a Blessing." For such a time as this, the FEBC Treasurer rallies with a goodly sum. The whole FEBC family, faculty and students, have risen also to the occasion, even our Korean students. The Korean Church, like a brother, comes to our distress, so does Sharon! Friends of FEBC offer help spontaneously - the irresistable working of God's power! Of the scores of letters we have received in support of FEBC here's one with a \$150 envelope just come to hand: "Please accept this gift as a token of my whole-hearted support for FEBC. It encourages my heart to see this school of prophets doing God's work in these last days before our Lord's return. May you and your staff and students stand firm in that holy faith once and for all delivered unto the saints."

SYNOPSIS OF PASTOR'S 39TH ANNIVERSARY MESSAGE

There is a Chinese saying (法兵子曰用在一類): "Keep an army a thousand days to use it in one day." This saying well applies to Life Church now poised over the property across the road.

Let me remind you the Church is an army while on her earthly pilgrimage. Hence the term, "The Church Militant." Our Church was engaged in the War for Woodlands from 1979 to 1983. After Woodlands God gave us a rest for a number of years, like an army returned to barracks. But now the bugle has sounded again! Total attack "across the road"!

There is a wonderful parallel between our present situation, as we celebrate our 39th Anniversary Thanksgiving, and Israel about to cross Jordan on the 39th year of her Exodus. This parallel is recorded in Numbers 32. When Israel had conquered the land on the outerside of Jordan, Reuben, Gad and the half-tribe of Manasseh were content to dwell there. They said to Moses, "If we have found grace in thy sight, let this land be given unto thy servants for a possession, and bring us not over Jordan" (Num. 32:5).

But Moses replied, "Shall your brethren go to war and shall ye sit here? And wherefore discourage ye the heart of the children of Israel from going over into the land which the Lord hath given them? Thus did your fathers, when I sent them from Kadesh-barnea to see the land. For when they went up unto the valley of Eshcol, and saw the land, they discouraged the heart of the children of Israel, that they should not go into the land which the Lord had given them . . . " Realising the peril of sitting on their laurels while Israel was under orders to advance, the two-and-a-half tribes quickly closed ranks. They responded to Moses, ". . . we ourselves will go ready armed before the children of Israel, until we have brought them unto their place . . " (Num. 32:17). Are there some Lifers like Reuben, Gad and the half-tribe of Manasseh who are not zealous about crossing over to the new Promised Land? Be quick also to close ranks to form a united army. The oneness of purpose and spirit is a prerequisite to victory. Let us be spiritually prepared. Morale is more important than munitions.

To prepare ourselves spiritually, let us come before the Lord for cleansing. Let us encourage, and not disparage, one another. Let us pray together every Tuesday night in our army headquarters at Gilstead Road. This is our vertical preparation.

Horizontally speaking, we must now be physically armed for war. Swords, spears, bows, arrows were the ancient weapons carried by the Israelites. God would want them to do their bit after all those years of wilderness training. To assault the territory before us, we need to use our financial resources. Our tithes, free-will offerings, savings, yea, even loan of our children's education funds are a help to the Lord. Last of all interest-free loans in sizeable sums are needed to make up the \$5 million nett we need. Amen.

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





PASTORAL CHAT

My dear Readers,

The Irresistible Power of God

Let me tell you a little anecdote to encourage your heart! Years ago, during the building of a bridge across a portion of New York harbour, the engineers were seeking a base for one of the buttresses. They struck upon an old scow



(boat) full of bricks and stone that had sunk in the mud until practically buried. Divers were sent down to place great chains under the scow so that it could be raised, but every effort failed.

A young engineer assured them it could be done. He brought two barges and attached huge chains around the scow to beams on the barges. The chains were tightly fastened at low tide. As the tide swept up the harbour, raising the barges, the buried

scow shook, shivered and let go. It was raised by the lift of the Atlantic Ocean! The lethargy that hinders God's work cannot be removed but by God Himself. "Not by

might, nor by power, but by my Spirit, saith the Lord of Hosts" (Zech. 4:6). How can our Church take over the Beulah Land across the road at such a cost in so short a time - \$6.95 million in 4 months and 3 weeks? Let us look at Him alone who led Israel across Jordan at floodtide. But Israel had to follow swiftly their appointed leader into the field.

Remember our slogan used years ago in building Gilstead Road, "If every member will do his best, God will take care of the rest"? What have you done, so far, for the Lord, and time is running out?

"God Helps Those Who Help Themselves"

How can you help? If you have no savings, you can give your 13th month! God does not require what we do not have, but what we already have. (God has no so-called "faithpromise" plan, but "love-action" plan.) I am proposing that members of the Church staff set an example to the whole congregation, as we did in going to Woodlands. The whole



Session responded in unison. Then rallied the whole congregation! With that 13th month, we were enabled to pay off a big bill, I believe, over a quarter If we could do this for land opposite Malaysia, we can do it the million. more for land right under our nose! Let members encourage one another! it up like Caleb and Joshua: "The Land, which we passed through to Talk search it, is an exceeding good land. If the Lord delight in us, then He will bring us into this land, and give it to us . . . " (Numbers 14:7.8)

"Never Pay Interest!"


Last Sunday I preached on the Rechabites (Jer. 35) who kept the word of their ancestor and were commended. One thing I have learned from my Grandpa is "never pay interest"! So, when we went to Woodlands, we struggled our hardest in giving and loaning to the Church totalling \$3 million. We were saved from carrying the heavy burden of paying interest to some bank.

In the same vein, may I ask you to help out the Church by interest-free loans. A member said we could take several millions loan to save this tight situation. But she did not realise, were we to take \$2.5 million at 6 percent we would have to pay \$150,000 per annum. Should we take two to three years to clear, this would amount to \$400,000. Let us save this blood oozing for the Lord.

We have mentioned how your children's education fund can help. God bless your children and their future. You can loan a portion of your POSB savings, counting the interest thereof as your offering to the Lord. Now, it is to the poor that our little sums can mean so much. \$2,000; \$5,000; \$10,000 are small sums, but in our present situation they are big. And the Lord has made Himself poor for us that we through His poverty might be rich - rich in having a share in God's enterprise. Moreover, there's the guarantee: "He that hath pity upon the poor lendeth unto the Lord; and that which he hath given will he pay him again" (Prov. 19:17). Don't let our Church pay interest)

More About Beulah Land

We have named the new property "Beulah Land." Now you notice the triangular piece and the former Reshti land are shaded. The triangular piece is a buffer whereon is built a low PUB sub-station with trees planted for shade to our side. The rectangular shaded area shows the unbuilt part of a 16-storey (we're told) condominium not shown on the map. Though skyscrapers rise around Beulah Land, we are by no means hemmed in. We remain the shady casis as Beulah Land has been. There is also ample parking space along the triangle and above. "The lines are fallen unto me in pleasant places; yea, I have a goodly heritage" (Ps. 16:6).



Another asset of Beulah Land is the buildings are in good repair; so we'll not spend

but a few thousand dollars to remove partitions to make utmost room for group meetings. "Economy is the mother of prosperity." PASTORAL CHAT

This Week's War Bulletin

As we are "at war" in our present crusade to take Beulah Land, a weekly Bulletin to keep you informed is a must.



My dear Readers,

If you ask what is our strategy of winning this war, I would answer simply, "Your interest-free loans - from your POSB Savings Account." Now, what is required of you is to loan as much as you can to the Lord. The interest you forego for the Lord's sake is accounted your offering. (If at any time after Feb 28,'90 you have need of your money or part of it, the Church will repay you in the shortest possible time.) While offerings might come in

tens or hundreds, what we need now is thousands, ten-thousands and hundred-thousands. We must reach the target of 1/4 million every Lord's Day, whether by gift or loan, and we are behind schedule!



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New Frontiers of Evangelism

When Rev Djunaidi and Preacher Kim Kah Teck came to Kuching Airport in the Sharon Rose B-P Church Van to receive me, a new frontier of evangelism between Pontianak and the Sarawak capital was opened! Hitherto visits between Pontianak and Kuching were made



by plane. This time the trip taken by Djunaidi to Kuching was by bus and taxi. This saves our brother a costlier plane ticket and an exit tax of R\$250,000 or over S\$250. For, the overland crossing, recently inaugurated between Indonesia and East Malaysia, is exempt.

The reason why we have planned our meeting this time is that Djunaidi might be profitably employed to help Sharon oversee this five-year old B-P Mission from closer range. This saves much time and expense and adds pastoral care to an embryo Church which Singapore cannot provide for the moment.

Started by Life Church August 1984, Sharon Rose was committed to Sharon B-P Church one month after that. Hence, we named the Kindergarten, the first phase of

the infant Church, Sharon Rose. When several converts were made, both Dyaks and Chinese, among them a Chinese banker, a Church service and Sunday school developed. While the main work was being carried on in a housing estate, Kah Teck further reached out to a squatter area, not far from the housing estate, to build a M\$10,000 two-storey wooden chapel, 25 feet by 30 feet. In the course of years, however, the work in the housing estate dwindled. Now what is left is the two-storey wooden chapel. It is to refurbish Sharon Rose that Djunaidi and I were invited to Kuching this time.

This is not to say that Sharon Rose is a failure. Several sweet fruits have been borne. Apart from the Chinese banker family, there is Marilyn Nanta, now studying at FEBC and a member of the Indonesian Service. There is Madil a Dyak construction worker from Batu Lintang, baptised by Rev Djunaidi.

Through Madil's contact Kah Teck has reached out to two Dyak Longhouses in the Batu Lintang district, 120 miles from Kuching. The afternoon after my arrival, Kah Teck drove Djunaidi and me to Batu Lintang (near Sri Aman) to preach to the two Longhouses.

Having translated Jason Linn's "Pioneering in Dyak Borneo," I was now to see in concrete what I had visualised in my mind. The first longhouse, situated in a valley, consisted of 15 families. The headman's house is located in the centre. The style of construction is the same as what I have read, only that no more are animals and fowls kept beneath the high-stilted platforms. A modern longhouse is clean and airy, with running water and electric lights. In the headman's house we had the luxury of sitting on sofas, surrounded by TV and tape recorders.

As the headman has become Christian, at least nominally, he gave us permission to preach to his tribesmen. Seventy, old and young, heard Djunaici speak in Indonesian and me in English, interpreted into Iban by Kah Teck.

At the second longhouse, called a half-longhouse because there were only 6 families, we followed the same procedure. A young girl of 16, Nancy by name, daughter of the headman, attends an Anglican Mission School. She has since believed and brought the Gospel to her parents. We gave her some of our books and extended her a scholarship to FEBC should the Lord call her. We slept in the longhouse for the night to intermittent cock crows and barking of dogs.

Sunday night, the monsoon rains poured down in torrents so that the path leading to the wooden chapel came under water. We thought no one would come to service, but we were wrong. Forty, old and young, Dyaks and Chinese, braved the downpour to hear the Gospel. I spoke on the Second Coming of Christ and told the children how I had been afraid of His coming when a boy of eight or nine. They seemed to fear the terror of the Lord too, until the Gospel was made plain to them. Then they raised their hands to indicate they wanted to be saved at His coming. Sunday night saw us comfortably settled at Mr Charles Wong's new home at Tabuan Jaya.

As time was heavy on our hands before my scheduled flight home on Wednesday, we decided to strike out to Sibu, the next big town of Sarawak. Our purpose was to see this city founded by Foochow Methodists in 1901 under Wong Nai Siong, a Chinese version of the Pilgrim Fathers who sailed for America, 1620. Another reason was to make contact with the Christian Book Rooms so as to find an outlet for our publications. We made the trip by fast riverboat. The journey took 4½ hours upstream, costing M\$25 per person. We stayed at a small hotel costing the three of us M\$30, or \$10 each.

Sure enough, we saw the big Methodist Church in the centre of the town. Here John Sung held great revival meetings in 1936 at which 1,600 were soundly converted. We visited the Methodist Bookroom where John Sung's biographies in Chinese are sold. We introduced the John Sung Choruses with music notations which was gladly accepted.

As the Methodist Bookroom sells 90% Chinese books, we were introduced to the Christian Book Room that specialises in English. We hope by these contacts, more fundamental and separatist literature might penetrate Sarawak. I say "Sarawak" because we have made contacts also in Kuching.

After our 30-hour interlude to Sibu, we met with the Seven Pastors. Interest was aroused in them to exchange visits with Kalimantan. During the evening service at the Wooden Chapel at which 40 attended, we baptised Imbi anak Jumbao and his two infant daughters. His wife was baptised in 1982. I visited also my octogenarian aunt who offered her widow's mites to our Extension Building Fund.

Kah Teck has completed over five years' service in Kuching. Now his wife Pauline has gone to Taiwan to take refresher courses in a Chinese seminary. Kah Teck feels compelled to do the same. They deserve a well-earned sabbatical. But their wooden chapel will be left unmanned! Here comes the suggestion for Marilyn Nanta to return to Kuching for a season. Meanwhile a Chinese Indonesian couple, graduating students of a Bible School at Singkawang, are preparing to serve under Rev Djunaidi. This is the latest development of new frontiers of evangelism. This work needs our prayers and Sharon's continued support. Amen.

A Stitch in Time Saves Nine

Once I had a little tear in the centre seam of my trousers. Because I did not stitch it up, the whole trousers split in two right through under heavy strain. What a loss, what an embarrassment!

We have to find \$5 million to close the gap of our deal to purchase No. 10 Gilstead Road. If we do our uttermost now by gifts and loans, it will save us half a million paying interest in years to come. Such a drain will affect all our mission outreaches.

Does Christ Come to Our Emmaus Road?

The road from Jerusalem to Emmaus was "three score furlongs" or 60 x 582 ft = 7 miles (NIV). Two disciples, one Cleopas by name, were walking to Emmaus. As they indulged in the talk of the town, viz., the crucifixion of Jesus only three days before, the

Risen Saviour joined their company. While the conversation went on, our Lord expounded the Scriptures to them, "the things concerning Himself," "beginning at Moses and all the prophets" (Luke 24:27). How long did our Saviour walk and talk with the two disciples? For half-an-hour, one hour? Oh, how you wished you're there too--the blessing of having the Lord's divine company! But Cleopas and his friend did not recognise Jesus until grace was said at the village inn and Jesus had served! "And their eyes were opened, and they knew Him, and He vanished out of their sight" (Luke 24:31).

Today, we are heading laboriously towards the Beulah Land across the street, our Emmaus Road, so near yet so far. Our countenance betrays the burden on our heart, like the two disciples, but ours rather is a financial one. How wonderful it would be if the Saviour should show Himself to us! Because we did not see Him, our senses are blurred. Does Christ come to our Emmaus Road? We need not wait until the Day we enter Beulah Land, as the two disciples arrived at the village, to see Jesus face to face. We should be lightened by His beaming countenance even now! As your pastor, we can testify to His presence through signs that come in moments of our greatest need. Thus, we can advance with greater confidence in the "last three miles" of our journey.

Does Christ come to your Emmaus Road when you are sad (Lk. 24:17)? O may you feel Him as He walks each day with you! Then will your heart burn within you, and when He blesses you as you pray, you will see Him face to face! Amen.

Although our 1989 Church Calender displays a photo of Life Church facing the Eye Clinic and there is a "box" with this caption, "Guess what this space stands for?", I had given up the idea of acquiring the property, until late September when we got wind that the owner was going to sell. A year or so before this, we had enquired, but to no avail. I had given up on the property because the price of land kept on rising.

When Elder Dr Lim Teck Chye took a bold stand to acquire what is now called our Beulah Land (it has marriage value), I sensed this was from the Lord. So I cast in my lot with him. We had also the strong support of Rev Dr Tan. When a vote was taken at one of the crucial Session meetings and the decision was unanimous, my faith was further confirmed. I have no doubt but that Beulah Land is reserved for us by the Lord's Hand. If it is the Lord's Hand, what is \$7 million to Him?

By His grace we have a \$2 million reserve. Now, we have given and loaned another \$2 million. What we need is \$3.2 million. The Lord has made Himself poor that we may be rich (II Cor. 8:9). He gives each member his or her opportunity to give to His Cause. Suppose, there is one tycoon who will write a \$3.2 million cheque? Where then is your share of blessing by your loving gift to Him? All through His life on earth, our Lord was served and supported by lowly and loving hands. Interestingly, by the women. "And certain women, which had been healed of evil spirits and infirmities, Mary called Magdalene, out of whom went seven devils, and Joanna the wife of Chuza, Herod's steward, and Susanna, and many others, which ministered unto Him of their substance" (Luke 8:2,3). Brothers, buck up! The ECM last Lord's Day has recognised the Lord's approval. So let us all go forward with one accord.

Why Didn't We Think of This?

A B-P minister of no mean standing, seeing our strategy of gathering interest-free loans being mightily blessed of God, remarked, "Why didn't we think of this?"

Yes, the strategy of closing the gap of our \$7 million deal for Beulah Land is interest-free loans from members and friends! Your having a share in God's investment is



one not only of guaranteed repayment (Prov. 19:17 says, "He that hath pity upon the poor lendeth unto the Lord; and that which he hath given will He pay him again"), but also of multiple good dividends. In Malachi's call to an unthankful congregation to revive giving their tithes, does not the Lord promise, "And prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I

will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it (Mal. 3:10). This blessing is experienced by a YAFer who wrote last week to the pastor, "You were right when you said that we can never outgive the Lord. Even as I prepare to make out the little loan to the Beulah Land Fund, the Lord has blessed me bountifully in my job. He has given me a whopping. pay rise, much to my surprise . . . "

Conversely, when we flout His call to give Him His dues, Haggai has this to say, "Is it time for you, O ye, to dwell in cieled houses (with flowery ceilings, in Chinese trans-

lation) and this house lie waste? . . . Ye have sown much, and bring in little; ye eat, but ye have not enough; ye drink, but ye are not filled with drink; ye clothe you, but there is none warm; and he that earneth wages earneth wages to put it into a bag with holes" (Haggai 1:4-6).

In the Name of our Lord Jesus Christ, I appeal to every God-loving and God-fearing Lifer to bring in your tithes into the Storehouse. If you have neglected throughout the years, let this be your opportunity with your double and triple year-end bonus (SIA gives 6 months). And why not also loans from your little-productive savings which now can earn ten-times, yea, a hundred times more, by putting them into God's hands? Surely He will bless you when you respond cheerfully, He will bless your wife and your children! "Why didn't we think of this?"

Celebrating Christmas Without Christ

"And when ye did eat, and when ye did drink, did ye not eat for yourselves, and drink for yourselves?" (Zech. 7:6). These words of admonition from the lips of the prophet Zechariah aptly describe the Orchard Road spirit that is pervading Singapore these days.

(Is your heart cleansed by His precious blood?) As it is stated often that giving is loving, there can be no love expressed until we have worshipped Him with our substance. PASTORAL CHAT

My dear Readers,

Does the Lord Need Our Encouragement?

Though Jesus is the Lord God Almighty, He is also the Son of Man. He is fully human, yet without sin, and He feels as we feel. In the gloomiest moments of His days on earth, in dark Gethsemane, did He not take Peter, James and John along, and ask them to "watch with Me* (Matt. 26:38)?

Gethsemane had cast a long shadow even to Bethany. Last Monday afternoon, while I was very down in spirits as I surveyed the \$3.2 million that we still had to find, an FEBC student came with a \$1,200 from her youth group. No sooner had she left than the phone rang. A John Sung old-timer kindly offered \$1,000 from her Church fund. Then she followed up with another \$5,000 from a lady of her church who loves the Lord and Life Church. Although the three sums add up only to \$7,200, they are sweet-savour offerings, all from outside of Life Church. Does the Lord need our encouragement?

Kelapa Sawit

means "Oil Palm." This flourishing village derives her name from the oil palm estate that dominates its environs. Our Church, occupying the highest point, is no less prosperous. Sitting on an half-acre of prime land, it is a miniature Life-FEBC



complex. For 1990, the Kindergarten will open a fifth class. The Kindergarten is a nursery for the Church. Little tots who learn the Word are saved at a young age. This was evidenced by a string of 6 children I baptised last Lord's Day together with their mother. The father is an old-timer, but the mother has just been converted. The joy of baptising her six children was from the knowledge of their salva-


tion by attending our own kindergarten. Baptised with their mother and children was another adult.

Another pleasantness was the spontaneous gathering of offerings by her members for our EBF. This is the third time of expressing their liberality. I must also thank Elder Sng Teck Leong for driving me in, which gave me a time for relaxation and meditation. Elder. Sng visits Kelapa Sawit once a month and preaches at Air Bemban the same evening, where we have another flourishing kindergarten. (Air Bemban is 3 miles up the road.)

Out of Kelapa Sawit are born half-a-dozen sweet fruits. These are those who have or are being trained at FEBC and are serving the Lord fulltime. Miss Ng Sang Chiew, one of FEBC's earliest students, is the lady missionary. Miss Esther Chai serves at Air Bemban. Jit Thye is preacher at Calvary Jaya BPC, Petaling Jaya. Elder John Ling is in the last semester of his study at FEBC. Two other fruits, one graduated from Chin Lien is serving at Tampoi Johore; another, from SBC, is serving at Scudai. 

PEACE ON EARTH?

This Christmas we hear of peace talks everywhere, especially the sweet-cooings between the Super Powers, So the United States is going to reduce a big chunk of her national 12 to start approximately finding spending on weapons of war.



The people-power that is toppling over 40 years of 1.11 totalitarian rule in East European countries without bloodshed (so soon the massacre of thousands of innocent students at Tiananmen is being forgotten) seems also to lull the world to peaceful slumber. What does the Bible say to all these things?

Insofar as Singapore is concerned, Christmas 1989 still echoes the Peace Message of the First Christmas - not from Orchard Road, but from every faithful pulpit of the Island. SINGAPORE'S GROWTH MUST BE SEEN TO BENEFIT REGION" - PM These words of wisdom by our Prime Minister in last week's Sunday Times have been enacted by our Church ever since ASEAN was formed! The offerings you have designated for Missions have gone a long way not only to promote God's Kingdom but also relieve the poor (Gal. 2:10) through faithful hands in three ASEAN countries - Malaysia, Indonesia and the Philippines, and even Burma.

Since we have the visit of Rev Dan Ebert III in our midst, we take pleasure to recall how your offerings in the past five years have helped build 3 Filipino Churches and another 3 "by the wayside." Before the Beulah Land project, \$30,000 had been given to help

Rev Ebert acquire some HillTop property with the view of building a proper Bible College.

With our tight situation prior to Feb. 28,'90, when we must pay up US\$6.95 million + 3% stamp duty, the \$30,000 for Phillippines is temporarily frozen. Since Rev Ebert must pay US\$55,000, half of the HillTop land price, by Dec. 31,'89, Calvary BPC has stepped for-ward to underwrite this urgent need. This means, after Feb, 28,'90, Life Church must come in with hers .. To send \$30,000 to some charita-122 ble organisation in Manila would evaporate into thin air in the face of overwhelming physical needs. To invest it in sacred property

whereby pastors will be trained will result in much greater benefit to our ASEAN-Filipino friend.

If the Holy Spirit should touch you, my Reader, to lend also a hand, to go a second mile, in the good work you have done, there's no one to forbid you! "Singapore's growth must be seen to benefit Region" shall be realised through our Missions Outreach according to Matt. 28:19-20. And we have the power of God that transcends heaven and earth to further back us up. This is Christmas!



Upon receipt of an urgent communication from Ms. Lim Li our solicitor requesting action be taken on the Sales Agreement advanced by the Vendor, an emergency meeting of the Trustees was called by Dr Tan to meet with her the same afternoon of 28 Dec, '89. The Sales Agreement was signed by pastor on behalf of Purchaser except Clause 11 for adjustment with Vendor.
